A Proclamation

By the President of the United States, a Proclamation.

HEREAS the Congress of the United States by a concurrent resolution, adopted on the 4th day of March last, authorized the Secretary of War to

cause to be brought to the United States the body of an American, who was a member of the American Expeditionary Forces in Europe, who lost his life during the World War and whose identity has not been established for burial in the Memorial Amphitheater of the National Cemetery at Arlington, Va., and,

Whreas the remains of this unknown American to be brought to the United States, in pursuance of said cocurrnt resolution, will be buried in the said Memorial Amphitheater at Arlington on the 11th day of November next; and

Whreas these remains will be representative of all unidentified American dead who in the World War gave their lives in their country's cause; and

Whereas it is desired that grateful recognition of their loyal devotion to country and of sacrifice should be appropriatly shown with due solemnity by their God-fearing and patriotic fellow countrymen; now,

Therefore, I. Warren G. Harding, President of the United States of America, do hereby call upon all devout. patriotic citizns of the United States to pause from their accustomed occupations and labors on Friday, he 1tth day of Novmber next, from 12 o'clock noon to two minutes past that hour, for aperio d of silent prayer of thanks to Giver of All Good for these valuable and valorous lives and of supplication for His divine mercy and for His blessing oupn our beloved country.

Furthermore, I hereby direct that the national flag be displayed at half staff upon public buildings of the United Staes and all stations of the army, navy, and marine corps. throughout the world, as well as upon all American entbassies, legations, and consulates from sunrise until sunset on November 11, 1921.





Although it has not formerly been the custom to brand sheep and goats in that section, ranchmen are now branding these animals on the flank with hot irons just as the cattle are marked. This is in addition to marks usually cut in the ears of sheep and goats.

Mr. McClure said that, although it is suspected that Mexicans are assisting in the thievery, the ranchmen tion of cattle and sheep men of that vicinity, for mutual protection has been planned.-El Paso Times.
