#### LEGISLATURE ADJOURNS; NEFF MAY CALL SPECIAL SESSION

After being in session 61 days, the regular session of the Thirty-seventh legislature has adjourned sine die. The governor has intimated that somet ime during the summer it would be called again in special session.

Before final adjournment both branches of the legislature adopted the free conference committee report on the house joint resolution proposing an amndment to the constitution to increase the salaries of the governor to \$8000 a year, the attorney general o \$7500, sate treasurer, conroller and secretary of state to \$5000 each, members of the legislature to \$10 per day, for regular sessions of 120 days' duration, and \$5 per day thereafter, and \$10 per day for special sessions.

The amendment will be submitted to a vote of the people on the fourth aturday in July.




