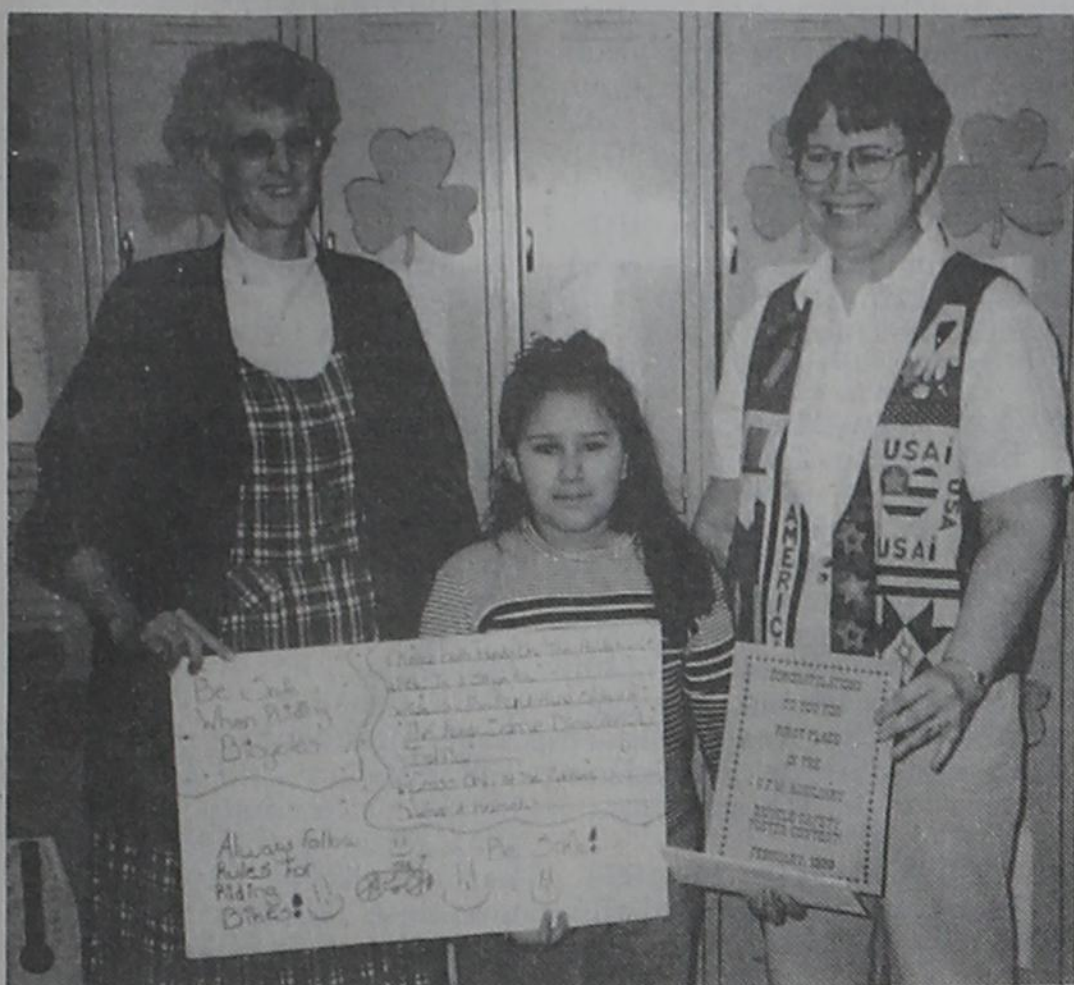

County Law Officers Arrest Four In Farwell Drug Busts

According to press release information from the Parmer County Sheriff's office, county law enforcement officers made two drug busts in Farwell last weekend.

On Friday, March 12, at approximately 3:30 p.m. a white male was stopped by Sheriff Yerger on a suspicious traffic violation. A Parmer County deputy and the Farwell Police Chief assisted. Yerger said the car took three to four blocks to stop. The booking process uncovered over \$5,600 in cash on the driver who was from Clovis.

After being placed in jail, he complained of being ill and was rushed to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where he told doctors he had ingested approximately 5-7 grams of methamphetamine just prior to being stopped.

He was treated and returned to jail pending arraignment on drug charges. The vehicle and cash were seized by the Sheriff's office.

At press time, the suspect had been released on bond.

On Sunday, March 14, at approximately 10:20 p.m., three defendants were arrested at 3rd and Avenue A in Farwell after a sale of 7 grams of methamphetamine was made.

