

AWFUL STORMS ARE PREDICTED TO OCCUR ON DECEMBER 17

The editor of the Fort Worth Record has been taking Weather Prophet Foster over the coals for predicting severe storms for the middle of October, November and December. Foster did not tell the storms were coming, but he says severe weather changes are caused by the movement of the planets. Some people think the planets are mere stars twinkling in the skies, while as a matter of fact they are great bodies of matter, just as the earth is a great body of matter, swinging around the sun, and the vibrations, or electricity from these bodies not only cause the weather conditions but they are also causing the mental unrest that is now sweeping the country.

It is estimated that the planet Mercury travels 107,012 miles per hour; while Neptune travels a little over 12,000 miles per hour. The others travel at varying speeds. A very unusual thing is to occur on December 17, 1919, when Neptune, Jupiter, Saturn, Mars, Venus and Mercury, will swing around and pull on the same side of the sun at a given time. was here when all of these planets were in that position before there is no telling what is to be the outcome. The moon could be flung away from the earth and become an independent planet, the Bible speaks of that, or a series of awful storms could occur. It might become so cold that the proverbial "brass monkey" would shiver for the lack of warmth from the sun. But whatever happens, it will be something very unusual. Everybody should be ready for any emergency.

the atmosphere of our earth—doubtless on other planets as well.

Two planets united are enough to cause a small sunspot and a small storm. Three cause a larger one—four make a very great storm indeed.

But—on December 17, 1919, no less than seven planets will pull jointly on the sun. These will include all the mightiest planets, those with the most powerful pull.

Six of them—Mercury, Mars, Venus, Jupiter, Saturn and Neptune—will be in conjunction: grouped together in the greatest "League of Planets," ever known in the annals of astronomy.

They will be massed in the narrow limit of but 26 degrees, on the same side of the sun.

Directly opposite, coming into opposition with this gigantic league, will be the huge planet Uranus and the six planets will pierce the Sun like a mighty spear.

Our earth is outside the league at an angle of nearly 90 degrees—in perfect position to receive almost the full force of the monster electrical disturbance as it leaps into activity on what, to us, will be the eastern horizon of the sun's disk.

This means we shall get the full strength of the storm when the sunspot is at its worst, before the exploding gases have had time to die down.

Such a close grouping of planets has never been recorded before. The whole solar system will be strangely out of balance.

What will be the outcome? My knowledge does not permit me to state, beyond the fact that the storms, eruptions and earthquake will be tremendous in their strength and scope.

Remember the date—December 17 to 20, and after.

And quite a few letters with questions were received. We take this opportunity of saying: We do not know anything further, nor are we sure that the earth will give off one little mite of a quiver. However, we would not at all be surprised if the earth would literally "reel" and "fro" as a drunkard.) (Isa. 24:20), and "remove out of its place." (Isa. 13:13), synchronously with the great symbolical earthquake, when earth's society shall quake with fear and forebodings at transpiring events, which the Bible predicts for the very near future. We should remember that the words "reel" and "remove" above have the significance of waving or vibrating in the original. There is a theory that the time is coming when the earth shall swing square on its axis and cease its wobbling. The earth has an "equatorial inclination" of twenty-three and one-half degrees which makes the sun appear to move southward and northward over the equator—this is the earth's wobble. But, the sun does not move up and down nor does the earth.

Some have theorized that the icebergs breaking away from the arctic region would cause the earth to swing square on its axis; but if gravitation should govern the movement it would swing the wrong way and the equatorial inclination would be greater than ever, for the Southern Hemisphere is heavier now than the Northern. The earth is egg-shaped, with the bulge or greater roundness south of the equator. If the earth should swing square with its axis, the sun always on the equator, it would have to swing down at the north, throwing the North Star higher overhead. All planets have an "equatorial inclination," some more, some less, and we are inclined to the view that the earth will always have for this reason: (Genesis 8:22)—"While the earth remaineth (Ecc. 7:4) seedtime and harvest and cold and heat, and summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease." Should the earth's equatorial inclination be lessened and the rotary speed retarded or quickened would not interfere with the text.—Big Spring Herald.

