TARDIEU NEXT FRENCH PREMIER?



The report comes from Brest. France, that Andre Tardieu will be the next French premier. In that stronghold of socialism the men who make politics what it is in that end of France predict the resignation of Premier Clemenceau before long.

Political gossip has it "The Tiger" will retire with colors flying, taking no chances of asking the chamber of deputies to vote its confidence in the government. Much of this talk comes from circles in which are the supporters of Deputy Goude of Brest, member of the extreme left, who has led the fights against Clemenceau.

This speculation is coincident with the arrival here from the Black sea of the French warship Justice. Now, it was aboard the Justice that the sailors mutinied in Sebastopol and in whose behalf Deputy Goude demanded amnesty, lining up 137 votes in support of the motion, 100 members ab-

staining from voting on the question. Those whose chatter in a political strain predict that Clemenceau will address the chamber and point out that he has brought France to a just peace that his work is done, and that he will resign.

WOULD KEEP PRESIDENTS AT HOME



The president of the United States would not be permitted, during his term of office, to leave the country or to perform the duties of his office except at Washington, under a bill introduced by Representative Campbell of Kansas, chairman of the house rules committee. The bill's text follows:

"Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, section 1, that from and after the passage of this act it shall be unlawful for the president of the United States, during the term of his office, to absent himself from the territorial jurisdiction of the United States or to perform the duties of his office at any other place than at the seat of government established by the act for establishment of the temporary and permanent seat of government of the United States, approved July 16, 1790, to which this act is an amendment."

Representative Campbell had prepared a lengthy address on his bill in which he sharply criticized President Wilson for going to Europe for the peace conference, but unanimous consent for its immediate delivery was refused by Representative Blanton, Democrat, Texas.


Say, then, that Lady Beatty draws \$200,000 a year from her property. The British government takes \$100,-000, the American government takes \$120,000, and her income is \$20,000







Senate Joint Resolution No. 23.

A Joint Resolution proposing and submitting to the people of the State of Texas an amendment to Article sixteen of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section and authorizing the City of Galveston and County of Galveston to issue bonds for protective works, irrespective of Constitutional limitation, in the aggregate of five million dollars for both city and county, as may be by the city or county deemed necessary for the raising of the grade, building seawalls and breakwaters and doing any and all kinds of protective works in said city and county, and to levy and collect taxes to retire said bonds, principal and interest, providing for a sinking fund and creating an emergency.

The City of Galveston and the County of Galveston, and each of them are hereby authorized to isceed in the aggregate five million doland doing any and all other kinds of ty, without regard to and irrespective of any provisions of the Constitution Sec. 2. RELATING TO CONFEDERATE PEN SIONS AND INCREASING TAX RATES FOR PAYMENT OF SAME House Joint Resolution No. 35.

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate Soldiers, Sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas prior to Jan. 1, 1910, and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and par ticipate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$0.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making appropriation to pay the expenses thereof: Be it resolved by the Legislature of

the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 51 of Arti cle 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to

Sec. 51. The Legislature shall have

no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipals or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the States served in organizations for the protection of the Frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the States and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this section shall not apply to women born since the year 1866, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$0.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas. and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or milia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied. And provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calam-





EPISCOPALIANS NAME LEADERS FOR BIG DRIVE

Nation-wide Campaign Organized in Eight Western States.

San Francisco (Special)-With sur veys of church needs practically completed in the eight states comprising the western area for the forthcoming Protestant Episcopal campaign for christian education and church strengthening, members of the Episcopal clergy and the lay committees, in cooperation with the national headquarters for the drive in New York City, are preparing to perfect parish organizations that will insure the success of the Episcopal campaign during the coming months. For the purpose of the cam paign the nation has been divided into four areas, the western area including California, Washington, Oregon, Ne vada, Arizona, Idaho, Utah and New Mexico. Committees have been ap pointed for the thirteen dioceses and missionary districts embraced in this area, each committee acting in direct contact with the national headquarters.

While the Episcopal campaign will seek to raise \$20,000,000 throughout the United States for the furtherance of church work—the Methodists recently raised \$109,000,000 within their own denomination for a similar purpose—the fundamentals in the forthcoming campaign are, "to bring the spiritual power of the church to bear upon the church's whole task," to quote the national director of the campaign, Dr. R. W. Patton, and "to secure and train an increased number of people, clerical and lay, for christian leadership."

The Episcopal campaign is in line with the campaigns conducted by the Methodist Church, the Presbyterian Church and the Baptist Church to bring about a quickening of christian responsibility for the great task of world reconstruction, both domestic and foreign, that has been left upon christian peoples everywhere as a heritage of the world war.

Upon the survey of the needs of each parish, which will be in the hands of the central office in New York by August first, the federal agencies of the church will be in position to unite on a single appeal for support. Based upon the survey the church will be in a position to "apply itself to the task of meeting these needs and to make on a given day an 'every member' canvass that all may be exhorted to gifts and

While each diocese and district in the western area is entrusted with the responsibility for its own campaign work, under the leadership of the resident bishop, assistance in organization work will be given by a committee of five named by the national executive committee. This committee for the western area is composed of Bishop George C. Hunting of Reno, Nevada; Bishop Herman Page of Spokane, Wash.; Rev. George Davidson of Los Angeles; H. C. Wyckoff of Watsonville, Calif., and Mrs. A. L. McLeisch of Berkeley, Calif.