Two vehicles, the 7 grams of meth, and a small amount of cash were seized. Sheriff Yerger said the arrests were made after an undercover buy. Two of the defendants are from the Clovis area.

These seizures were the result of a joint investigation of the Parmer County District Attorney's office and the Parmer County Sheriff's office. They were assisted by the Farwell and Texico police departments.

Sheriff Yerger said there is a drug problem throughout the county. Any information about drugs and crimes should be called in to Parmer County Crimestoppers at 800-774-8477.

Area Gets Great Rain/Snow Thurs.

The Friona area had received an excellent boost in the moisture department at the Star's presstime this week.

The official city gauge at the Bill Ellis residence showed 1.20 inches of moisture as of 2 p.m. Thursday.

The Rhea area received considerably more snow than Friona did with its Wednesday-Thursday fall, which was mainly in the form of rain. Two or three inches of snowfall was evident here.

The moisture will be a big boost to the area's wheat crop, which was needing some help in the moisture department.

Friona Paramedic Earns Coordinator Certification

Friona EMS Director Dana Hendrix has been awarded the Coordinator certification by the State of Texas. The designation means that Hendrix is now a certified EMS teacher and instructor.

To become an EMT Basic or Intermediate requires extensive classroom instruction. Previously, a certified instructor had to be hired to come to the county to conduct classes, or volunteers had to attend classes in places such as Lubbock or Amarillo.

Since the classes are two nights a week for four hours each, out-of-town classes were an inconvenience or impossible for some potential EMS volunteers.

With the Coordinator certification, Hendrix can set up classes locally. She said she had been working on the certification for three years and one hurdle was to prove the need to the State of Texas to allow the Panhandle certification.



DANA HENDRIX Council Race To Have Six Candidates

The deadline to sign up for the city council election was 5 p.m. Wednesday, March 17. The general election will be held on Saturday, May 1.

Six candidates have put their name on the ballot for the three city council positions. Running for council election are Mark Neill, Sandra Turner, Clint Mears, Mark Osborn, and two incumbents, John Gurley and Robert Jones.

School Board Candidates On Ballot

The deadline for signing up for the Friona ISD Board of Trustees was Wednesday, March 17, at 5 p.m.

According to the school administration office, Jayson Grimsley, Dee King, and Alan Monroe have signed up for the election. Monroe and Grimsley are incumbents whose terms were expiring.

A ballot position drawing will be conducted in the office of the Superintendent on Monday, March 22, at 8:30 a.m. The school board election will be held Saturday, May 1, 1999.

In addition to self-study prescribed by the state, Hendrix attended one-week training program on the Texas A&M campus in Junction, Texas, where the sessions lasted from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily.

Also, she has an agreement with Texas Tech to grant EMS-EMT credit at the college for those taking her local course.

Hendrix will be teaching future EMS volunteers CPR instruction, first aid classes and techniques of automated defibrillation, among other topics necessary to earn EMT Basic status.

Training classes are being planned to be held in the Lutheran Church facility at 13th and Virginia which was recently given to the City of Friona.

Hendrix is planning a new class to begin in mid-April. Currently there are nine EMS personnel and nine cadets. New volunteers are always needed and encouraged to sign up for the classes.

Hendrix says that the new ambulance bay next to city hall is an improvement over the old facilities for EMS personnel. They are still improving the building and are in need of an electric cookstove. If anyone can help out, contact Dana Hendrix at 250-2761.

Everyone is invited to the annual Friona senior class steak dinner. Proceeds will go to fund the alcohol/drug free graduation celebration.

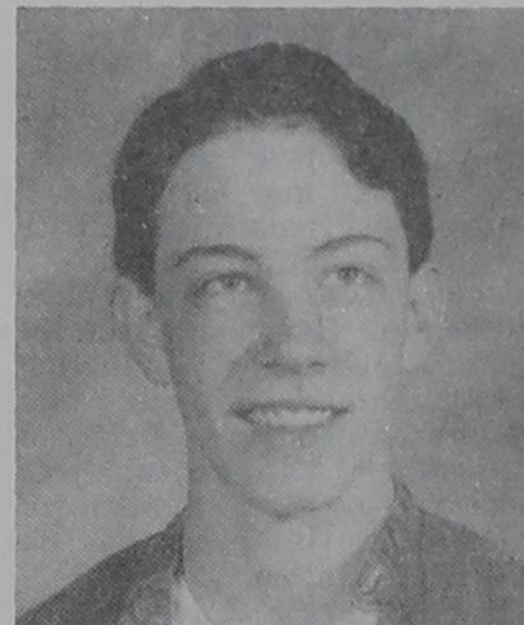
Advance tickets are \$7 adult and \$5 for children 10 years and under.

