MRS. JOHNSON PECOS GIN IS DESTROYED BY CONFLAGRATION

The siren sounded at the light plant at about 4 p. m. yesterday which announced that the Peces gin was burning. It is now only a heap gin all the cotton with the exception of one or two bales on the platform was destroyed-in all about ten or twelve bales.

The gin was ignited, so say those at work at the gin at the time, by the exhaust pipe. An accumulation of oil had been allowed to gather outside the gin and in the vicinity of the outlet to the exhaust which became so hot it ignited the oil. The flames spread to the interior and the whole was a mass of flames in a very few minutes. The Pecos Volunteer Fire Department made a quick run but the wells in that vicinity apparently were not strong and it is doubted if they had had all the water in the Pecos River if it would have availed anything.

The Pecos gin was an up-to-date concern and had spent considerable money in new equipment preparing for this season's crop and had ginned a little more than 1100 bales it is understood.

THE BELL WELL The Bell well had been shut down for several days until Thursday when work was resumed. A new sand line had been ordered which had not arrived, causing the delay. The line was transported to the well Wednesday night immediately entire field. after its arrival in Pecos, installed and work resumed. 
Johnson's letter reads:
