MINES OF TEXAS SMASH RECORD OF FIFTEEN YEARS

The mines report of the United States Geological Survey, prepared by Charles W. Henderson, just issued, on the gold, silver and copper and lead in Texas, shows the following production:

The total value of the gold, silver, copper and lead produced in Texas in 1919 was the largest gross value reported since the beginning of the mining industry of the state, in 1884. The yield of silver, the principal metal produced, showed a small decrease in quantity, but the total value for silver at the increased average price was greater than in 1918. The Presidio silver mine, at Shafter, Presidio county equipped with a large cyanidation mill, produced a little less than for several years, but its output continued to represent the greater part of the state total. From the Copper Queen mine, at Van Horn, a car of copper-silver ore was shipped.

Mine Production, 1918-19.
Year of 1918—Gold, \$25; silver, \$575,565 (fine ounces, 576,565); copper, 9,308 ounces, of value of \$2,299;

lead 26,944 pounds, of value of \$1,913; total value, \$580,802.

Year of 1919—Gold, \$25; silver, \$38,642 ounces, of value 603,279; copper 979 pounds, value of \$696; total, \$604,182.

Review by Counties

Brewster county—The Metals Production association continued the construction at Alpine, of a 50-ton smelter for the lead-silver ores.

Burnett county—Some development work was done at copper prospects near Burnett.

Culberson county—A car of copper ore was shipped from the Copper Queen mine at Van Horn.

Hudspeth county—All the prospects at Allamore and Sierra Blanca were idle.

Presidio county—Operations were continuous at the Presidio mine, in the Shafter district, from which the greater part of the silver output of state has come since 1884. The ore chiefly silver chloride (horn silver) is treated in a 125-ton cyanidation mill.

Will There Be Peace

The El Paso Herald, in regard to the recent peace compact between Ireland and England, says:

SAINT NICHOLAS, patron saint of travelers and merchants, of children, of scholars, and of the poor, and the prototype of our beloved Santa Claus, has his festival name-day on December 6, celebrated with special prayers and exchange of gifts in every land where the traditions of the church persist. Once his day was a great holiday in England, where in all the schools merry pranks were played, mummings gave their religio-comic performances in the streets, and gifts were sent to friends. In late years these practices have fallen into disuse, but dating from December 6, 1921, there ought to be a strong revival. The date signals the "meeting of minds" between English and Irish after 800 years of bitter conflict.

Perhaps it is a bit too early to celebrate. But all signs point to the reaching of a just and lasting agreement. Parliament has been called in special session to act upon the "treaty," and it is safe to say that the "little Welshman" who mastered the worn and discouraged conferees and brought about an unexpected compromise after an all night session, by himself yielding what he has regarded as one of the points in his "irreducible minimum," is not going to fail with the parliament. Dublin can hardly repudiate the signatures of the Irish plenipotentiaries, and the plan goes through even if Ulster balks. So it looks like a settlement.

English aggression in Ireland began in the 12th century. Not until 1603 were the English able to assert entire possession of the island, after continual warfare and the last 300 years have been scarcely more peaceful than the preceding 500. For half a century England has been trying earnestly to adjust relations with Ireland but, bound by hereditary prejudices and hampered by tactlessness and sometimes stupidity in high places, it has seemed to make little progress. For the last five years virtually a state of war has existed.

So far as the terms have become public, they lead one to believe that words and phrases have played a considerable part in the settlement. But sometimes words and phrases are worth fighting about, if the connotation some relation that men hold to be intolerable. In this case the British constitution has received a severe jolt, for the Irish refuse to swear allegiance to the king, and the king, and the king accepts the situation.

For the first time in the history of the British monarchy, people are to be accepted lawfully as citizens who refuse to take the oath of allegiance. Note the manner in which the difficulty has been met. The Irish "swear true faith and allegiance to the constitution of the Irish Free State," and promise that they "will be faithful to his majesty king George V and his heirs and successors by law." And the Irish acknowledge "common citizenship of Ireland with Great Britain" and "adherence to the membership of the group of nations forming the British commonwealth of nations."

It may be said that the Irish acknowledge the king as their leader but not as their ruler. The king is accepted as the living symbol of the unity of the empire or "British commonwealth of nations," but apparently not as liege lord; it is doubtful if, under the agreement, the term "subject" can be properly applied to the Irish. The Irish are to be citizens, not subjects, if one may judge from the press summary so far received.

The concession made by Lloyd George after his final conference with the king is a momentous one, but if it may wound the sovereign's pride it does not endanger the empire. It is virtually a dominion status after all that is given or Ireland, but with special privileges that so far have never been offered to another dominion under the crown.

The word "dominion" is hateful to the Irish, who have at last secured the lawful right to call themselves a "Free State" and "nation." No other British dominion has that right. Ireland is not to be a "republic," but it is the next thing to it. Under the terms of the agreement just signed, Ireland will eventually be much freer than any of the United States.

Ireland has found a solution within the British empire. The Herald has often said that England would never turn Ireland loose unless forced to do so, and she has not waived the point of maintaining the integrity of the empire, even though the agreement substitutes the word "commonwealth" for the word "empire."

This is no domestic or internal affair. It is all the world's concern, and all the world will rejoice greatly when the word finally comes that the pact has been ratified, signed and sealed, and that the 800 year war, which has brought nothing but disgrace and loss to the English, has been brought to an end.

The farmers don't care one iota How high the price of coal may go. Their corn crop fill their bins galore.

And so they say with vim, "Got darn it—

If coal stays up and corn goes lower we'll keep our crop of corn and burn it!"

