Law Officers Arrest Two In Pool Hall Raid

According to a release from Parmer County Sheriff Walt Yerger, area law enforcement officers conducted a raid on Poncho's Pool Hall at 503 Main St. in Friona. At about 7:20p.m. on April 16, officers from the Sheriff's Department, Friona Police Department, Farwell Police Department, Texico Police Department, and the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission conducted the raid after officers received numerous complaints about the drinking nuisance at the pool hall.

During the inspection of the pool hall premises, evidence of beer and brandy consumption on the premises was found.

Several juveniles were found at the scene and were released. Two adult males were booked into the Parmer County jail on multiple liquor law violations. Some alcoholic beverages were also confiscated.

Ron Carr's Columns Win PPA Awards

Ron Carr's "Out Here" column, which appears weekly in the Bovina Blade and Friona Star was honored with not one, but two plaques during the awards breakfast last Saturday of the Panhandle Press Assn.

The PPA convention, held at the Ambassador Hotel, was the 89th annual convention for publishers and editors in the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, Eastern New Mexico, Western Oklahoma and Southwestern Kansas.

Carr's column was judged best in the "serious columns" category for Division I, which is for weekly newspapers. Another of Carr's entries received the second place plaque for the "humorous columns" category.

Commenting on his winning entry in the "serious" category, the contest judge remarked "Ron Carr is a man in touch with life and its stuff, and is able to convey it to all of his readers. Good

work--the best of the lot." In the "humorous column" category, the judge commented: "Ron creates great fun by being one of those folks he enjoys laughing at most."

Carr also received a second-place plaque for a feature photograph he took last fall of Friona fans decked out in their rain gear and umbrellas at the Chiefstain-Muleshoe football game.

The Friona Star won third place in its division in the "sports page" category.

A highlight of the convention was a speech by Willis Webb, publisher of the Jasper Newsboy in East Texas regarding the dragging death of a black resident and the arrest and subsequent trial of his killer, and the incident's effect on his small town.

Attending the convention in addition to Carr were publisher Bill Ellis and Hannah Lookingbill, Carr's mother.

Local Girl Aids Kosovar Refugees

(The following article was submitted to the Friona Star by Debbie Reeve, a missionary assisting in the Kosovo crisis. She is a Friona High School graduate and her parents are Floyd and Betty Reeve. Her grandmothers are Luella Drake and Faye Reeve, all of Friona.)

While most Americans were in front of their televisions watching Kosovo refugees stream into surrounding countries, three Smith County residents were witnessing the crisis firsthand.

"It was a massive sea of people," said Brett Harwood, an international relief officer with Garden Valley-based Youth With A Mission. "We were seeing 1000 people an hour coming through on foot, in small cars or tractors. There were hundreds of tractors. The official United Nations count was 320,000 refugees into Albania."

Harwood, photographer Randy Saterfield and Debbie Reeve, the YWAM Mercy Works director, all of Garden

Valley, returned home Saturday from a ten-day mission in Kukes, Albania.

The refugees' suffering is unimaginable, they said.

"It was very, very cold and they had no wood to make fires so they are burning plastic," Ms. Reeve said. "That's emitting toxic smoke, and sanitation is a disaster. It's horrible in every way."

Many refugees have walked for six or seven days, carrying their children and their wounded through the cold, and sleeping in the mud with no blankets, the team members said.

The refugees come to Albania with basic needs. A YWAM team of 35 from all over North America and Europe is doing its best to meet them.

After a strategic planning meeting of all the Baltic YWAM teams last week, Ms. Reeve, Harwood and Saterfield have returned home to enlist their

community's help. "I encourage all the people in East Texas to pray," said Ms. Reeve. "Whether they believe in this war and whether they fully understand it, one thing we can all do is pray for peace. Pray and give. In the next two weeks, we hope to raise \$100,000 to provide food, water and blankets." She said that raising

money and support is the first priority that came out of last week's meeting.

Next, she said, YWAM hopes to mobilize more volunteers to Albania, get necessities to the refugees and then train Albanian churches to minister to the refugees' emotional needs.

Ms. Reeve said she is ready to go back herself when the money is raised.

"You get exhausted really fast so we basically work in shifts," she said. "The need is so great. People need comfort, they're needing hugs and someone to offer hope. We see it as our job to share the comfort and hope and love of Jesus with people."

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

70 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 26, 1929

Friona was visited last Saturday by what was perhaps the most costly fire in its history, when the immense piles of grain heads and ear corn in the Doggett Grain Company's yard caught fire. Wind swept the fire from the northwest corner of the yard to the south, and soon the entire yard, consisting of three city blocks, was in flames. Estimates put the loss at not less than \$12,000.

