This year Friona had representatives at both locations just in case, Muleshoe coaches were in Lubbock, assuming they would be placed in a Region 17 district again. Wrong. They should have been in Amarillo and had to make a fast trip from Lubbock to be present for opening day of the biannual realignment circus.

When the packets were opened and alignment dust settled, the Muleshoe Mules found themselves one step down the playoffs. from 3A to 2A and once again district rivals for the Friona Chieftains. The enrollment levels for dropped Littlefield to 2A. They turned in an enrollment of 411.

Since Friona was placed in a 7-team district, the four nondistrict games have been scheduled with Abernathy, Littlefield, Bovina, and Morton. District opponents in District 2-2A will be Friona, Bushland, River Road, Highland Park, Tulia, Dimmitt, and Muleshoe. 2006-07 will be the first year for Bushland to participate in varsity football. Old Friona rival River Road dropped from 3A also.



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

I went to Wal-Mart and bought hand warmers, body warmers, foot warmers, heavy socks and gloves. I ordered a fleece cap from a catalog. I checked my supply of hooded sweatshirts, scarves and heavy coats. I was not going to sit in the stands and freeze. It's December, right?

I really didn't pay much attention to the weather forecast, which called for temperatures the day of the game to be in the seventies. I just knew a surprise cold front was going to come through and I was going to be prepared for it. When we left Kevin's house for the game, I was wearing a turtleneck shirt under my hooded

Kevin's 15-year-old son Jackson came with us. We got to the stadium parking lot early enough to toss

the football back and forth. We were not the only ones doing that. Footballs of all sizes were sailing all over that parking lot. When the parking lot got crowded and we lost our playing area, we had a tailgate snack. As darkness approached, we headed for the stadium. I left my coat in Kevin's vehicle and carried my sweatshirt with me. It made me feel a little better when I saw other fans carrying quilts and heavy coats. There were also people wearing shorts and t-shirts. I never put on my sweatshirt. The game was fun, even though the

Cowboys lost to the Rams 20-10.

While visiting Kevin and his family, we watched the Cotton, Sugar, Orange and Rose Bowl games. Wow. I had not done that in years. I observed things I hadn't noticed before, like coaches taking solitary sideline strolls during

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

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

Ants are no longer a simple problem. According to a newspaarticle, there are winged fire ants loose in Texas. frightening. Why would a decent, God-fearing winged fire ant choose Texas? Texas has enough loose creatures. But it gets more bizarre. These winged fire ants have killed twenty-three thousand trout. I have some serious concerns about this situation. 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
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



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## My Life Story

By Joyce Barker Coffman

Every month, a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home or Friona Heritage Estates, writes a story about his/her life's history for the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times", for printing in this issue. This month we feature Joyce Barker Coffman.

I was born in Lelia Lake, Texas, Donley County on July 16, 1920 to Dollie Brown Barker and Fred M. Barker. Dad was a school teacher for a short while after their marriage and Mom was a housewife. In October, 1920 my folks moved their family to a farm 3 miles east of Farwell. Dad farmed, raised a garden and lots of livestock (cows, hogs, and chickens). Mom sewed, making our clothes; churned butter, baked bread, peddled milk and eggs. All of us kids remember the dust bowl and the depression days. In 1938 Mom and Dad moved to the Lakeview Community, 8 miles east of Friona. I went to school in Friona for a short time then married. Mom and Dad had 7 other children besides me. There was Ogetha Mae (Langford) 1913, Thomas Franklin (Jack) 1914, Crystal (Moss Pitman) 1916, Baby Boy 1918, Joyce Oleta (Coffman) 1920, Herald Fred (Judge) 1923, Mary Lou (Harrelson-Collier) 1925, and Bobby Jean (Widner) 1928. Myself and baby sister Bobby Jean are the only survivors from my family.

I married Eugene Ray (Weedy) Coffman, August 20, 1938. We first lived in Friona and Weedy worked at the Chevrolet House washing and greasing cars. Our first child a son, Frankie Gordon was born in Clovis, New Mexico in October 1939. Then we had a daughter, Sharon Joy (Wilson-Gallon) September 1942. We moved to Amarillo where Weedy worked for the Smelter. In July 1946 we had another daughter Melody Jayne (Drake) and 22 months later another son was added to our family Horace William (Hobby), May 1948. We moved to Texico, N.M. in October 1948 where we lived for a few months until we bought a home in Farwell. Weedy worked for Oliver Sikes at the Ford house selling cars.

Later his brother-in-law, Lawrence McKillip and Weedy were partners and bought the Ford House. After about 3 years the Ford dealership sold and Weedy started selling and trading on his own. We had 3 other children, Alice Jean (Autrey-Ewald), September 1953, Arlene Gay (Roberts-Klump) January 1958 and April Dawn (King) August 1960.

