



> "That as planting time approachees evidence is overwhelming that only a greatly reduced cotton production in 9121 will prevent futher disaster. Moreover, if the end of April shows no substantial reduction in acreage the price of cotton will probably suffer a further decline, and producers and creditors alike will be compelled to accept a further loss on the production of 1920. On the other hand, if the acreage reports shows sharp reduction we may hope for an advance in the price of the cotton still unsold. Therefore, if we would recover any part of our 1920 losses we must reduce cotton acreage by at least one-third. Not to do so is to bring bankruptcy upon the agriculture and commerce of the entire

Therefore be it resolved: First-

Cotton Belt. "It is the hope of the Farm Bureau Federation to set up a system of cotton marketing that will eliminate waste and graft, but its efforts will come to nothing if it is confronted with the task of selling 4,000,000 bales of cotton more than the world is willing to buy or able to consume. Co-operative marketing, to be successful, must be based upon co-operawithout regard to our neighbors and then expect by co-operative selling to obtain profitable prices. We must act as a unit in both production and marketing. 

# OF GREAT IMPORTANCE

Development Of Power And Irrigation Is One Of Most Important Problems In State.

John Sneed, staff correspondent of the Dallas News, has written the following article which at this time will be of interest to Enterprise readers:

Rain water, sreek water and storm water which in some parts of the State is regarded almost as an affliction at certain seasons of the year, is being made the subject of scientific research and legislation this year at Austin. Wise men and lawyers from the West are giving deep study to measures intended for its conservation and distribution and studious engineers are making estimates of the possible supply per annum in various locali-

Steps are being taken by Legislators to engraft into the irrigation statute the provisions that surface waters, including that streams and that which falls from the louds into watersheds, is public property, designed for irrigation or other purposes. It was so declared a few years ago by a constitutional amendment.

Water, which in the Mississippi Valley, is regarded as a menace and upon which millions have been spent by the Federal Government to protect the people from floods and overflows, has long since become a commodity of great intrinsic value in the arid and semi-arid regions of West Texas and when properly harnessed is conceded to be a rival of oil as a producer of wealth. For by proper conservation and application of the water many of the river valleys that have been so dry and unproductive for hundreds of years that a crow flying over them would have to carry rations, or a jack rabbit galloping across them would kick up the dust, have been converted into gardens of fruits, flower vegetables and staple crops and the sites homes and farms.