Mayfield. Christian was elected to his first full term on the board in 1996. He and his wife, Cheryl, have three sons.

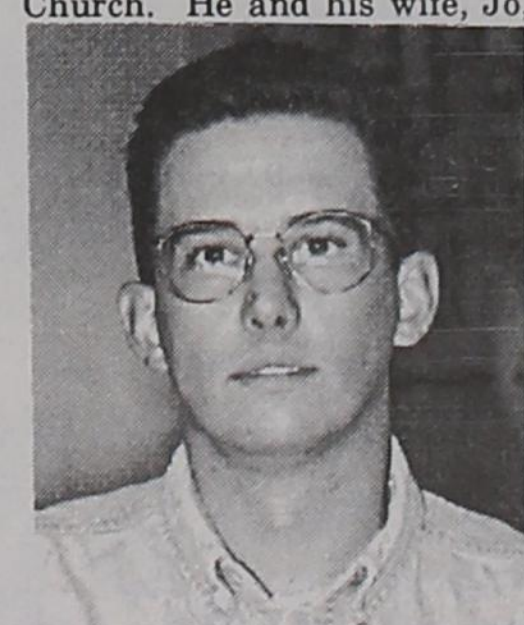

Wayne is a youth leader at Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church. He and his wife, Jo,

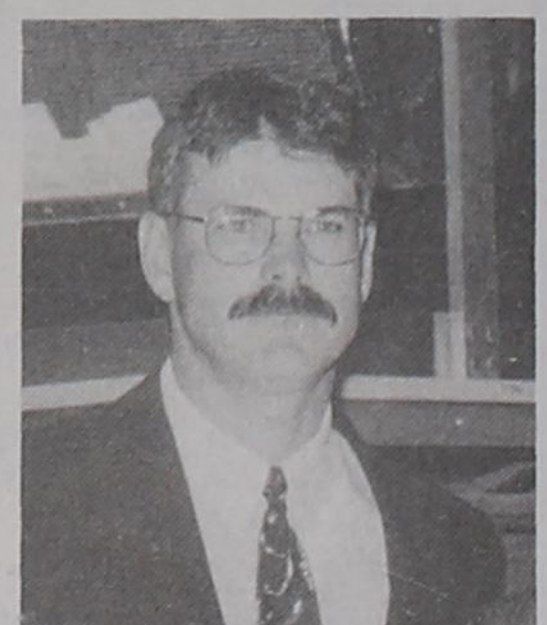
have a one-year-old daughter. They have been WTRTC members for nearly four years. Jo is employed at Farwell Junior High School as a teacher's aide.

70 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 15, 1929

Work on the new school building in the Jesko district, about twelve miles south of Friona, has been progressing recently to the extent that the walls are up and with favorable weather the entire structure will be enclosed. The building will contain two regular classrooms, and will be located just across the highway from the old building. Settlers are coming in all the time, and trustees are building with the view to the future needs of the district.

65 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 16, 1934

The sixth number of the lyceum course will be presented Friday evening by the T-Anchor Cowboys. This group of college students from West Texas State Teachers College has carried the program to several communities outside of Canyon. The cowboys have arranged about 45 minutes of this program, and the last 45 minutes will be used for requests from the audience.

60 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 17, 1939

Rylander Delivers Sales Tax

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander delivered a total of \$172.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,095 Texas cities and 118 counties.

News was not good for Parmer County for this most recent period. The net payment received by the county was \$20,002, a decrease of -22.23% over last year's comparable period. Last year the county received \$25,721.

Total taxes received, broken down by city with their respective percentage decreases are: Bovina, \$1,504 (23.06%); Farwell, \$3,156 (47.01%); and Friona \$15,341 (13.84%).

Total revenue received thus far in 1999 for the county is \$78,076, compared to \$79,300 this time last year, a small decrease -1.54%.

