## 40 BUSINESS MEN AND OIL OPERATORS OF DALLAS, TEX., VISIT PECOS AND TOYAH

### HUMBLE'S GEOLOGIST COMING, SAYS BELL

W. E. Pratt, geologist of the Humble Oil company, is expected in Pecos Friday, today, to examine the Ira J. Bell and E. P. Howard holdings in the Pecos fields—and there are representatives of other big interests coming to investigate oil possibilities.

This is the information given out by Ira J. Bell, who brought in the Bell well 22 miles north of Pecos, as he landed from the T. & P. train Thursday afternoon. He had been to New York on important business and the coming of geologist Pratt is a big part of the result of his trip. The report of Mr. Pratt is looked forward to as meaning the entrance of the Humble company into the Pecos-Toyah field for a campaign of development on the Bell-Howard holdings. "I got what I went after," said Mr. Bell.

### RED BLUFF SURVEY MATTER UP MAR. 30

Tuesday, March 30, is the day set for the meeting in Pecos of the executive committee of the Pecos Valley Water Users' Association of Texas, to approve the contract required by the federal government to furnish \$10,000 for a survey of the Red Bluff irrigation project on the Pecos river just north of the New Mexico line. This contract calls for the putting up of the amount stated, which is already subscribed. This survey will be made under the direction of the U. S. Reclamation Service and will determine the feasibility of the project. If found practicable to the satisfaction of the government it is confidently hoped the Reclamation Service will go right ahead with it, and 150,000 acres of Pecos valley lands can be brought under irrigation.

### STRATTON LETS CONTRACTS

The E. L. Stratton interests (Toyah Valley Oil Co.) have machinery on the ground for their well on section 25, block 6-19, school land, in Ward county, awaiting the rebuilding of the derrick which was blown down in a recent storm. It is expected that this well will spud in within the next 30 days.

The Stratton interests have contracted for a well in block 57, township 1, T. & P. lands, in Loving county. The foundation for the derrick is ready and part of the timbers are on the ground.

The same company have let a contract to the Ranger-Pecos Oil Co. for two wells, both deep tests, one in the south part of block C-25, Loving county, and the other in block O, of the G. & M., M. B. & A. survey, in Ward county. M. G. Turner is superintendent of operations.

### PECOS TO HAVE AIRDOME

"Rube" Royce, an El Paso movie man, has just bought the lot just north of the Krauskopf tank factory and will erect an airdome, where the people may see the movies in comfort during the hot weather. It is said that building will start at once. It will also probably be used by the Pecos Athletic Club, an organization effected by T. A. Richardson of El Paso, during the past week. This club will stage boxing events, bringing men from out of town whenever necessary, but using local talent as far as possible, according to Mr. Richardson.

"Batting" Chapiro, the Fort Bliss welterweight, and "Sandpaper" Krause, a local man who fights at about the same weight as Chapiro, will probably be the opening attraction, Mr. Richardson said. These two men met here a month ago and had a hot eight rounds, with honors about even.

### OPENING ROOMS IN M. SOMES BUILDING

H. S. Ross and wife have taken over the M. Somes building in the southwest part of town, which is already partially equipped as a rooming and apartment house, and will complete the equipment and open up business this week as the "Michigan" apartments. They will go to El Paso within the next few days and purchase furnishings.

### STILL PICKING COTTON

"There are still about 1000 acres of cotton unpicked in the Stamford, Texas, region," said W. H. Wright, publicity man of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, when in Pecos the first of the week. "Gins are still running and some of the cotton can never be picked as the growers will have to begin planting this year's crop. Scarcity of labor is the cause of this failure to pick all of last year's crop."

The Dallas business men did not show up 150 strong in Pecos Monday morning, but they did show up about forty live oil men and business men from the biggest city of Texas. "Dallas is interested in Pecos-Toyah oil possibilities," said J. S. Bonner, head of the party, "and a representative bunch of that 150 is here to see that oil we know you have. There were 150 signed up to come but we could not all agree as to time to stay and various details, and so this bunch came now. But there will be more coming, I am sure, from now on."

After breakfast at the hotels and restaurants the party gathered at the Chamber of Commerce where Secretary Sutherland gathered automobiles to take the party out to the Bell well at Dixieland, 22 miles northwest of here. A short three-quarter-hour ride and the party looked with pleased eyes upon the near 40 gravity oil flowing from the pipe.

Uniformly members of the party expressed their delight on seeing the oil and many were the words of confidence expressed in the possibilities of this section as indicated by this first well flowing from two to four barrels every 24 hours from 657 feet. "It is an oil well," said C. D. Speed, oil operator in the Corsicana, Texas, shallow field. "That is high grade oil, too," he continued, "and there is no telling what it may do in the way of production when the pump is put on."

At the well T. Y. Casey, manager of the Pecos Mercantile Co., explained to the guests all the features of the well, its depth, more or less about the log, etc. "A pump was shipped from Los Angeles, Calif., on the 7th inst.," said Mr. Casey; "it is expected any day when it will be installed and then we shall know what the Bell well of the Dixieland Syndicate will show in the way of actual production."

On the return trip the Laura well of the Sunshine Oil Corporation, only seven miles northward from Pecos, was visited. This deep test was not drilling Monday owing to boiler trouble. It was explained that the boiler trouble would soon be repaired, however.

At one o'clock in the afternoon quite a few of the Dallas party took automobiles at the offices of the Chamber of Commerce and went to Toyah and visited the shallow field being developed.

Among the Dallas party other than those named were: O. B. Webb, assistant general passenger agent of the Texas and Pacific railroad; E. P. Porter, R. Clem, president of Clem Lumber Co.; G. E. Lee, E. D. Young, and W. H. Paschal.

"We want to thank the Pecos business men for our royal welcome and their great courtesy," said Mr. Bonner, head of the Dallas party, when leaving. "While we appreciate this oil boom has burst very suddenly upon Pecos, its business men are rising to the occasion in a way that means much for their city. I want to thank all for our welcome, and especially Mr. Casey and Mr. Booth."

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## THE SULLY-SOUTHARD INTERESTS BEGIN BIG DRILLING CAMPAIGN

A big drilling campaign for both deep and shallow oil in the Pecos-Toyah field with one standard rig already shipped to Balmorhea, Reeves county, and two more of the same type enroute, is the program announced this week by Daniel T. Sully of New York, and J. N. Southard of Fort Worth, heads of the Sully-Southard oil interests in Texas, and just beginning in this section.

The foregoing was the announcement made by Messrs. Sully & Southard, who were arrivals at the Hotel Orient Tuesday of this week. With them were their associates, E. J. Olivier, of Houston, Texas, and Judge A. J. Wells, of Lexington, Ky. The last named is attorney for the Sully-Southard interests and will remain here for some time, at least. Nick McDermott is the company's field manager of these interests for the Pecos-Toyah field, and has been on the ground for a short time.

Mr. Sully stated that he would probably build a warehouse at Balmorhea.

The holding corporation of the Sully-Southard interests in Texas is the Burke-Wood Oil and Refining company. Mr. Southard stated Thursday morning that probably a company to cover the holdings and enterprises in the Pecos-Toyah field would be organized. These interests have already taken over the ranch of Joe Seay comprising 28,000 acres of land up by the Rustler mountains in Culberson county and the W. D. Casey ranch of 125,000 acres in western Reeves county and Jeff Davis county.

TO BE FIRST AT IRABEL

Hennings Lumber Company is to be the first concern to open for business in the new townsite of Irabel on the Santa Fe railroad, 22 miles northwest of Pecos. This is an El Paso, Texas, firm and it is said that lumber, principally rig timbers, have been shipped from that city.

According to Dick Collins, writing from Pecos under date of March 20, to the Fort Worth Record, and published in that paper of March 21, Abner Davis of Fort Worth, has invested \$500,000 in the Pecos real estate and oil property last week. "He informed the writer (Collins) that he had invested approximately \$500,000," Collins wrote.

Collins' article in the Record continues as follows: "Abner Davis of Fort Worth will drill 40 acres adjoining the Bell well. Davis has a star rig enroute to the field. He also closed for 20 acres on the Santa Fe where he will erect a refinery. "Davis was the busiest operator in the field (Pecos) last week, securing approximately 4,000 acres. He leased all of section 8, block 54, township 4, T. & P. survey, consisting of 640 acres; also 473 acres in section 8, block 55, township 4, T. & P. survey. This total of 1,113 acres is located south and west of the Bell well and takes in territory on both sides of the Citizens' well, now drilling. Davis, it is said, paid an average of \$200 an acre for this land.

"Davis also leased 3,000 acres surrounding the Zone well which spudded in last week. This acreage is northeast of Pecos. The Fort Worth operator says he paid \$50 to \$150 for acreage around the Zone.

"The Fort Worth plunger also bought a sub-division consisting of 61 lots north of the town, located 200 yards from the Orient hotel, the Waldorf-Astoria of Pecos. Davis believes that if the Bell well stands the acid test, the town of Pecos will spread northward. He intends to start one of his one-man refineries on this sub-division immediately.

"Davis wound up his Pecos campaign by leasing the home of a banker named Parker for three months with an option to buy. Abner has great confidence in the field and expects to make Pecos his operating headquarters."

## PECOS-TOYAH DEVELOPMENT CO. IS COMING INTO REEVES COUNTY WITH THREE BIG WELL RIGS

The Pecos-Toyah Oil Development Co. is a new concern soon to be drilling in the Pecos field with a standard rig which it already owns and two Armstrong rigs to be purchased, and with the backing of the General Engineering & Supply Company of Fort Worth, according to J. W. Travers, president of the former and vice-president of the latter concern. Mr. Travers was in Pecos this week when he organized the Development company and established offices of both companies named with J. L. Stewart in the Mathis building on Oak street, Pecos.

