Under the terms of the peace plan, shopmen are to return to
work under wage scales prescribed by the United States railroad abor board effective July 1, the date the strike began in protest against the board's decision
The question of seniority which proved to be the chief barrier
to an earlier settlement, was not specifically mentioned in the agree10 an earlier settlement, was not specif ically mentioned in the agree
ment. The agreement made no mention either of working condi fions or the contract system for "farming out" shop work which h the wage controversy, were the original issues in the strike.
Disputes over the "relative standing" of empioyes, and ne disputes which might arise as outgrowths of the strike, shall, unde the peace terms, be referred to adjustment boards composed of rep
resntativs of the carriers and their employers, if the disputes canno settled as an individual matter between an employe and his road The agreement requires the signatory roads to find places for
