Our last information was that all but six states had joined the federation and that three of the six were expected to come in immediately.

In most organizations of quick growth flighty members put flighty people in the places of leadership, with the result that the whole movement is soon discredited among sane people. Not so with the American Farm Bureau Federation. Its officers and managing committees are all men of solid substance and correct judgment, and as a result you may look for great things from this forceful body of agriculturists.

This newspaper is now a franchise member in a national editorial service which has an expert reporter in close touch with the farm bureau federation chiefs, and we expect that our enterprise in this direction will keen our readers informed constantly on the large movements of the farm hureau federation. .

### FRESHMAN HISTORY

(From The Whirlwind)

It is frequently stated that class history repeats itself, but this statement 's not altogether supported by is lower than the lower because it is facts as many historians have found higher. You can have the lower if to their sorrow. As the task of writing the class history has fallen to me, I will relate some of the experiences of the Freshman class of 1921.

In the fall of 1913 a majority of the present class entered the first grade, as members for the first time of the Pecos Public School. Mrs. Henderson was our teacher and we were taught the three R's which were the foundations for the higher.

In the second grade we were taught by Miss Lena Cole, and in the third grade we were taught by Mrs. Yarbrough, and after we had survived many queer punishments we passed into the fourth grade, where we were taught by Mrs Cole. 