With all our children you know we attended lots of school functions, sports, band, etc. Whatever the kids were involved in we tried to see to it they were there and we loved to go watch. I was a housewife and loved canning, cooking, working in my yard and flowers. Weedy and I also enjoyed raising a big garden. We lived in the same house there in Farwell from 1949 until I came to live in Prairie Acres in July 2005. I am a member of the Hamlin Methodist Church. Weedy died on July 1, 1984 of a brain tumor and Frankie died November 17, 2004. I have 6 children still living, Sharon Gallon in Stillwater, Oklahoma, Melody with her husband Owen Drake in Friona, Texas. Hob Coffman of Farwell, Texas. Alice with her husband Brian Ewald, Sun Lakes, Arizona. Gaye with her husband Robert Klump, Cederedge, Colorado, April King, Amarillo, Texas, 18 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

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





## **Your Privacy** and the Net

Are you a private person? Do you cringe at the thought of someby the First Amendment. one watching your every move? Or reading your private messages? Well, listen up! The Internet has some great resources to help you maintain your anonymity, at least in

the online world. Web Surfing

Every time you visit a website, you leave a footprint. These tracks contain a very important piece of information called an "IP Address." An IP Address is the unique ID every computer on the Internet MUST have in order to communicate. "IP" is short for 'Internet Protocol.' The address is a series of four three-digit numbers, such as '134.056.002,253' Your ISP has large blocks of these IP numbers assigned to them by THEIR provider.

If someone wanted to know who visited a certain website, they could track that IP address back to it's owner, your ISP. Then, if your ISP cooperates, they could link that IP to YOU based on the date and time you were assigned that ID. Typically, only law enforcement officials go through such painstaking steps to find a user. However, that remote possibility is enough to cause some privacy-minded citizens to Enter, seek better protection.

Anonymizer. Anonymizer

Think of Anonymizer (http:// www.anonymizer.com) as a proxy web-surfer. Take a look at the topright of their home page. Simply type any web address into the blank to surf anonymously. Here's how it works: Let's say you didn't want the IRS to know that you visited their "Will I get Audited?" First, go to web page. Anonymizer's website and type the IRS's address (http://www.irs.gov)

into the blank. The IRS homepage will slowly appear. The sudden drop in speed is due to two factors: First, you have now introduced a middleman (Anonymizer) into your surfing. All web pages will now be routed through Anonymizer first before they reach your computer. ond, Anonymizer's paying customers get priority on the service over free users. But, the free service is decent for occasional usage. easy to know when you're using Anonymizer and when you are surfing "naked." The Anonymizer address bar will appear at the top of our screen along with "Protected by Anonymizer" appearing in the title of every document you view.

Anonymous Re-mailers

But what if you need to send an anonymous e-mail message? And, "yes," before you ask, legitimate reasons do exist for this ser-The Global Internet Liberty Campaign explains it this way:

Anonymity is essential to protect free speech. It can be used to protect human rights workers reporting abuses, political dissidents commenting on government actions, writers publishing controversial literature and other important functions where revealing a person's identity would threaten a person's life or wellbeing. Anonymous pub-

lishing has been recognized in the United States as being protected

your message through numerous servers around the world, stripping off the previous server's address The recipient has no way of knowing that the message came from Of course, because of this "stripping" action, they also have no way to reply to you. Cleaning Your Hard Drive

Most of you know that simply throwing a file into the recycle bin does not make it irretrievable. After all, you can always double-click on the trash and pull it back out. However, what if you "empty the recycle bin?" Could someone still retrieve the file? Yes, unless special steps are taken.

When your computer deletes a file, it doesn't truly erase it. simply marks the area on the hard drive where the file exists as "available." The next time you save a file, it may (or may not) over-write that deleted file. That's how "undelete" programs work. They try to piece together file fragments that have not been overwritten by new data.

However, even if that area on the hard drive has been overwritten eight times, the data still leaves a "magnetic signature." Law enforcement officials have devices that can decipher these "data ghosts" and rebuild the deleted files.

To truly erase all data, you need special program. I recommend, UltraWipe ww.snapfiles.com/get/ ultrawipe.html). It's a free program that will find the empty areas of your hard drive, write random data over them, then erase it, then repeat the process over and over and over. It claims to meet "Department of Defense standards" for file deletion. Be careful, though. It has a "Panic Button" that will immediately erase a user-selected group of folders with a mouse

Some people believe that the government and corporations are slowly eroding our right to privacy. However, with the tools I've mentioned, you'll have a fighting chance against these "Big Brothers."

## FSA to provide CRP contract extensions; Announces general CRP sign-up

Approximately one-half of the four million acres currently enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program in Texas are set to expire in 2007. In order to bring some order to the process, and to more efficiently stagger the expiration times for these CRP acres, the Farm Service Agency has decided to offer automatic extensions to the contracts using the Environmental Benefits Index scores from the year the lands were last signed up to determine the length of the extension that will be offered.

Based on the EBI scores and verification that the acres remain

eligible for participation, including consideration of program caps limiting CRP acreage within a county, CRP contracts expiring in 2007 will be automatically extended.

Automatic CRP contract extensions will be offered according

to the following schedule: Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) Score Automatic

Extension Length

197-365 10 years 5 years 173-196 152-172 4 years 129-151 3 years Less that 129 2 years

Farm Service Agency (FSA) county offices will notify CRP participants with expiring contracts in 2007 by mail if they are eligible for re-enrollments or extensions

Before approving a re-enrollment contract or an extended contract, FSA will review the contract to ensure that the required cover is maintained and there is compliance with other contract provisions. In addition, to be eligible, participants must be able to show that they meet eligibility requirements for the new enrollment period. In the case of re-enrollments, updated rental rates will apply.

Also announced by FSA January 31 was a general Conservation Reserve Program Sign-up beginning March 27, 2006 and running through April 14, 2006.

Offers presented during the general CRP sign-up will be evaluated based on overall cost and the following

environmental factors: wildlife, water, soil, air and enduring

CRP is a voluntary program that helps farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers protect their environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolling in CRP plant long-term, resource conserving covers, with Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) providing rental payments, cost-share and

technical assistance