Mr. Travers stated that the Pecos-Toyah Development Co. has taken over about 1,600 acres in the Pecos field in Reeves county, including 60 acres about 12 miles northeast of the Bell well, but in Loving county. There are half a dozen of these tracts some north of the Zone company's well and the Laura well northward from Pecos and southwest of the Citizens Oil Co.'s well. The new company also has one tract west of Toyah in Reeves county and 40 acres in De-Soto parish, Louisiana.

"A deep test and two shallow wells," is the program of the Pecos-Toyah Development Co.," said Mr. Travers. "and we will start work at the earliest date practicable. We

have not selected our drilling sites definitely. Our field manager will be W. R. Langston, now of Ranger and who was one of the head drillers of the Standard Oil company's interests in the Tampico field in Mexico for ten years. J. L. Stewart of Pecos, is one of the company's trustees. H. L. Gaffney, secretary-treasurer of the General Engineering & Supply Co. of Fort Worth, occupies the same position with the Pecos-Toyah Development Co.

"I want to say that I was a pioneer operator in the Coalinga, California field," said Mr. Travers, "and I find the Pecos field very similar to it. I showed a log of the Bell well 22 miles northwest of Pecos, to our Mr. Langston, and he remarked at once the similarity with the logs of wells he had drilled in the Tampico field. I know the Texas fields and I do not hesitate to say that I prefer the Pecos-Toyah field to anything in that state excepting the Stephens county field with its big production, with its great proven worth notwithstanding the heavy cost of drilling. We are certain of an oil sand in the field in Reeves county and that is what oil operators like. When they get the oil in the lime rock they do not know where they are. They understand it when in the sand and can calculate on the chances more definitely."

### EXACT LOG OF BELL WELL MADE PUBLIC

The Dixieland Syndicate, in pursuance of its always open policy regarding the Bell well of that concern which is located 22 miles northwest of Pecos, has given out for publication the exact log of that well. The log follows:

Ten-inch pipe collar shoe babbitted in. Sixty feet of 10-inch pipe with swaged nipple to 8 1-4 inch, the 8 1-4-inch casing to well mouth. Land-8 1-4-inch water shut-off string at 591 feet. Formation shut off. 6 1-4-inch casing anchored at top reaching to 653 feet; 7-inch open hole in sand. It will be noted that oil first showed at 572 feet but was finally brought in in the gravel and sand from 655 to 658 feet.

### 18 TOYAH SHALLOWS SOON TO BE PUMPING

A. A. Stanton, of Toyah, Reeves county, Texas, has 18 shallow wells in that district producing the now famous lubricating oil and he is selling some to the Texas and Pacific railroad at that point. He is getting in pumping machinery and, from a reliable source, it is learned that he confidently calculates on a production of 25 barrels daily from the 18 wells. This is the lubricating oil which commands \$20 and over per barrel just as it comes from the wells.

### DOUBLE WATER RATE, STREET BLACKBOARDS

Council meetings are to be held every Monday night commencing at 7:30 o'clock. This was decided upon at the meeting of that body last Monday night.

Other important business done at that meeting was the doubling of the present water rates and the extension of the fire limits to Fourth street on the south. This extends the limits over the west part of block 30 and the east part of block 33.

The contract for the construction of the new city jail, to cost over \$1000, was approved. H. C. Rawson is the contractor. Work is to be commenced as soon as possible.

The proposition to establish booths on the streets for the vending of cold drinks and such articles was turned down by the council, but the one to allow curb oil stock and lease brokers' blackboards was allowed. Boards of 48 square feet or less will cost \$25 a month, and that is the minimum.

A building permit was authorized for construction by S. E. Johnston and B. Thorsen of a building 25x115 feet on Oak street and north of the Pecos Mercantile Co.'s store. The building is to be occupied by a restaurant run by Messrs. Johnston and Thorsen.

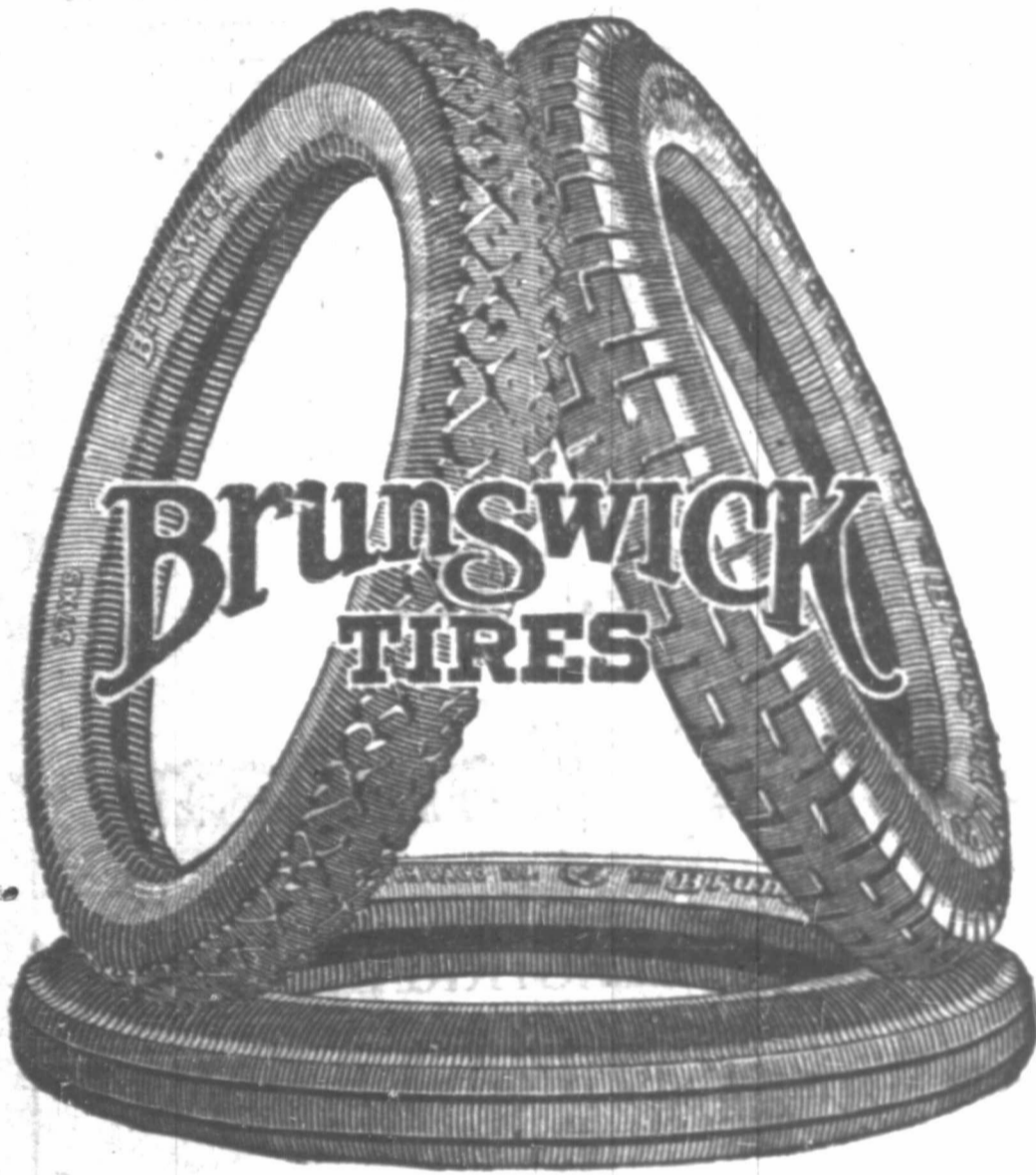

## SUN OIL CO. TO DRILL IN EDDY COUNTY, N. M.

The Sun Oil Co., one of the big oil producing concerns of Texas, is to commence drilling at an early date on more than 50 sections of land which it has acquired in Eddy county, west of the Santa Fe railroad and bordering the Culberson county line of Texas. This was the statement made in Pecos last Monday by C. V. Compton, lawyer and capitalist of Dallas, and who was a member of the party of about 40 business men and oil operators who visited the Pecos and Toyah fields on that day. He said that the information was given him recently by the president of the Sun company. Mr. Compton owns the oil rights on 50 sections in Eddy county along the line of Culberson county. In the same section of Eddy county the Texas company owns over 100 sections. Mr. Compton said that all three of the tracts mentioned were selected for the owners named by J. L. Frederichs, a well known oil geologist of Dallas.

## LAKEWOOD WELL DIDN'T FLOW

From a reliable private source it was learned here last Tuesday that the press report that the Illinois Producing and Refining company well No. 1, at Lakewood, Eddy county, N. M., had flowed oil was incorrect. It appears that there had been a flow of water which carried with it some oil, however. A report is that the company was building a concrete tank, thus indicating that production was expected. The published depth of this well has been given as 2023 feet. The Carlsbad Current of the 19th inst. stated that the well had been bailed out and drilling resumed. This well had been inactive for many months because of the loss of tools in it. The company is also drilling at Dayton, seven miles north from Lakewood.

## THRALL FIELD A FREAK

"Thrall, in Williamson county, Texas, is the freak oil field of the state," said C. V. Compton, of Dallas, who was in Pecos Monday as a member of the party of about 40 business men and oil operators of that city. "Thrall is a freak in this way," he continued, "in that the field occupies but little over 200 acres and probably a million has been spent in trying to find a lead from that small pool. The oil lies from a nondescript stratum, also. The first well brought in was a 1500-barrel producer and many more were brought in and they are pumps to this day."