Of through the Corn Belt quite a number of farmers are said to be considering the advisability of heating the homes this winter with corn instead of coal. Even some of the smaller cities are debating which is cheaper. At Windom, Minnesota, a press report states that corn may be used in the municipal power plant. The engineers figure the plant can be operated more economically on corn at present prices than it can on the grade of coal they are able to purchase at \$10.70 a ton.

WAVE OF BAD CHECKS SPREADING OVER THE STATE

Reports are coming in from all sections of the state indicating that the bad check situation is probably worse than in former years; forgeries, checks without funds and fraudulent buying appear to be daily occurrences everywhere. Several important arrests have been made at San Antonio, Houston, Comanche, and other places. The Retail Merchants Associations and Secretaries will give their members very valuable service by giving this matter special attention and they should insist that merchants who have filed a complaint with the county attorney, the justice of the peace, sheriff or police department, stand by their complaints, even after the check has been made good and appear in court when the case comes up as the main witness for the state. Unless your merchants will co-operate with the county and city officials they cannot expect very much co-operation. It is not only wrong to use your county and city officials as a collecting agency, but it is also a violation of the law to file a complaint and after-

wards refuse to appear as prosecuting witness.

In a newspaper article, published December 1st, in one of the large cities of this state, the chief of detectives of that city accused the merchants of using his department as a collecting agency and of failure to prosecute after arrests were made stating that he was disgusted with the situation and that he instructed his force of detectives to pay no attention to check forgers and swindlers unless the proper sworn affidavit was made, as the merchants in his city refused to co-operate with the police department in securing convictions after arrests were made and checks were paid on account of these arrests.

Our bogus check law is a good law and it is very effective, but our merchants must co-operate with our law enforcement officers in securing convictions. Let us co-operate along these lines and we will secure the conviction of many a forger and swindler.

tempted sin of burning corn when so many people in other parts of the world are starving. And it does seem bad, but why blame the farmer? It is not the farmer's fault that the price of coal is out of line with the price of corn, and there is no person, either moral or economic why he should be expected to haul good corn many miles over bad roads and haul poor quality, expensive coal back home over the same muddy highways.

And corn is good fuel. A pound of dry corn on the cob is about equal in heating value to a half pound of Illinois or Iowa soft coal. The farmer who lacks storage space or has an oversupply of corn need feel no pricks of conscience in looking upon it as his winter's fuel supply.

The inborn feeling that it is sinful willfully to destroy food is a heritage of the ages when famines were more common than they are now. Perhaps it is well that we have that feeling, but after all, food is no more sacred than fuel and clothing and shelter.

The farmer's business is to grow food, which he trades for the products of other hands; and when prices are in the balance everybody prospers. But now the price of corn is out of balance with the price of coal. In that case the farmer is justified in using his product directly if he can do so with profit to himself. It is one way, possibly a drastic way, to restore the balance both of prices and of sanity.

After all, what is corn but a form of fuel? Dietitians talk about calories required to maintain human existence, and engineers about the thermal units needed to run a power plant. Both terms are fuel units.

We grow cereals and vegetables to feed our human bodies. Moreover, we burn up vast quantities of these products in other animals to obtain a quarter of their food value in the form of butter and eggs and meat products. The assimilative processes of animal nutrition are essentially slow-burning processes whose efficiency in producing human food is slow. Looked at from this point of view, burning food is an old and highly respectable practice and farmers who burn corn in hogs get the highest possible prices for their grain.

Another thing, corn is an annual crop. As long as the soil exists we shall grow corn, but not so with coal or petroleum; their days are limited. When they are gone we may be obliged to depend upon corn for our principal source of carbon. It is the greatest carbon producing plant in the world to-day. Many men believe we shall soon run our automobiles on corn alcohol when we do we shall be burning corn.

Engineers and scientists look upon these matters coldly and impersonally. They recognize corn for what it is—a fuel plant—and they hope to see its use greatly extended as fuel. They approach the subject with open minds and cast aside the old superstition of the sacredness of food.

Other people may as well accus-

tom themselves to the same viewpoint. They should accustom themselves also to the thought—and this should be of especial interest to those who are responsible for the high price of coal—that there is a limit to the prices they can get for their services or their product.

So it is purely an economic matter which should be decided solely in accordance with the price of corn as compared with the price of other kinds of fuel. Corn may easily become the great balance wheel to curb the rapacity of those who hold to the theory that here is no limit to extortion.—Country Gentleman.

FORMER FEDERAL JUDGE T. S. MAXEY DEAD AT AUSTIN

Austin, Texas, Dec. 5.—Judge T. S. Maxey, 75 years old, who, until 1916 had served 28 years as judge of the United States court of the western district of Texas, died suddenly early today at his home in this city.

Judge Maxey was born in Brandon Miss., Sept. 1, 1846. After attending the public schools, he entered the University of Mississippi, where he remained until he entered the army of the Confederacy, in which he served with distinction until the close of the Civil war.

He later entered the University of Virginia where he graduated in law in 1869. The following year he came to Texas and engaged in the practice of his profession, in which he soon took a high position. He remained active in the practice until 1888, when he was appointed by President Cleveland to the position of United States district of Texas, which includes El Paso. He continued to serve in this capacity until his voluntary retirement in 1916, and during this long service his record is a distinguished one. He was frequently called to sit as member of the circuit court of appeals, and was regarded as one of the strong judges sitting upon that court.

Judge Maxey is survived by his wife, Frances Campbell Maxey, and by one son, Robert Maxey.
