SPRING MOVEMENT OF CATTLE HEAVY

San Angelo, Texas, April 4.-What is expected to be the heaviest spring movement of cattle from West Texas since before the drouth, if not in ten years, began Friday and Saturday will be gone, and we juniors looming with the shipment from Monument, on a new threshold. T. C. Rutledge, inspector for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, announced Saturday that 900 cars have been ordered for use on the Orient Railroad between Alpine and San Angelostretch of 227 miles-while the Santa Fe will use 150 cars in transferring herds from points between Sterling City and Paint Rock. These 1,050 cars will carry an average of thirty animals to the car, or 31,500 head.

Ivey Johnson of Ardmore, Ok., on Friday shipped thirty-four cars of aged steers, 997 head in number, over the Orient from Monument to Scullin, Ok. The cattle had been pastured in Irion County for several months.

James Callan of Menard, a former president of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, consigned ten cars of 3-year-old steers from this city to Blackland, Ok., over the Santa Fe. There were 242 animals in the ship-

Marvin M. Douglas of San Angelo, formerly of Ardmore and a partner of Ivey Johnson, shipped five cars of aged steers, 150 head in number, form San Angelo to Scullin, Ok., over the Santa Fe. These cattle had been pastured on J. Willis Johnson's ranch, near the old Fair Grounds, east of the city.

About one-half the cattle to be shipped from this territory during April and May were brought here for the winter from the Middle West, the other half represent cattle that were purchased here last fall by outof-the-State buyers for spring delivery. All the stock is in fine shape due to the excellent range, and will require but little feeding before going on the market.