## STILL MORE CAPITAL

M. P. Carlock, president of the Carlock Leasing Co., announced last Monday that his concern had received drafts from Illinois investors for \$20,000 for 200 acre in section 18, block C-19, four miles north of the Laura well which is seven miles north of Pecos, and that more investments in the Pecos oil field are to follow from the same source in the next few days.

## MODERN RESTAURANT NOW BEING PLANNED ON OAK ST.

About thirty days more will see a nice building completed on Oak street immediately north of the Pecos Mercantile Co. for conducting a first-class restaurant capable of seating 120 people at a time. The building will be 25x115 feet and the dining room will be 25x85 feet. This building is contracted to Maltby, of Pecos, by S. E. Johnston and B. Thorsen, late of El Paso, who will conduct a restaurant business. Mr. Johnston was, until recently, running the Sheldon Cafe in the Sheldon Hotel at El Paso, Texas. Previous to that he was proprietor of the Campus Cafe in Deming while Camp Cody there was occupied as an army training camp during the great war. Mr. Johnston said a name had not yet been chosen for the restaurant here but that it would be a first-class one in every respect, with prices as reasonable as could be under the present cost of food and labor. Messrs. Johnston and Thorsen have leased a nice house for a home for the women help which they will bring here.

## LEONARD LETS CONTRACTS

J. F. Leonard of Pecos, has let two drilling contracts to the Pecos-Toyah Development Co., which has just been organized here. One of these wells is to be drilled 2000 feet if necessary on section 24, Twp. 55-4. The other is to be a deep test with an Armstrong rig on section 32, Twp. 54-4. It is stated drilling is to be commenced under these contracts within 60 days. Both wells are in Reeves county.

It is reported from El Paso that Mayor Chas. Davis is coming out for Bailey as the former is opposed to Thomason's unqualified support of the Wilson administration with its Mexican policy, the extreme centralization of power in the president, etc. Manager Nickels, in summing up Bailey activities, said that about 40 counties had been organized and that by Saturday of this week 150 would have complete organizations. Other general headquarters are to be opened in San Antonio and Houston.

THE PECOS-TOYAH OIL FIELD

A genuine oil boom with real production is anticipated from the development already under way and being contracted in the Pecos valley in Texas and there can be no doubt that expectations are well founded. With the Bell well flowing from two to four barrels at 658 feet and the number of shallow wells in the Toyah field showing, according to the very best information obtainable, from one to five barrels of the highest grade lubricating oil, there is certainly enough evidence of oil to justify the great confidence now felt in the future of the Pecos-Toyah field in this valley.

With numerous deep tests and shallow tests in Reeves, Loving Ward, Pecos, Jeff Davis, Culberson, Brewster, Presidio and even lower counties in the same great valley and contiguous territory, the proving of one of the vast fields should be but a matter of but a few weeks. Here in Reeves county north of Pecos and about Toyah the next two to four weeks seem fraught with most promising development, both shallow and relatively deep.

In the meantime hundreds of men are coming into the entire field, especially into Reeves county about Pecos and Toyah. Throngs are crowding into both towns and the housing problem is a serious one! The county jail in Pecos has been utilized to accommodate visitors (without compulsion). Already plans beyond the tentative stage are being made for new hotels and business places by men willing to back their faith in the virgin oil field.

But is it all faith? We have yet to hear of a geologist's report among dozens who have examined the field outlined or parts of it that has not been encouraging. And all this on top of the fact that has been patent or years that in many places in the Pecos valley in several of the counties named small quantities of oil have been struck in wells sunk for Artesian water or for pumping stock water. This last mentioned fact precludes over a vast area still in the Pecos valley in Eddy and Chaves counties and even farther north in New Mexico. These artificial seeps, so to speak, are believed to come from oil pools or deposits which will yet be discovered. These are the best grounds that a veritable chain of oil pools will yet be proven by the drill from Santa Rosa, N. M., all the way down the Pecos valley to its mouth in the Rio Grande. There is nothing going on at various places between these two points and enterprise and capital are backing faith in the vast valley of the Pecos.

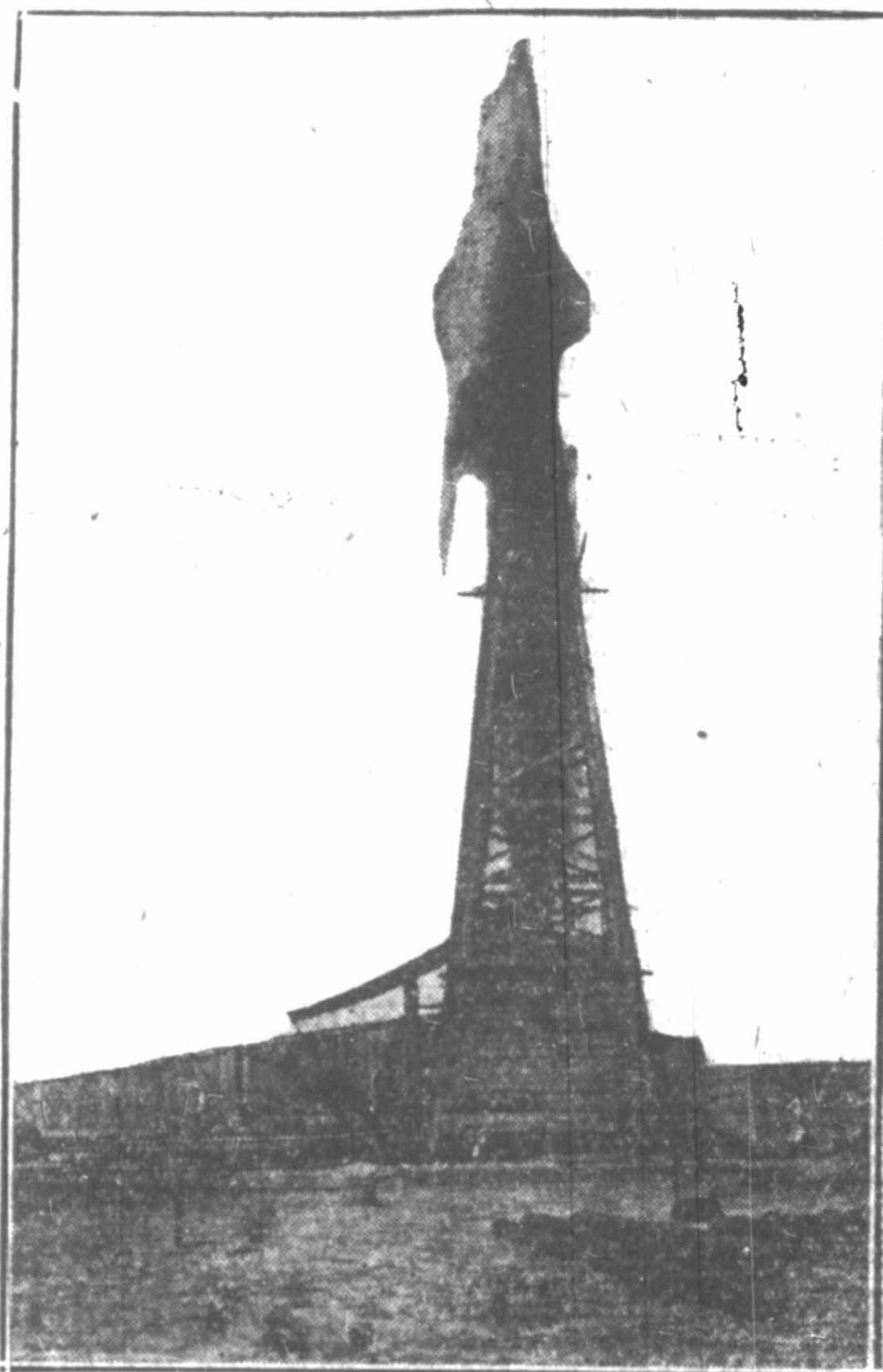

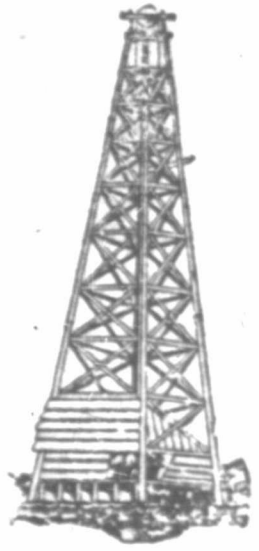

## CHICAGO CAPITALISTS VISIT PECOS-TOYAH, TO DRILL 3800 ACRES

Cyrus H. Drury, at the head of the  
Drury Petroleum Co., with 54,000  
acres of oil lands in various Texas

## PECOS COUNTY OIL DEVELOPMENT NEWS

E. A. (Trapsooter) Reilly and brother, C. E. Reilly, both of Hutchinson county, Kansas, are reported from San Angelo, Texas, as saying that their Reilly well on the H. C. Noelke ranch near Sheffield, Pecos county, Texas, had encountered another vein of salt water at around 3,125 feet after water had been shut off at 3,100 feet, in efforts begun last summer. The Reillys are reported to still have great confidence in striking oil and are not discouraged by the salt water.

The Bethlehem-Texas Oil company spudded in its well a week ago on the Corder ranch 20 miles west of Sheffield. A 20-inch hole was started and 15 1/2-inch casing has already been set. The location is on section 51, block 2, Corpus Christi, San Diego & Rio Grande N. G. Ry. survey.

