THINGS THAT ARE EVIL GEN-ERATE OWN DESTRUCTION


President R. E. Vinson preached the baccalaureate sermon at the commencement exercises of the University of Texas, Sunday, June 8. He took for his text 1 Kings 19: 11-13. Dr. Vinson said, in part:
