As to Schools.

P. J. Rutledge, city superintendaent of schools, and Dr. Jim Camp, president of the board of school trustees, briefly outlined the sad educational conditions due to the scarcity of teachers and money for schools. On motion of Dr. Camp, the secretary of the chamber of commerce was instructed to wire the senator and representative from this county and district, asking them to support the bill to appropriate \$5,-000,000 to be prorated among the schools of the state. Of such an amount Pecos would get about \$2. 000. This bill was expected to come up in the legislature today.





the First National bank in St. Louis.) The past week has witnessed several remarkable developments. For the first time in many months the country has been treated to a price reduction in clothing and dress goods at retail. Beginning with a wave of price cutting in Omaha among several department stores the policy spread to many sections of the country. Several reasons have been assigned to this movement. Those most frequently advanced have been the railroad strike and the tight money market. Other factors undoubtedly played their part in this movement. increasing evidence is developing that the general public is beginning to revolt at the abnormal prices asked in many lines.

The stock and bond market also suffered a rather severe decline in the last week; while call money rates did not rise to the abnormal heights reached several weeks ago the market nevertheless experienced a large volume of liquidation. The decline carried many standard stocks such as United States steel to their lowest levels of the year. The entire market at present is close to the bottom for this year to date. Bord prices continue to decline and new offerings are being moved with difficulty and only at prices that yield an excess of 9 per cent regardless of the type of accurity offered.

Producing interests are gradually falling behind not withstanding the stimulus of high crude prices. The available stocks of crude above ground on February 29, 1920, amounted to 125,542,-000 barrels, a supply sufficient to last only from three to four months at the present rate of consumption.

Nor can Mexico be looked to, for the present at least, to make up the crude oil shortage. Imports of crude from Mexico during February, according to government figures, were 4,939,913, barrels, as against 6,293,353 barrels in January, a decrease of 1,353,440 barrels. And Mexico is the only country from which we get crude oil in quantity. Judging from all the evidence at hand, crude oil will neither be cheap nor adequate for some
