



## TEXAS CROP REPORT **UP TO JUNE FIRST**

Houston, Texas, June 16 .-- Wheat has shown a marked advance during the month. The present condition is 80 per cent of normal, which is equivalent, on June 1st, to a yield of 13.76 bushels per acre calculated upon the preliminary December estimate of acreage, (the only figures at present available), and excluding abandonment, a production of 13,333,000 bushels is in prospect from 969,000 acres. In the plains area the crop is generally

in good condition and though the straw is short the quality of the berry is good. In the black land belt a much better crop will be harvested than was generally expected.

The oat acreage is estimated to be 70 per cent of 1919 or 1.575,000 acres. Though conditions in the Panhandle are quite satisfactory the central and north central parts of the state, which represents the bulk of the acreage, are not so well favored and the figure is placed at 63 per cent normal. This is equivalent to a yield of 23.31 bushels and forecasts a production of 36,713,000 bushels under present conditions. Unsatisfactory spring weather conditions of excessive wet, then drouth and lateness of the season have contributed to this reeult.

Barley acreage is 20,000 acres and represents 81 per cent of the 1919 acreage. With a condition of 76 per cent a yield of 23.56 bushels per acre and a production of 471. 000 bushels is forecast.

Alfalfa acreage is 97 per cent of last year. This decrease is caused largely by ncreased planting of cotton and other crops in the Pecos and other sections of West Texas.

All fruits were severely injured by the reeze of April 4. Peaches are but 18 per cent of normal. This indicates a production of 514,000 bushels for the state.


Pears are 28 per cent of normal forecasting a production of 120,000 bushels.

Apples are 42 per cent of normal, forecasting a production of 271,000 bushels. The condition of blackberries is 69 per cent or normal.

Pasture and range conditions are excellent. The abundance of rain this month has assured ample fall pasture and water. with prospects for a favorable winter growth.

Fields Extended.

Extensions of the Stephens county fields and the north central Texas fields lying in Wichita county are responsible for much of the increase in Texas. A large number of big new wells were brought in and the field enlarged considerably.

Oklahoma likewise experienced an enlargement of the various fields. The same was true of Kansas and Louisiana, many good new wells being brought into completion.

Increases for Week.

During the week just ended the fields of the Mid-Continent showed an agreeable increase in line with increasing developments. The extensive campaign of wildcating now in progress has not yet begun to bear fruit but when this happens an extraordinary jump is looked for. Ranger about held its own with

30,815 barrels, a slight decline from 31,845 barrels. Desdemona was off better than 300 barrels, with 13,295 barrels daily production. Burkburnett was up 4,000 barrels at 84,000. Iowa Park increased 100 barrels. The K-M-A field is still largely unconnected with pipe lines but its production is now around 5,000 barrels daily.

Breckenridge made the most notable gain with 49,405 barrels as against 44,490 barrels for the previous week.


Oklahoma's production was 154,900 barrels while that of Kansas was 99, 000 barrels.

Counting in the Gulf costal fields the total Texas production for the week was 266,456 barrels, greatly in excess of the total production of other states in the Mid-Continent field and an increase of 37,388 barrels over the mark of the previous week.

More Gains Looked For. The story has just begun to be told. There are more wells nearing completion in the Mid-Continen fields than there are producing wells. When these wells are finally brought in, production can be expected to take a big jump. But it is not going to jump enough. Statisticians have figured that if every well now drilling comes in a good average producer there will still be an enormous over-demand for all crude oil and its products. This insures a constantly increasing price for this product and makes oil a better buy than ever before in the hisstory of investments.

## FOOD AND DRUG LAWS SET FORTH IN ORDER

Joe Jayne and W. R. Davis, from the department of food and drug inspection at Austin, Texas, were in Pecos this week making a tour of the city, investigating the hotels, cafes, restaurants, drug stores and other business places where food and drugs are sold.

According to ruling number 10, section 2. of the Texas food and drug law. "declares an article of food to be adulterated if it consists in whole or in part of a filthy food. The same section defines the word filthy as follows: The term filthy shall be deemed to apply to food not securely protected from flies, dust, dirt, and as far as may be necessary from all foreign or injurious contaminations."

It is clear from this section of the law that fruit vendors, vegetable peddlers and sidewalk dealers cannot sell food exposed to flies, manure dust of the streets or other contaminating influences.

Section 8 reads: "Whosoever shall do any of the acts or things prohibited, or wilfully neglect to do any of the acts or things enjoined in this act, or in any way violate any of its provisions, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$200.

The inspectors made one arrest while in the city and advise that upon their return if their orders are not complied with to the dot they will close up the next house they catch here not complying with the law.
