Nothing has given me more pleasure than the recent announcement of the national "Careful Crossing Campaign" endorsed by the American Railway Association. "Automobile Accidents" in my opinion are one of the largest problems confronting the public of today.

Highway Railway Grade Crossing Accidents contribute a large proportion of the total, and as a locomotive engineer of about 40 years in railroad service, I am somewhat familiar with this class of automobile accidents...

Hardly a day goes by when the pilot on one of the fast passenger trains doesn't see an automobile, perhaps loaded with a family, women or children, or perhaps a gay picnic party suddenly appear on the railroad track immediately ahead of his engine.

Frequently, the striking of an automobile means the derailment of engine and train endangering the lives of not only the engine crew, but his passengers as well.

Recently, in approaching a popular highway crossing near Dallas on my engine, I saw an automobile load of fishermen coming towards the track at high speed.

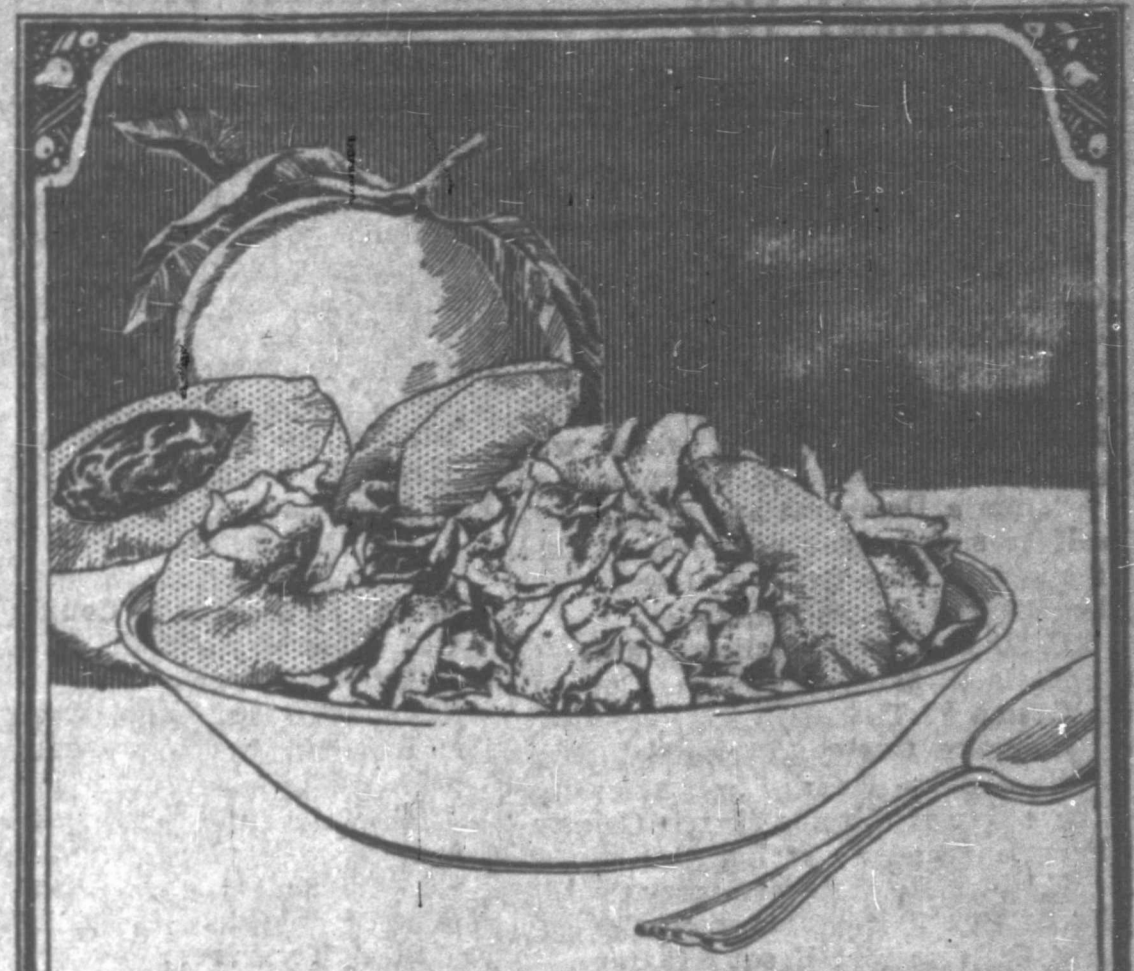
If the manufacturing plants of this country had to depend upon
