County Commisioner R. N. Couch, L. W. Anderson and Judge Hunter of Culberson county composed a committee to visit the Highway Commission at Austin this week to see what help could be secured toward the completion of the Banka short span at Wildhorse in Culberson to El Paso. county and another short stretch or two of road in Culberson and Hudspeth counties.

They returned Thursday of this week and Mr. Anderson informs The Enterprise that they secured sufficient aid to complete the road.

Ward county will get a stretch of road five miles long and extending that distance west from Pyote, from end of where the gravel road thru sand at Pyote. There they will drop west to Barstow and build that stretch of road from Barstow to the Pecos River and half of the bridge.

The Ward County work is to be paid for by the Federal and State Highway
