Everything was going lovely with the drillers at this hole Thursday morning, when the cable snapped at about 100 feet above the drill stem, and a fishing job of indefinite duration loomed upon the horizon of the crew. Beginning at early dawn to fish the tools out, the job was completed at nine o'clock last evening, and everything is lovely today with a brand new cable hoisting and dropping the ponderous bit with rhythmic regularity. WILLOUGHBY NO. 1

The Willoughby No. 1 well on the Cowan ranch in Southwest Reeves county, is drilling close to 500 feet in dark shale of lime, ranging from a few inches in thickness to two feet thick are being encountered every few feet. The lime is believed to be of the Permian age and these many thin strata are taken as good indications of a reasonably shallow production by the management. Mr. Willoughby, president of the

company is studying the formations closely and is sending every change condition to the U. S. Geological Department at Washington, D. C., and to Dr. Udden of the Bureau of Reconomic Geology, Austin, Texas. Mr. Willoughby and driller W. M. Hopper, are very much elated with the formation and declare that the combined favorable geological indications have the ear markings of an oil field.

The old saying that proof of the pudding is in the eating, is found in a most recent demonstration of three growers of livestock and farms products in this section, in the shipment of three carloads of lambs to the Kansas City market by Sol Mayer, C. M. Honaker and J. W. B. Williams, the results of which were obtained and furnished The Enterprize by one of the Valley's biggest boosters.

These gentlemen grazed and fed alfalfa to lambs for a period of 900 days, using their own hay, which they figured at \$20.00 per ton, and marked increase you will note from the prevailing market offering for this staple product. The lambs= made an average gain of 9 pounds per head for 30 days, or 27 pounds for the 90-day period.

The lambs brought on the Kansas City market last week from \$12 to-\$12.75, and after all costs of the process of feeding and marketing was deducted, a net sum of \$2.00 per head was realized.

In the shipment Mr. Mayer hac ? 930 head, C. M. Honaker furnished. 960 head, while Mr. Williams sub-r plied 458 of the consignment. Thefirst named gentleman now has 275 head of cattle on feed.

The discovery of potash in samples of salts recently received at the United States Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, from new wells bored for oil at two additional localities in Western Texas extend. COTTON GROWERS ASKED TO KEEP COST OF PRODUCING CROP

Hon. Geo. B. Terrell, state commissioner of agriculture, writes The Enterprise a letter in which he urges the cotton growers of Texas. to keep accurate records of the cost of producing the staple upon their farm, to the end that a correct knowledge may be had as what it should command in price when sold. The letter is so timely, that this paper takes pleasure in reproducing it in full, as follows:

To the Cotton Growers of Texas: The last two cotton crops have sold below the cost of production. No business enterprise can stand when forced to sell its products for less than cost. Farming is the biggest business enterprise in the State. It is a sure business barometer, measuring the success or failure of all other business enterprises.

It should be placed on a sound business basis, and to do this it is necessary to find the average cost of production, so that money crops especially cotton, may be sold upon a cost, plus basis, as the prducts of all manufacturing plants are sold. I want two or three thousand farmers to keep the cost of producing cotton this season, as they did last year, and report to me upon blanks to be furnished by this department.

Enter every item of cost upon a day book, from the time the breaking of land begins until the cotton is laid by. These items must include cleaning up the land, breaking, harrowing, bedding, planting chopping, beeing and cultivating at current wages paid in other lines of work, and must include soil depreciation, taxes and interest on the

I will furish blank forms upon application, to be filled out, and re turn to this office when the erop is

In order to be able to price the crop we must know the cost of production, and in order to sell for the cost of production and a profit, the farmers must make the farms selfsupporting and make the cotton a surplus crop, and be able to enforce the demand for a cost plus price. I hope to have co-operation of other states in this matter.

Raise less cotton, and more to eat.



The Enterprise editor is reminded time and again by such letters as the above that he must be marking up a fair batting average in most of the essential points of service, which leads us to remark at times that if Pecos business men would only grasp the possibilities of this medium of publicity for their own business, the town and the section at large, there is not the least doubt that it would bring back two dollars for every one invested with it. The editor of the Enterprise is often put to the necessity of making excuses for the lack of advertising patronage on the part of local business concerns, by saying that it is "between seasons," or that the sun shines too long or that it does not shine enough, that it is too dry or that it is too wet, that it is too hot or that it is too cold, or that they are letting the mail order houses flood their trades' territory with advertising literature and are kept so busy reading the seductive offerings themselves that they really haven't time to write an ad, or that they have lived so long and so closely to the Mexican border that they have just fallen into the habit of kidding themselves by putting everything off to the manana of tomorrow.

Occasionally some fellow bobs up from abroad, like the one whose letter was published in the paper last week, who writes the editor a personal letter to know if really there is more than one bank, one garage or a place to eat if he were to visit the town between trains, which information he has been unable to gather from reading his paper, and the editor, strong in upholding the integrity of home institutions writes in to the inquirer that Pecos is really an imposing trade center for a territory as large as some states, both retail and wholesale. W. A. HUDSON FOR DISTRICT JUDGE

In the announcement column of The Enterprise will be found the name of W. A. Hudson, who is an aspirant to the office of district Judge for the 70th judicial district, comprised of Reeves, Loving, Ward, Winkler, Ector, Crane, Midland, Martin, Glasscock and Andrews counties.

Judge Hudson has been engaged in the practice of law for the past twenty years, with fifteen years of this time spent actively in this district. He has lived in Pecos during that time and has come to be such a familiar figure in the social and professional life of the city, that no introduction is necessary from this paper to local people. The Judge studied law in the attorney general's office when Chas. Culberson, present United States senator from Texas, was incumbent.

The Pecos attorney points out in his announcement, that owing to the distribution of political favors, the 70th district has from its formation been presided over by timber from the eastern end of the district, first in the appointment of Judge S. J. Isaacks, followed by the appointment of the present incumbent, Ferguson, when the former retired. Judge Hudson suggests to the electorate of the district that all things being equal in the matter of timber offered for the bench this time, the west end should be given the preference in its candidate. The Judge further submits that the west end of the district, comprised of Reeves, Loving, Ward and Winkler counties have about one-half of the voting strength of the district, and that there is more litigation in Reeves other counties combined.