60 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 28, 1939

Tuesday of this week several Friona men were invited by Hugh L. Clearman, Government Entomologist, to visit a section of Parmer County east of Friona, to witness the emergence of millions of young grasshoppers. Mr. Clearman assured us that the hoppers we saw coming out of the ground, literally by the thousands, were the real

"migratory" variety, and if nothing is done about them, they will take wing within six weeks and be ready to destroy crops many miles from their place of origin.

45 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 29, 1954

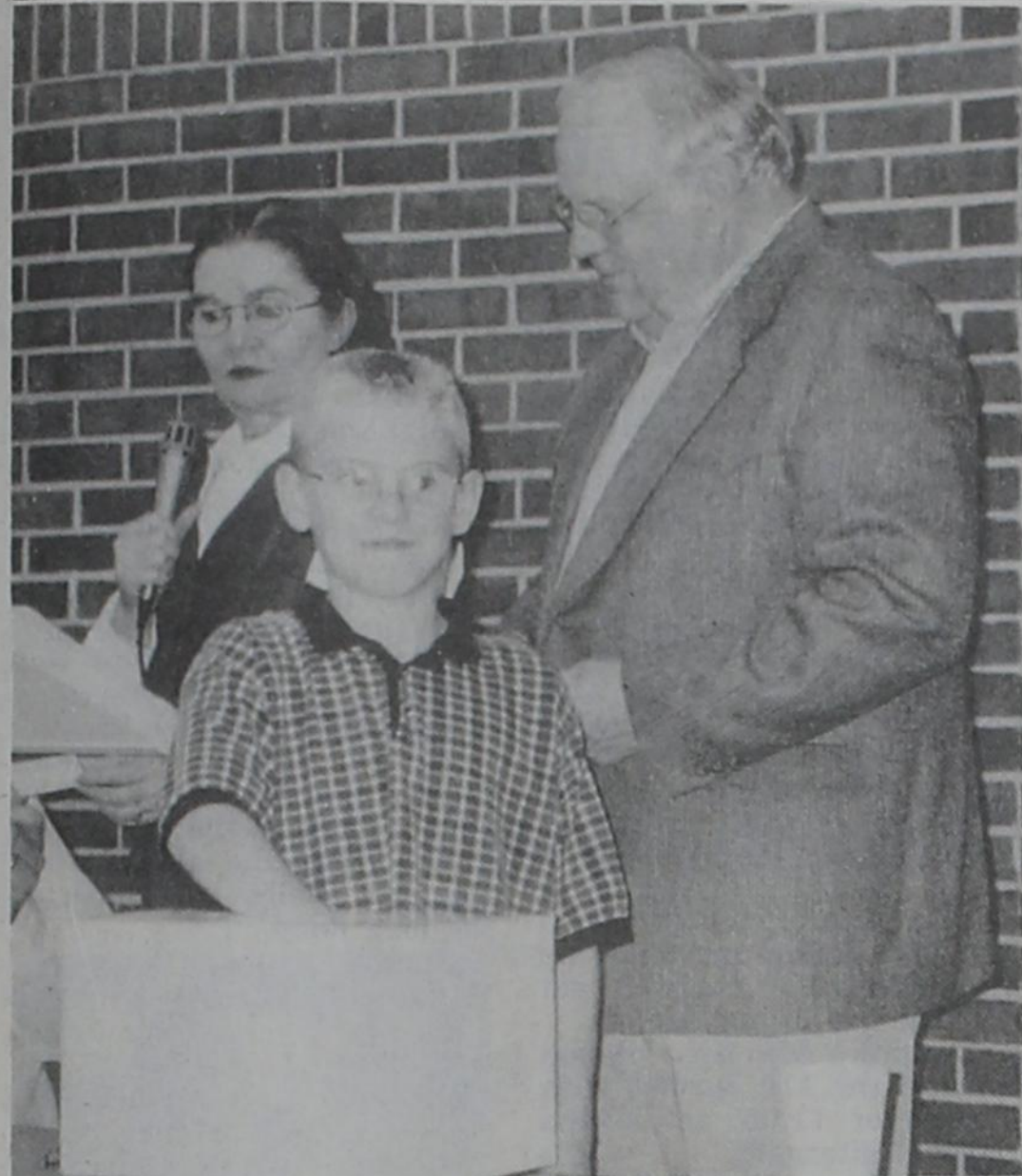

"It's Time To Sweat The Small Stuff!"



The title of the best-selling book is "DON'T SWEAT THE SMALL STUFF...and it's all small stuff!"