WIFE LAID TO REST AT THE OLD HOME

After many weeks of intense suffering, death came to the relief of Mrs. Thos. R. Magee, at her home in East Albany, at 7 o'clock Monday evening, October 13th. Her ailment was heart trouble and dropsical affection. All that loving hands could do was done to ease the pain caused by those afflictions.

Funeral services were held at the Christian church in Albany, Wednesday afternoon, conducted by two long-time friends of the deceased, Elders J. D. McClure and J. H. Coffey, and burial was at Highland Cemetery.

With the exception of two or six years spent in Fremont county, Iowa, and a short residence at Pecos, Texas, all of Mrs. Magee's life was spent in this county, the place of her nativity. Her maiden name was Mary Richards, and she was a daughter of James and Millie Richards. She was born in Gentry county, May 13, 1859, her age at the time of her death being 66 years and 5 months. She obeyed the gospel under the preaching of Elder J. H. Magee. Four children were born to them, John T. and James C., having died a good many years ago; Mrs. Deletta Jenkins, of Kingsley, Kansas, and Elder Homer L. MUST PROCURE LICENSE TO HUNT GAME

Under the old law the price of a hunting license was \$1.75, and any one could hunt in the county of his residence or in any county adjoining the same as on land owned and controlled by him; but under the present law any one hunting beyond the boundaries of the county of his residence must procure a license, no matter whether he hunts on his own land or that of another. Fee for the new license is \$2.00.

The following bag limit is printed on the back of the new license:

Three buck deer during the season, from November 1 to December 21, inclusive, each year. Three wild turkey gobblers during the season from March 1 to April 30, inclusive, each year. Fifteen doves in one day from September 1 to December 1, inclusive. Fifteen quail and Mexican pheasants (known as chachalaca) in one day, December 1 to January 31. Twenty-five ducks in one day from October 16 to January 31. Eight sand bill cranes from October 16 to January 31. You are not allowed to kill more than an aggregate of the year, any antelope, mountain sheep, prairie chickens, pheasants, (except Chachalaca), woodcock or woodchuck. You may kill rabbits, hawks, crows, buzzards, owls, English sparrows, rice birds in any numbers and all seasons. You must not buy, sell or barter any wild game or game birds. You must not catch, kill or have in your possession at any one time more than the aggregate of seventy-five ducks, geese, brant, and shore birds. You must not kill any deer or spotted fawn at any time. You must not catch, kill or have in your possession any wild song birds. You must not hunt any kind of wild game at night with any kind of a light or lantern.

ALL U. S. SOLDIERS TO LEAVE FRANCE WITHIN A MONTH

Paris, Oct. 17.—The actual number of American troops now in France is less than 15,000 and is rapidly diminishing. Gen. W. D. Connor, commanding the American troops in France, said today. Within a month, he stated, virtually all the soldiers will be gone, as the task of repatriating the German prisoners is now completed. Only four or five Germans now remain under the charge of the American forces and these are in hospitals. They will be sent home through Coblenz as soon as they can travel.

The work of completing the liquidation of army supplies, squaring accounts and policing of American peace conference headquarters are now the only tasks detaining the soldiers and officers in France, and General Connor said he expected that this liquidation work, too, will be terminated within one month.

All American supplies, including office fixtures and automobiles, are already the property of the French government and are merely being used by the Americans until their task is completed.

Army officials are still working on the settlement of about 7,000 small claims arising from automobile accidents and damage by fire to houses in which Americans were billeted. Those not settled will shortly be turned over in bulk to the French government as a credit against the amount France is to pay for the American supplies.

