

## CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN AND FIRE- PREVENTION WEEK

In order to make this campaign a success, we are asking the co-operation of every citizen in Baird. The Third Year Home Economics Department of Baird High School is sponsoring this Clean-up-Campaign in connection with Fire Prevention Week. We know that every citizen is interested in the welfare of our town and we are not hesitating to call on you to help us.

We have divided up the town into districts of four city blocks each and have given each district a number. A general chairman has been appointed for each district and he will be assisted by members of the Home Economics Classes.

The block chairman will investigate property which has not been cleaned up in his own district and will notify owners of our campaign.

The city is unable to furnish wagons to haul trash free of charge but on Thursday and Friday, October 13, and 14th there will be wagons provided, available to haul trash. Since many people do not have the money, but have canned goods put up during the summer months, we suggest that you notify your chairman and his helper whether or not you want your trash hauled. If the chairman has a complete list of these people who want trash hauled, then the list can be given to those in charge. Please be sure to pay the minimum equivalent of 25 cents in money, or canned goods to chairman when you give him your name. Your chairman is in your neighborhood and needs your help. Please report not later than Tuesday, Oct. 11th.

### To The Citizens And Property Owners Of Baird

Did you know that 90 per cent of all fires could be prevented? It's a fact! By removing the fire hazard you not only protect your own property, but you also protect your neighbor's property as well. Now, what is fire hazards? The worst one we have at present is the rank growth of weeds around your house, on vacant lots, and in the alleys. The fire department (of which I am a member) will answer your call for help at any time, but it is easier to fight the fire before it starts than to wait until your house is burning. Remember that every fire loss will affect our good fire record and will increase your fire insurance. So let's fight the fires before they start and save the loss.

Another fire hazard is burning trash and rubbish at night or late in the afternoon. You say it burns better after the sun has shone on it all day. Sure. But so will your house, or your neighbor's house or barn burn better after the sun has shone on it all day. So why take a chance? Burn your trash in the morning or at noon. Then you have all the afternoon to watch for the stray sparks that might be blown by the change of the wind under your, or your neighbor's house or barn.

Another fire hazard is your electric wiring. Have it inspected by an electrician, one who knows whether it is safe or not. And never use larger than 20 amp. fuse plugs.

Your chimneys and flues are other fire hazards. Have them inspected for cracks and breaks.

As I have said before, the easiest way to fight fire is before it starts. So let's all pull together and fight our fires by REMOVING THE FIRE HAZARDS.

William Thomas Carter was born July 7, 1842 at Dalton Ga., was married to Elizabeth Cunningham Aug. 23, 1876. Samuel Elias Webb was born Feb. 25, 1850 and died at his home northwest of Baird Oct. 1, 1932. Mr. Webb was the oldest son of Britain R. and Martha J. Webb. There were five children; two brothers, A. G. Webb and B. R. Webb, Jr. and two half-sisters, Sue and Maggie Webb, all have preceded Uncle Sam in death. Mr. Webb was born in Mississippi but came to Texas when he was a young man. He and Miss Martie Nelson were married in Baird on March 7, 1893. They have lived in or near Baird ever since.

Uncle Sam was a charter member of the Baird Methodist Church and served it consistently for 45 or 50 years as long as his health would permit. Five years ago Mr. Webb had a stroke of paralysis and his health has never been good since. Sunday Sept. 25th he suffered the third attack and his death resulted. He was a good man and the influence of his strong christian character will live on and be felt in the lives of his associates.

He is survived by his wife, two sons, Edmund Webb, of Baird; Frank Webb, of Abilene and one daughter, Mrs. J. E. Malin of Amarillo, Texas. All were at his bedside when he died. One son, Henry Webb and an infant daughter, Lucile awaited him on that Heavenly Shore. Sixteen grand-children also survive him.

## BAIRD BEARS WIN FIRST GAME OF THE FOOTBALL SEASON

### City Officials Take Penalty and Interest Off Of City Tax

It is human nature to look for bargains. The city administration, deeming this time to be a great opportunity of giving the Citizenship of Baird the bargain awaited, have in their wisdom granted those who are delinquent with their taxes a chance to pay the same without penalty and interest as per resolution adopted on Sept. 28th, 1932, at a regular meeting of the Council (read resolution below). This action was had by the administration solely of serving you and at the same time to help to save a considerable sum and relieve you of this additional burden. And while paying your taxes it will help the City to meet its pressing obligation now due. We especially call your attention also to the fact that the Valuation of Property has decreased as shown on records as follows: The Tax Roll of 1929 was \$1,043,780.00; 1930 Roll \$994,530.00; 1931 Roll, \$922,633.00 and 1932 Roll, \$815,311.00.

When fully considered by you, it also saves you a great deal by smaller tax payment and thereby reduces the income to the City. In appealing to you as well as urging you to assist us and enable us to meet and pay off outstanding indebtedness promptly. This can only be accomplished by your assisting us. My confidence in you is the same as in the past, fully believing and express my hope that you will heed this appeal. Remember in asking you for help that it is for the City's welfare and it's good credit. We have not failed in the past to pay promptly and we cannot fail now. Do not wait to the last minute, but come as promptly as possible, as money is needed now very badly.

Assuring you of my deep appreciation for past favors and on behalf of the Council, I thank you.

