TEXAS AND PACIFIC TO TRANSFER MAIN SHOP TO EL PASO Heavy repair work done now at division shops of the Texas & Pacinc railroad at Big Spring, is gradually being diverted to El Paso, which indicates that officials intend to carry out plans for moving heavy machinery from the Big Spring shops to this city as soon as a turntable for handling large equipment is installed here. Since the beginning of the shop men's strike 10 engines have been rebuilt in El Paso. The first was sent here as an experiment and results proved so satisfactory that this class of work has been increased. Cars are also being rebuilt here. While the normal force at the local shops now is approximately 125 men, it is estimated that the payroll will carry between 300 and 400 names when the transfer of base has been completed. This will be carried out gradually.


SRIP VAN WINKLE COMING TO THE **RIALTO THEATRE**

Under Texas law, widespread changes, even when desirable, can not be made without losses. The trouble is with the law. Governor Neff declared for "a safer and saner law" governing text book adoptions when speaking before the Texas State Teachers Association in Houston recently. It is to be hoped that the coming legislature will face the seriousness of the situation and enact a law which will save the schools from all such losses in the future. In order that the full facts may be laid before the legislature, it would be well for each community and county to figure their own losses and give them to the publie.



Her fingers were educated to tickle the svory but her head was so empty of musical intelli-gence that she thought America shared nothing of the highest culture, that to find favor she must con-fine her performance to foreign composers. Europe itself rebuked her She had to go abroad to learn America's worth.

The American may be a boastful bird; be may awagger and strut about his inventive genius, about his bulk production, about his inventive genius, about prise and commercial sagacity—all of which justify his boast. But his boast may well go farther. Nowhere in all the world is so good a literature being written as by American authors today. Excepting only the immortal Shakespeare, no land has produced finer or mobler-minded poets than America. New York is as good an art center today as Paris ever dreamed of. THE AREAS

Most of our art producers, which includes our poets and philosophers and novelists, our writers, our architects, sculptors and painters, have arrived at a full appreciation of this fact. But the musician has

still much to learn. This is due to the fact that too few of our musicians have a cultural foundation.

That is why they speak in terms of "great masters" and talk of appearing before "crowned heads." dukes and lords, countesses and all the fol-de-rol of royal rubbish.

This simply means that such musicians, however well they may warble or vibrate the violin strings, have not touched the finest and highest of all art which is appreciation of poetry and the understanding of philosophy. 