The army commissary will soon close, since the supplies have all been sold to France, subject to the proviso that the American army be supplied from them until it can close up its affairs.

cupied area of Germany, which are under the command of Maj. Gen. Henry T. Allen and are supplied independently of the Paris offices. Should American troops be sent to France en route to Upper Silesia to supervise the plebiscite there, General Connor will merely direct the movement of the troops across France and they will pass out of his jurisdiction when they reach German territory.

On every side there are indications of the steady termination of the work of the American army in France and probably within three weeks the army automobiles used by the peace conference will be turned over to France, the American soldier orderlies will be withdrawn from the Hotel Colton and all activities of the American government will be handled by civilian officials and employees.

FAMILY OF SEVEN MAKES LONG TRIP ON FIFTY CENTS

Los Angeles, Oct. 18.—The high cost of traveling, including the high cost of traveling, has just arrived here with her six children after traveling from Silver Lake, Ore., a distance of 1,500 miles, at a total expenditure of 50 cents.

Mrs. Bradley lived 28 years in eastern Oregon, having gone there as organist for a band of Baptist missionaries and remaining to marry a rancher and become the mother of six. More than a year ago, she and her husband left home and she has not seen him since. He left behind him an elderly horse and a two-seated carriage, minus a top, but equipped with loose wheels in the wheels.

Finally, in despair at her situation, Mrs. Bradley put her six children, a frying pan and all the family clothing into the carriage, hitched the old horse to it and started for Los Angeles. She had just 50 cents in cash, but much courage.

The day of their departure was May 15, 1919. They made the trip in a little less than four months. LAKE AUSTIN DAM TO BE RAISED AND WATER POWER USED

Austin, Texas, Oct. 18.—The dam impounding Lake Austin will be made higher and provisions for using the waterfall for power purposes, as contemplated in the original plans, will be made, according to C. F. Doebler of New York, who says that he and his associates will take over the dam. Actual work is expected to begin about January 1, as the structure is now in the hands of receivers and the transfer will occasion delay.

Before the old dam washed out in 1900 Lake Austin was one of the leading pleasure resorts of Texas. One international boating regatta with competitors from England, Canada and several other nations present, was held on this lake 25 years ago. Railroads ran regular Sunday excursions to Austin; pleasure craft dotted the lake, and big excursion boats, carrying more than 1,000 persons with the conventional deck dance hall, made runs thirty miles up the lake. Fishing was excellent and through the summer months a small carnival city flourished at the foot of the lake.

There are a number of launches on the lake, which is practically at large as the old one, now. But for several years past the water has been drained from the basin and the boats left in the mud during the summer season. Business houses near the dam either are deserted or used as residences, and the uncertainty over the ultimate disposition to be made of the dam, which is declared by some to be unsafe, discouraged developments along the shore of the new lake.



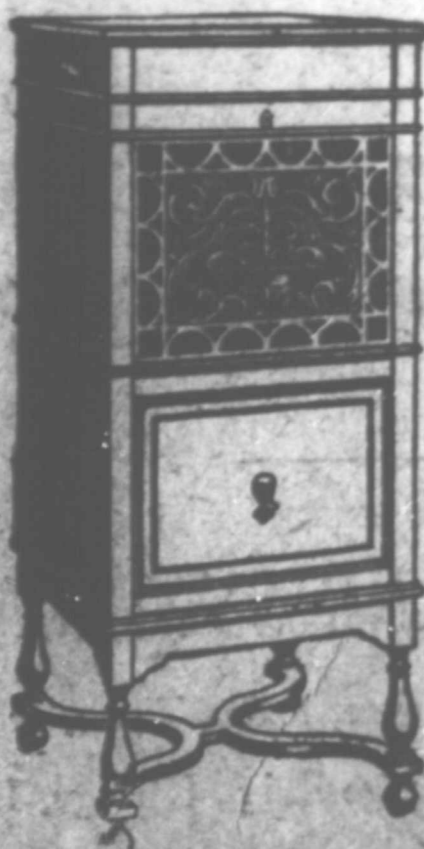
