



Unfortunately, from the very nature of the matter, physicians have not had as much opportunity to study this subject as might be supposed. Many have starved to death odor from the body, vertigo, stupo after shipwreck, or earthquake, or delirium, and at times convulsion coal mine disaster, or snow burial, a fall of bodily temperature, and, fin or in the wilderness or Arctic region, but medical men, as a rule, have not been present to make observations, and, furthermore, m almost every instance a certain amount of some kind of nourishment has usually been taken until near the end.