C. E. Menzie on Sherbicho brothers' ranch, also in Pecos county, was reported as having drilled to 3,750 feet and that work was suspended until casing arrives. It is claimed that oil had been encountered in a number of sands but none have been of any great thickness.

The Circle Oil company on the Haral brothers' ranch was reported to have reached 2,750 feet and that later work had been stopped.

Casing and other materials are being hauled by the Texas-Toy Oil company from Girvin to the White-Baker ranch, where a location has been made on section 11, block Z. The derrick is already up. This is expected to be the next test to be spudded in in Pecos county.

## BRINKLEY P. & R. INVESTIGATE FIELD

The Brinkley Producing and Refining Co., a New York concern operating in northwest Burkburnett, Kemp-Manger field, and in Callahan and Coleman counties, all in Texas, is one of the latest to make investigations of the Pecos-Toyah oil fields. Brinkley, the general manager, after whom the company is named, was an arrival in Pecos Tuesday with his geologist, John Cuilen, of Coleman, Texas, and Len Phillips, scout, to spend some time examining the field, and if any holdings are taken over will probably leave a drilling crew to prepare for operations. Also in the party are Henry M. Zeigler of New York, secretary-treasurer of the company, and his brother, Shafer Zeigler, of Indianapolis.

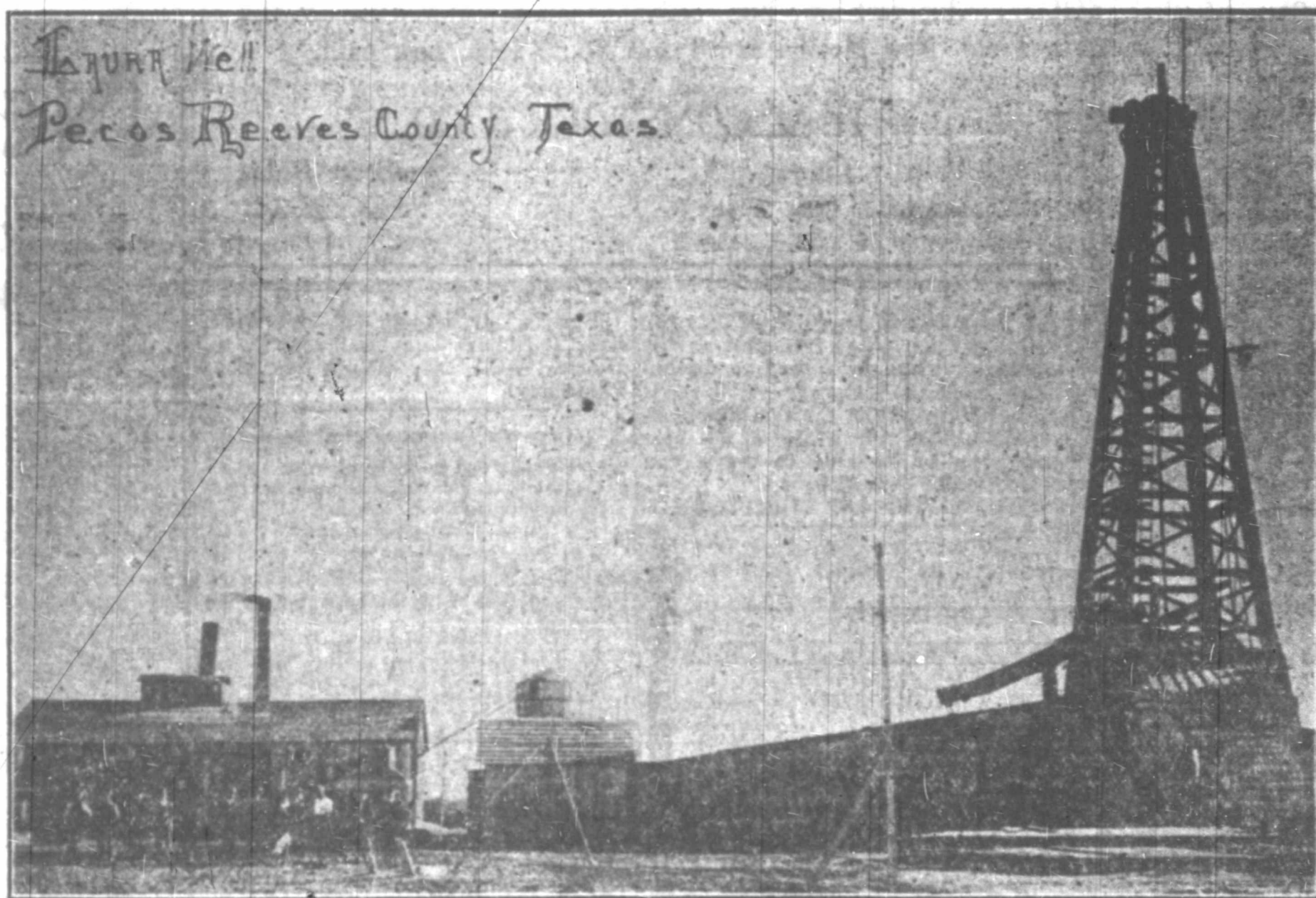

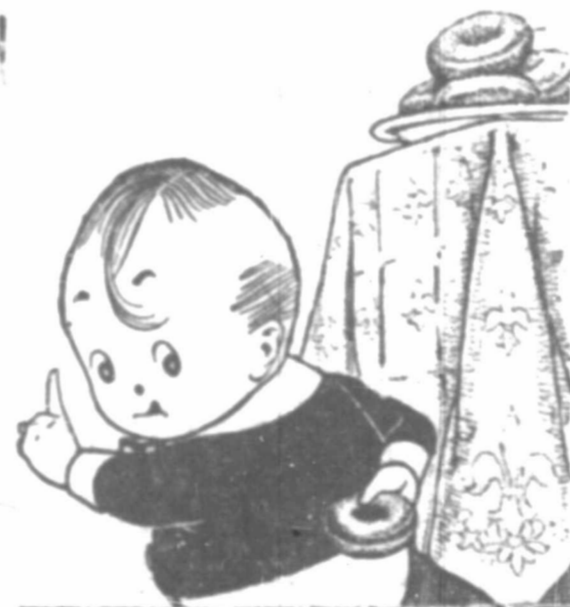

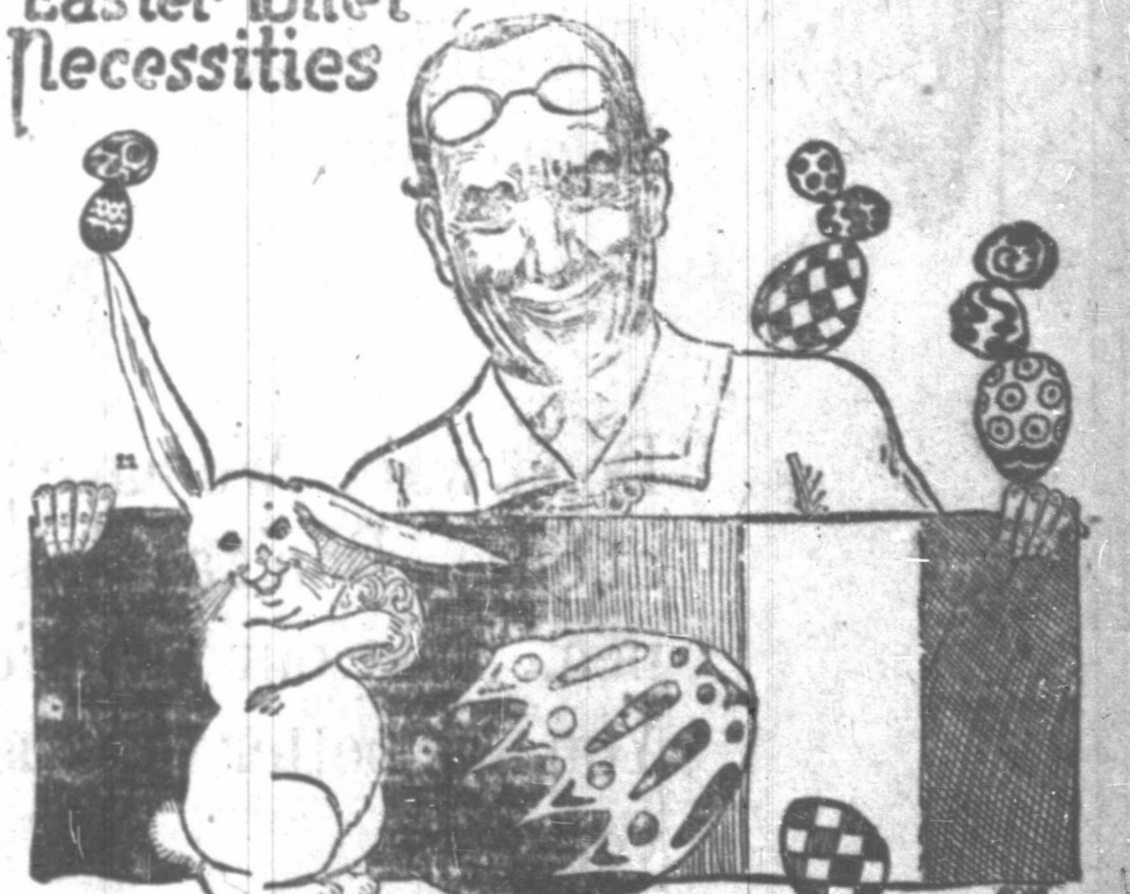
