The company is now renewing contracts with the individual users at the rates harged by the company which previously perated the plant. About fifteen new ustomers have so far signed up for cur-

The company has offered to make a free inspection of all wiring in houses before the current is turned on if requested. This offer is made as a protection against fire.

From this it is clear that we have done, through commercial channels, exactly what European economists have urged upon us-we have sold goods to Europe on credit. The amount involved is amazing, because we have done more than advance the sum of the two loans advocated by Keynes. The unfunded debt of Europe to the United States on Sept. 15, consisting largely of commercial accounts, was in the neighborhood of \$3,500,000,000.




