Soft drinks are taxed 1 cent on each ten cents or fraction thereof. The tax is doubled on alcoholic beverages. On cereal beverages containing less than 1 per cent alcohol the tax is 15 per cent of the purchase price. On grape juice and like beverages it is 10 per cent of the purchase price.

The tax on motion picture films is 5 per cent of the total rental earned in the first month. The tax on admission to theatres, ball parks and the like is unchanged.

WHAT GOOD ROADS MEAN TO A COMMUNITY

It is a mistake to consider merely from the point of view of work done of gross income, labor cost, and profit and loss. There is more to living than toil; pleasure also has its place. Farmers and farmers' wives and the children likes the pleasures of friendship and social intercourse as much as city dwellers. One of the main causes of the flight to the city and especially of the young people from the farms going into other professions than farming is the deadly lonesomeness and drudgery, and lack of a mental outlet incident to farm life. Ordinarily farm life should be more healthful because it does not have to reckon with the diseases that spring from bad housing, alcoholism, and make-shift rationing common to city families having a corresponding annual income. The United States census has not classified the insane in institutions by the annual income which they produced prior to their admission, so that it is a little hard to make a comparison that would serve to show how far the hard work and the few pleasures of farm life are a contributing factor to insanity in comparison with other walks of life. However, it may be stated that out of 29,428 men and 7,061 women in the insane institutions of the United States 7,335 men and 227 women come from the farm. This is about one-fourth of all the men and onefifteenth of all the women. DON'T SELL WAR STAMPS

A warning from R. L. Van Zandt, Governor of Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, is as follows:

"My attention has been called by the Secretary of the Treasury to the fact that several persons and firms in this district are sending out circular letters offering to buy War Savings Stamps at greatly reduced prices, ranging from three dollars and seventy-five cents for the 1919 issue, to four dollars for the 1918 issue. Each of the offers specify that registered War Stamps will not be purchased, but the loose stamps and the stamps on cards will be purchased where there is no writing on the stamps even though the cards have a name written on them. It is evident that these unscrupulous dealers intend to soak the stamps off the card which has a name written on them and affix them to new cards for the purpose of redemption.

# Stops Enforcement

TEXT OF RESTRAINING ORDER BY FEDERAL JUDGE WHICH PERMITS HALLS TO REMAIN AFTER MAY FIRST

Federal District Judge James C Wilson this week granted a tempoclose pool and billiard halls in the Communion at the morning set- State on May 1. The order was filed with Federal District Clerk Maynard this April, 21, 1919. by Judge J. M. McCormick of Etheridge, Mcormick & Bromberg, solicitors for the Dallas Labor Temple Association, et al., the plaintiffs.

> "The bill is against Attorney General Cureton and also against a number of District and County Attorneys, sheriffs, chiefs of police, constables, M. H. Wolfe, B. B. Paddock, Robert E. Vinson, and other citizens. of Texas," said Judge McCormick in discussing the case. "It is brought as a class bill and is so worded that every peace officer and individual in Texas is restrained from enforcing the recent law forbidding the operation of pool halls in Texas after the first day of May.

> "The plaintiffs attack the law as denying them due process of law and equal protection of the law as outlined in the first clause of the fourteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

> "Only until the application for an interlocutory injunction is heard and determined will the restraining order be in effect. Whether this injunction will be issued will be decided by three judges-Judge James C. Wilson, and two Federal Judges, one of whom will be a circuit judge.

"Whether the interlocutory injunction is granted or refused the party losing may appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States. The pool halls will not be closed until after the Supreme Court has passed on the matter."

Judge McCormick said that the date for the sitting of the three Federal Judges on the above matter has not yet been determined. He appeared to think it was several weeks distant. In his opinion it will not be earlier than the first of next year before a decision will be rendered by

Which said restraining order shall remain in force only until a hearing and determination of the application for an interlocutory injunction, upon notice to the Governor and the defendants, after a suitable court can be assembled and the date for the hearing of said application for an interlocutory injunction set.






