

THE BELL WELL.

Excellent progress has been made in the Bell Well up until Wednesday when the tools were caught in the hole by a flared bit, and some minor caving of the shales at the bottom of the hole. For a time it seemed that it would be necessary to cut the drilling line with a rope knife and run the fishing tools, and a rope for this purpose, but fortunately Gallagher and his crew were able to jar the tools loose Thursday morning, and they were removed from the hole without further difficulty.

In view of the fact that further difficulty might be encountered at any time in this shale formation, it was deemed advisable to run a string of casing to the the possibility of further difficulties of this nature—casing and tools have been ordered, and as soon as casing is set. drilling will be resumed, which should be about the middle of the week.

This well has been the subject of considerable discussion on the streets since Wednesday, there being insistent rumore to the effect that the tools were blown up in the hole by gas, and that the well is at a most interesting stage, is already a well, etc., none of which rumors have been confirmed, but it is very evident that interesting developments can be expected before long.

The Enterprise believes, and has good reasons therefor, that when there is anything startling to report from the Bell well it will be forthcoming from the office. It also believes that until such a time as there is something worthwhile nothing of a startling nature will be re-

· Both Poor and Rich Complain

HE gentle art of getting back to normalcy does not seem to be working out very well in practice. The rich are not any better satisfied than the poor if their plaints are to be believed. Rich men point out that our unscientifie system of taxation is stripping them of two-thirds of their meome, and, as a result, they must put their money into non-taxable securities; instead of into the productible lines of industry. On the other side of the fence we learn that the workingmants wages have not kept in step with the cost of living, and so he is dissatisfied. Unquestionably, there has been a more marked readjustment of wages in many lines than there has in the prices one must pay for the things necessary to live.

Compared with the top prices reached during the war boom, in May, 1920, there has been a decline in priess of 291/2 per cent. This standing alone sounds encouraging, but the fact is that prices today stand 53%, per cent above the average an August 1, 1914, according to figures supplied by R. H. Dunn Co. The tilt in prices, however, has come to us gradually, stealing on us as we slept. For instance, in November it was only 15% per cent. The total advance, however, since January 1, 1922, has been 1234 per cent, and disguise it as we may, the housewife has felt the strain. The hig business of the world is done on credit which is more or less clastic, but the wife of the small wage earner must settle with the butcher and the grocer every week. The inclination is to blame the small merchant in the belief that he is charging extortionale profits, but, as a fact, he is as much in the grip of the system as the ultimate consumer. The

Apples selling at 25 cents each decorate many New York store windows, and in the fashionable shops they are being offered at three for a dollar.

The smelter production of copper in 1922, according to the United States Geological Survey, as compiled from reports of the smelters covering the actual production for 11 months and the estimated production in December, was 981,000,000 pounds, an increase of 475,000,000 pounds over 1921. The smelter production of copper for December, as estimated by the producing companies, was 103,300,000 pounds, or at the rate of about 1,240, 000,000 pounds a year.







As a result of two days' work by Hunter Delong and Mr. Landon in January near Frijale, Culberson county, 28 poisoned coyptes were found on one ranch within a few days. J. T. Baker, Pecos county ranchman, reported finding 25 dead coyotes as a result of poison set out on his ranch by Hunter Gotcher and Mr. Landon. Fifty dead covotes were found in Maverick county in February, after Joe Smith. hunter and Mr. Landon had put out 2,500 poison baits. In eight days the government men poisoned twenty-four surface tanks and revisiting fourteen they found 55 coyotes. They estimate that at least 200 coyotes were killed as a result of this operations One hundred and fifty covotes were reported found on the Matador ranch near Vega in the Panhandle after two days' poisoning by Hunter Delong and Mr. Landon.

"In October, an appropriation of \$100 ANIMALS IN TEXAS for poisoning, in addition to \$200 obtained Eighteen hundred and sixty-one true for trapping in August, was obtained from which the stock men of Pecos county raised \$400 additional," reports Inspector Landon. In October and November, Inspector Coleman secured the appropriation of \$1,200 from Oldham, Moore, Potter and Hartley counties for operations along the Canadian river in the Panhandle. Active work was commenced there in the latter part of November, 1,530 baits being distributed. In December, this project was in full swing. 17,698 baits were distributed dead covotes were found.
