HOURS FOR OPERATING

AMATEUR TRANSMITTERS From an item in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, we learn that the Chairman of the Traffic Committee of the American Radio Relay League has issued the following rules applying to the ninth radio district. We do not know how they affect the fifth radio district in which the State of Texas is located.

"Amateur radio transmitters are respectfully requested to comply with the new

"During the hours of 7:30 p. m. and 10:30 p. m. only pure C. W. may operate on a wave length between 150 and 200 meters only. Sparks, I. C. W., A. C. C. W., radio telephones and modulated buzzers posi-

tively are not permitted to transmit during this period. "At no time can an amateur operate above 200 meters.

"Violations of the regulations will be reported without further warning to the Ninth District radio supervisor."

AMATEUR TRANSMITTING LICENSES We are in receipt of a communication from Theodore G. Deiler, radio inspector of the fifth district, in which the State of Texas is located, in regard to requirements for an amateur transmitting license. He also enclosed a complete set of blank forms both for station license and operator's license.

The main requirement is that the applicant be able to send and receive at the rate of ten words a minute, five letters to a word, in Continental Morse, and that this claim be supported by a sworn affidavit or by two or three letters from licensed operators.

Any one desiring to look over the requirements or to make application may have these blanks by applying at the Enterprise office.

SHORT WIRES AN ASSET All Wires in a radio receiving circuit should be short and turns made at right angles. Every wire carrying an electric current has a magnetic field. If two wires are run near to each other they will absorb current, but if placed at right angles they oppose each other and there is no transfer of energy from one to the other .- St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

We want all who are at all interested in the subject, and those who wish to learn more of it, to attend this meeting, when ways and means of organizing and supporting such a club will be discussed.

SUMMER WORK During the summer many fans feel there is no use in attempting to operate a set due to the large amount of at-

mospherics present. But to stop operating a set at this time cuts the fan off from some mighty good concerts. Here are some hints that will help you in your summer work.

In the first place the antenna must be cut down as low as possible. If you have a multiple-wire antenna, take it down and insert a single wire antenna in its place. If your receiver is a sensitive one, an insulated wire about 100 feet long laid along the ground away from the direction of the broadcasting station will cut down static to a large degree. Or use a loop aerial, fastened to a door, and by opening and shutting the door the directional property of the coil can be utilized. A wire strung around a picture frame, or strung around a room will act as a good summer antenna.

Coupled circuits will reduce static to a great degree and radio frequency amplification will also help.

But the main thing is to remember that one cannot expect signals to be as clear as in the winter, but must be content with weaker signals.





TEXAS MARKET NEWS

Austin, Texas, May 31.—Texas Radio Market News Service, operated co-operatively by State and Federal officials today released the following summary of market conditions, and the movement of Texas products.

Fruits and Vegetables Onions: Notwithstanding the dwindling movement from this State, onion markets have not been in entirely satisfactory tone, and brokers in State markets have experienced some difficulty in moving car lots into consuming channels at \$2.25 per standard crate of Crystal Whites f. o. b. their points. The retail trade of Texas is paying mostly \$2.50-3.00 for this variety and \$2.25-2.50 for Yellow Bermudas, with available supplies of the latter, however, running extremely low, at points. The best Yellows in Kansas City are jobbing for \$2.50 per crate and a similar grade of Whites are bringing \$2.75. To May 28th the National movement of onions this season amounted to but 2,564 cars against 5,337 cars to the same date last

Tomatoes: With the East Texas deal yet to come, Texas to May 29th had shipped 49 cars of tomatoes, and the Nation 8,927 cars this year for 9,496 cars last. State wholesalers at the present time are unloading to the retail trade mostly for \$2.25-2.50 per four basket crate of Pinks. There is a noticeable improvement in the

quality of Texas offerings. Cantaloupes: Blight damage has serously curtailed the carlot movement of cantaloupes from South Texas gardens. However, 30 freight and 22 express cars are recorded rolling from Texas points up to the 29th, and the National movement to the same date was 196 cars this year for 97 cars last. There have also been generous imports from Mexico. Texas flat crates are being purchased by retailers for \$2.50-3.00.

Strawberries: Continuous rains during the gathering season restricted materially the strawberry movement in carlots. However, to the 29th this year Texas had rolled 56 cars against 9 cars for the entire season last year, and the increase in movent would have been even more pro nounced had it not been for freeze injury and the poor carrying quality resulting from the excessive moisture. Twentyfour pint crates of Texas Aromas are at present wholesaling for \$2.00, with Arkansas 24 quart crates in the same class

Watermelons: While Texas watermelons are not as yet available to markets, it is interesting to note that movement from Florida is going forward briskly, though not as heavily as last year. To May 28th this year the movement has called for but 186 cars against 2,392 last year. This slackening of shipments may be prophetic of brisk markets when Texas stock starts rolling. Bulk cars of Tom Watsons f. o. b. Florida points for cash at the track are bringing growers \$600-700 per car of 28 to 30 pounders loaded in four tiers, with 26 pound average bringing \$500-550 and 22-24 pound average \$300-450. Offerings on Texas markets from this state are bringing wholesalers 6c per pound. Small Vegetables: The following prices prevail for the small vegetables in State markets, in sales to retailers: String beans, green and wax \$1.50-2.00 per hamper or around 10c per pound. Turnips 4 to 5c per pound or 75-85c per dozen bunches. Cucumbers \$4.00-4.50 per bushel basket or \$3.00-3.25 per crate. English Peas 15c per pound. Squash \$2.50 per bushel basket or 8-10c per pound. Spinach 10c per pound. Beets 90c-\$1.00 per dozen bunches. Carrots 90c per dozen bunches, Asparagus \$2.00 per dozen bunches, sweet potatoes \$2.00-2.25 per crate, and white potatoes, Bliss Triumphs 6c per pound, Irish Cobblers 5-5½c per pound. Poultry and Eggs

Both poultry and eggs have been in light receipts the past week, though fowls have come forward somewhat spasmodically, to a demand around 16c per pound. Fryers and broilers, as yet extremely scarce were actively in demand from 30 to 35c per pound. Dealers are paying \$5.50 to \$6.00 straight for eggs, with receipts hardly sufficient to take care of local demands. Spoilage was reported running as high as 4 dozen to the case, and dealers found it more profitable to unload to retailers for \$6.50 straight than \$7.50 candled. Some Texas eggs were recorded as arriving in Chicago, where the market was practically steady all week around 24½-25 per dozen for fresh gathered firsts, 26½c for storage packed firsts and 26%-27c per dozen for storage packed extras.

Live Stock

While in out of State markets, a downward trend continues, better grade of steers and yearlings in Fort Worth have shown a tendency to maintain the 15-25c advance recorded during the past week. Choice fed steers are bringing \$9 and good light weight beef steers \$7.75-8.50. Butcher heifers were listed for \$3.75-7.00, cows \$3.50-6.00 and bulls \$2.75-4.50. and the better stocker calves \$5.25-6.76. headache, dizziness, coated tongue, salivate or make you sick.
