Evidence in corroboration of the story of Mrs. Rawls was given by M. A. Thornberry, a neighbor, who rode up to the scene of the killing just after the shot was fired, and in denial by Miss Ola Mae Meadors, 16-year-old sister of the boy de

Miss Meadors' story conflicted with that told by Mrs. Rawls in that she declared that early in the day of the shooting, her father was attacked by Rawls and his wife, and denied that her father fired a shot at Rawls as related by the widow on the stand earlier in the day.

Miss Meadows also declared that the fatal shooting occurred after Rawls had loosened his hands and attacked father, and that William Meadors going to the assistance of his father with a pai of wire pliers, struck Rawls from behin several times.

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MANUFACTURERS NOW USING APPLES TO

THE LAST SEED The thoroughness with which the apple is now worked over and utilized by some manufacturers makes it comparable with the packing-house pig that leaves only a futile squeai The apple is not transformed into such a variety of products as the pig, but all are useful, and when the last of the series has been made hardly a smell is left.

In many of the apple-using factories the apples are first pressed to produce cider, which may be sold as such or may be manufactured into vinegar. After thorough pressing the pomance is treated with hot water to remove the pectin, which, after purification, is sold in either liquid or solid form to manufacturers of jelles and similar products and to house-wives. The much wast ed and squeezed residue is dried, ground, and sold as cattle feed.

'On Friday, June 9, October cotton ran up to 22.25 cents a pound. Fifteen cents is the lowest at which that future in this crop has sold; in April its lowest was 16.86, and by the first of June it had reached 19.95 cents, These increases mean nothing less than a belated realization that the supply of cotton this situation is in the making.

CAREFUL CROSSING

CAMPAIGN NOW ON

Under the ausnices of the American Railway Association, there was inaugurated on June 1st, and to be continued until Sepember 30th, 1922, a "careful crossing campaign" its slogan being "cross crossings" cautiously". This has for its purpose the prevention of or reduction in the number of highway crossing accidents involving railroad trains, vehicles and pedestrians, throughout the country.

Co-operation in the plan has been as sured by the United States Automobile Chamber of Commerce, the National Highway Traffic Association, National Safety Council and numerous other organizations.

Such a campaign is necessary and timely, as shown by the following facts: In thirty years our country's population increased 345 percent in fatal and 652 percent in injury cases. In 1920 automobiles were involved in 76 percent of all crossing accidents. During that year 1,791 persons were killed and 5,077 injured. Of the latter number 116 died subsequently from injuries

There are, two ways to reduce or entirely stop such accidents. The first in the public mind is, elimination of the crossings. This is impossible. There are 251,939 highway crossings on class I railroads alone (railroads with revenue of over \$1,000,000 annually) in the United States. Of this number 399 were eliminated during 1919. At the same rate of elimination it will take 629 years to dispose of these crossings if no more are added. All the men and money available would not be sufficient to remove the crossings in a life time.

Conservative estimates of the average cost of elimination fixed the figure at approximately \$50,000 per crossing. This means \$13,000,000.

It is evident the immediate question 67 percent. They have us captured now. We want them capture everybody else, and let everybody pay tribute to their greatness and to their grandeur.

Current trade of the United States with South America is more uniform in distribution and shows a better undertone -than for some time. Balance ever since the commencement of the present fiscal year has been favorable to South

In April, 1922, all the leading South America countries showed an export balance against the United States except Argentine and Uruguay. The adverse Argentine balance was not much more than \$1,000,000; that of Uruguay, less than \$400,000.

America has increased imports of South American unrefined copper from Peru, but has bought less than half the amount imported from other South American countries in 1921. Tonnage of calfskin is much heavier than a year ago, that of cat tle hides a little less. Receipts of Peruvian cotton are 40 per cent larger. Coffee imports are a fifth less. An important movement has developed in Argentine furs. Receipts of the more costly industrial metals are double those of a year

Ten months' imports fell \$216,-000,000 or not much less than 50 per cent under a year ago. The deeline is thus far greater in dollars than tonnage. Against this decrease American exports contracted \$336,children given every Wednesday at severest of all declines except that in our much smaller trade with

Compared with a year ago exports of condensed milk are one-half less; of leather manufactures 86 per cent less; of leaf tobacco 60 per cent less; aggregate of cotton goods approximately 10 per cent less, Coal exports to Argentine, Brazil and Chile do not run 25 per cent of last year's tonnage. There has been a less but substantial decline in mineral off sales. Losses in exports of basic steel products run from a third to a half of the 1921 tonnage and to greater decreases in shipments of steel rails and barbed

INTERESTING ITEMS IN PECOS COUNTY

OIL DEVELOPMENT Though to the casual observer there is very little interest being manifested in the development of oil in Pecos county at this time, there is still definite signs of "pulse beats." Lease brokers state that there have been inquiries for considerable tracts of large acreage during the past few days and they feel that there is evidently some hope that drilling will be revived to something like its former activity.


