Opinion is That Limestone Strata Will zens averted what been a serious fire. Produce Abundant Oil.

About 2 a. m. Sunday morning the Laura well passed through the blue shale and entered a limestone formation which has a showing of oil and gas. The editor visited the well Tuesday night and while the bit and slush bucket were both let down, the latter twice, no trace of oil or gas was seen by him, owing to the darkness. Yesterday the editor again visited the well in company with Llew H. Davis of the El Paso Morning Times. The inside 12-inch casing had been drawn to make sure it was all intact, owing to the fact that previously the bit had hung. Finding two joints which were not straight, they were eliminated and by 6 p. m. all but seven or eight joints had been replaced. For the especial benefit of the editor and Judge Davis at this time the slush bucket was lowered and brought forth two turns of slush, each containing distinct traces of oil and a very distinct smell of gas, although about one thousand feet of water stood in the well. This trace of oil and gas was encountered after the bit had entered the lime rock some six feet, the well then standing in water several hundred feet. Had this heavy pressure from above been eliminated it is a safe bet the showing would have been much better and it is believed when this strata, which is now a proved oil strata, is further penetrated it will prove a paying strata of oil in commercial quantity.

The water has proved a menace and the casing was drawn in order to see if everything was intact. Now that it has been replaced and Manager B. T. Biggs is sure it is as good as the best, he believes it will be an easy task to shut off the water in three or four days, when the resumption of drilling will be begun and the oil strata developed.

At about 700 or 800 feet a fine strata of heavy oil was encountered in this well, which was cased off, and the King well started down to develop this strata. This well has been delayed by faulty machinery and overflows of the Pecos River and is now down about 500 or 600 feet.





The following bag limit is printed on the back of the new license:

Three buck deer during the season, from November 1 to December 21, inclusive, each year. Three wild tur-key gobblers during the season from March 1 to April 30, inclusive, each year. Fifteen doves in one day from September 1 to December 1, inclusive. Fifteen gail and Mexican pheasants (known as chacalaca) in one day. December 1 to January 31. Twenty-five ducks in one day from October 16 to January 31. Eight sand bill cranes from October 16 to January 31.

You are not allowed to kill more than an aggregate of the year, any antelope, mountain sheep, prairie chickens, pheasants, (except Chacalaca), woodcock or woodchuck.



reported as of August 22, \$526,401,886.50. The total of \$403,156,646.93, being the receipts from sales reported between January 1 and August 22, represents a recovery of approximately 77 per cent of the original cost of the materials to the government.