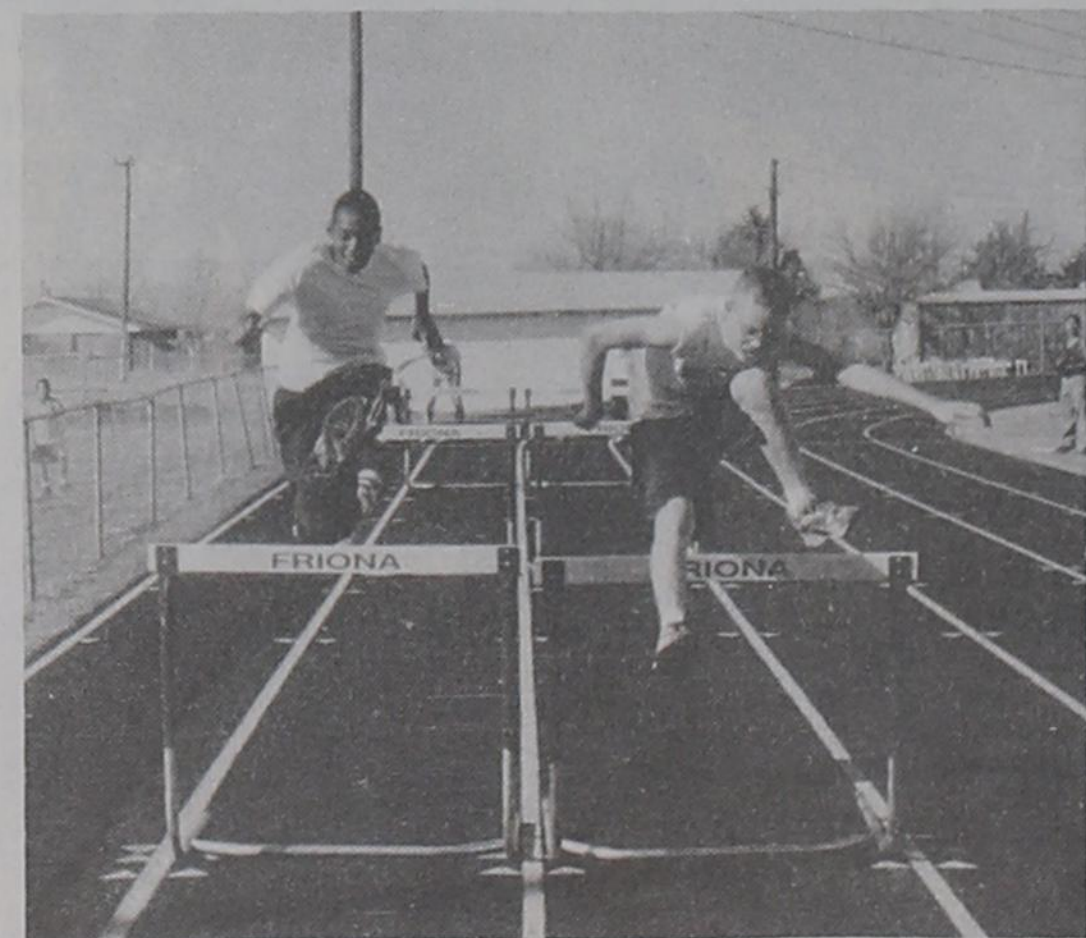

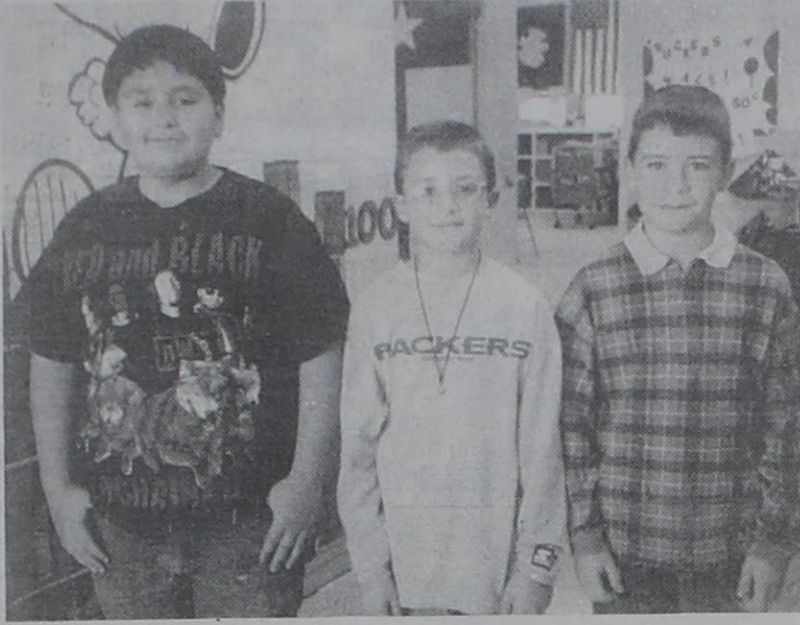
