

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

MAN MADE CRIMES PENDULUM SWINGING BACK

Former Vice President of the United States Thomas R. Marshall in a recent address declared:

"The average attitude of indifference to the enforcement of laws in the United States results from the creation of too many crimes by legislative enactment. No law carrying a penalty such as would make its infringment a crime, is passed in England unless the demand for such a law is almost uiversal. This makes its enforcement sure and certain."

It is different here in the United States where a few agitators and pro fessional "reformers" get together and by thorough organization contrive to create a semblance of a demand, and then by constantly harrassing legislators, secure the passage of a new law creating another "man made" crime and prescribing a penalty for its violation. Many laws are passed just to thus get rid of the agitators, just as many a man subscribes for a book in order to get rid of the book agent.

But more often legislators vote for a law because of their overestimation of the political influences back of it. Our national and state legislative halls are full of such cowardly nincumpoops. It is understood, and this i sgiven out by the legislators as "extenuating circumstances" for their spineless action in supporting such laws, that after the flurry is over people will cease to pay any attention to the laws' provisions. It is well known that no law can be effective unless there is genuine desire on the part of the people that it be strictly nfored.-Alpine Avalanche