### RESOLUTION

Whereas the delinquent Tax Law passed at the late special-session and approved by the Governor and whereas the Cities were included, giving them the right to waive penalties and interest on all delinquent taxes, even though optional with the Cities who care to adopt said law and whereas the City of Baird wishes to be of assistance to the people of Baird, relieving them of the burden by waiving said penalties and interest. Therefore:

"Resolved by the City Council in regular session assembled September 28, 1932, to waive payments of penalties and interest on all past delinquent taxes, provided that the payments of said delinquent taxes be paid by December 31st, 1932. And provided further that those desiring to take advantage of the above must pay the regular 1932 Tax by January 1st, 1933."

The above resolution is approved this the 28th day of September 1932.

The Baird High School Bears won their first game this season Friday afternoon by defeating Olden High School 50-0. Playing heads up football and featuring long end runs and off tackle plays the Bears completely smothered the Olden team.

Judson Atchison, half-back, was one of the outstanding stars. Numerous times he swept through the Olden line and into a broken field for long runs. He scored five of the eight touchdowns and kicked two goals.

G. Lambert, full-back and sensational line plunger, showed great football. He started the tallying in the early part of the game. Lambert was injured in the fourth quarter and had to be withdrawn. Olden tried hard but had a small chance against the more powerful Baird team.

Atchison started his scoring in the early part of the second quarter when he went off left tackle and galloped down the field for sixty-five yards and a touch-down. Lambert plunged through the center of the line for his two touchdowns. Satterwhite, substitute halfback, scored the last tally in the fourth quarter after they had been successful in carrying the ball deep into Olden's territory.

Baird carried the ball fifty-three times for three hundred and eighteen yards. Made nine first downs. Punted one time for thirty-five yards.

Olden carried the ball twenty-two times for fourteen yards. Made one first down, punted four times for ninety-eight yards. Tried two passes and completed one.

  3. Don't let oily rags or dry waste accumulate in a pile or in a corner.
  4. Burn any rubbish in a spot where there is no danger of spreading.
  5. Have electric wiring inspected regularly and repair when necessary. Watch it carefully.
  6. Don't use benzine, kerosene or naphtha for cleaning purposes.
  7. Keep your chimney and heating system clean and in perfect working condition.
  8. Keep your children beyond the reach of any kind of fire. Keep matches and fire beyond the reach of children.
  9. Do not leave camp fires anywhere before they are wholly extinguished.

**Baptist General  
Convention**

The Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas meeting in Dallas, Sept. 13, voted to change the date for the meeting of the Baptist Convention from November 9 to November 16. The Convention voted last year to meet in Abilene in 1932.

Plans were completed for the raising of \$600,000 for missions and benevolences by means of the Every-member CaCnass Campaign now in progress among the 490,000 Baptists of Texas. Dr. J. Howard Williams, Executive Secretary of the Board, was placed in charge of the campaign, and he has appointed seven teen organizers in as many districts representing every portion of Texas. The campaign will continue until October 30. The final week, October 23-30, is designated as pledge week at which time every Baptist in the state will be solicited for a pledge to the \$600,000 fund.

The money raised by this campaign is to be used by the Baptist for their work of missions and benevolences; every Baptist institution is to share in the funds, whether it is in Texas, in China or elsewhere. The proportion of the funds to go to each institution will be worked out at the meeting of the State Convention to be held in Abilene November 16.

**Will Award Many  
Prizes In Contest**

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 30—A total of 157 special prizes will be awarded to mandmasters, soloists and members of bands playing in the statewide contest to be held at the 1932 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 8 to 23, it has been announced here by Col. E. D. Irons, superintendent in charge of the contest. These prizes will be in addition to awards of \$1,000 in cash and \$400 for the first and second prize winning bands, and also in addition to the awards of loving cups which will be awarded the winning band in each class.

The band contest will be in progress throughout the 16 day exposition Col. Irons has announced here that at least 100 bands are expected to compete in the contest and that more than fifty entries had already been received.

In addition to playing in the contest, competing bands will be presented in individual and massed band concerts. The massed band concerts will be held each evening under the direction of Karl L. King, one of the most famous of all living band masters and composers. Mr. King judged in the band contest held at the State Fair of Texas a few years ago and made a big hit with all visiting bands. Mr. King for his fair way of judging a contest.

**Here For Contest  
Rodeo Livestock**

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 30—Including a string of ninety bucking horses, said to be the best brones in America, which will be a 16 day feature of the livestock for the Hoot Gibson Rodeo State Fair of Texas, arrived here Monday, and arriving at the same time by auto was Skeeter Bill Robbins, arena director for the popular moving picture actor-cowboy. Gibson will use more than 500 head of livestock in his production of the championship contest at the State Fair.

Robbins, Cactus Mack, Ed Bowman Vera McGinnis and many other rodeo contestants arrived in Dallas Sunday

and will be here through the 16 day event. The contestants arrived here ahead of the livestock and were on hand at the unloading. All of the live fromstock which arrived Monday came from Gobson's Golden State Ranch in California, where the moving picture actor stages a rodeo each year.

Much of the livestock which will be used in the Hoot Gibson will be purchased from Texas ranges, it was announced by Robbins. Steers, roping calves and other animals will be purchased and corralled on the fair grounds immediately.

Gibson is offering larger prize money than ever in his 16 day contest. Prizes ranges as follows: \$1600 for bronc riding; \$1,000 for steer bull-dogging; \$800 for calf-roping; \$600 for old-timer's steer roping (entries in this event are limited to cowboys past fifty years of age) and other high prize money for other events.

The popular moving picture will arrive in Dallas next Sunday. He will fly his famous Blackhawk, sports model biplane to the State Fair. The plane will be on display in the Southwestern Aviation Exhibit throughout the 16 days of the State Fair of Texas.