It is a catchy and warm, fuzzy title. Like many other best sellers, the title is better than the book.

The equally warm and fuzzy "Chicken Soup" series is another example. They started with "Chicken Soup For The Soul" and because sales were so good, there is now a "Chicken Soup" book for every classification of person on the planet.

Chicken Soup For The Convict Soul will soon be at a prison library near you.

I think the authors of these kinds of books are probably just as interested in the money they make as the message they try to deliver.

I must be different than most ordinary people because I have always tended to sweat the small stuff. It is the little things that have always irritated me the most.

For instance, in my column last week I wrote about a near tragic auto accident on one of our country roads. A local high school girl had been in her wrecked car all night and was found early the next morning.

In gathering information about the incident, I was told by three separate sources that the person who found her was Mr. Johnny Hand, a farmer who lives in the area.

After the paper was printed, I found out that I was in error. In the scheme of things, it could probably be described as one of the "small stuffs" we are not supposed to sweat. The parties involved agreed but I sweated it anyway and will feel better when it is straightened out.

The young lady in the accident, Angela Fitzgerald, was found by Gary Hand, who was out checking his cattle and water.

Gary lives in Friona, but had gone out to check on things before time for church. He had a cell phone in his truck, which he used to call emergency personnel and his

mother. Gary's parents are John and Billie Jo Hand who live near the accident site. Billie Jo came with blankets and comfort for Angela.

John Hand and Johnny Hand are cousins and live near each other out in the country. Their family says that people are always getting them confused.

I apologize to both Hand families for the mixup on my part and any inconvenience I might have caused.

Sometimes it makes us feel better to sweat the small stuff, fix it, and go on with our lives until the next batch of small stuff pops up.

It seems that millions of people are looking for answers to living in books like "Small Stuff." The author writes profound mini-motivation statements like "100 years from now nobody will ever know the difference." My mother has been telling me that long before this book came out.

People are looking for simple answers to the difficult task of living. Why else would thousands of pilgrims flock to a remote Peruvian village when an image of the Virgin Mary is found on a tortilla.

Religious symbols and images have been found on potato chips, window panes, and ceramic statues that bleed and cry real tears.

The Shroud of Turin is a cloth said to be the one used to cover the body of Jesus in his tomb. His image is outlined in the fabric, they say. Worshippers flock to the shrine.

I don't feel much like writing this week. To tell you the truth I am confused and more than a little worried about the events going on in the world.

The book says it's all small stuff. Somehow I think the concept of small stuff would not be welcomed in Littleton, Colorado right now. Not if you lost a son or daughter only one week shy of their high school graduation.

Not if that son or daughter was brutally executed by a couple of "good kids" who just went a little crazy.

Since the school shootings occurred, an endless number of psychologists and psychiatrists will parade across the TV screens trying to answer "WHY" and they will not give answers to make us feel any better.

Politicians will posture about what the federal government can do to stop senseless killings by lost youth. The answer is that they can do nothing.

We have laws already that now will be followed by more laws. Hands will be wrung and metal detectors will be installed.

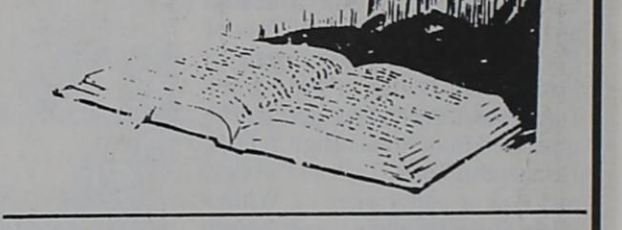

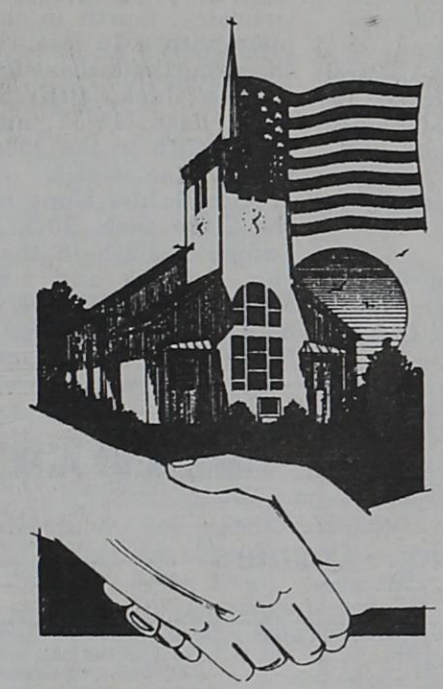

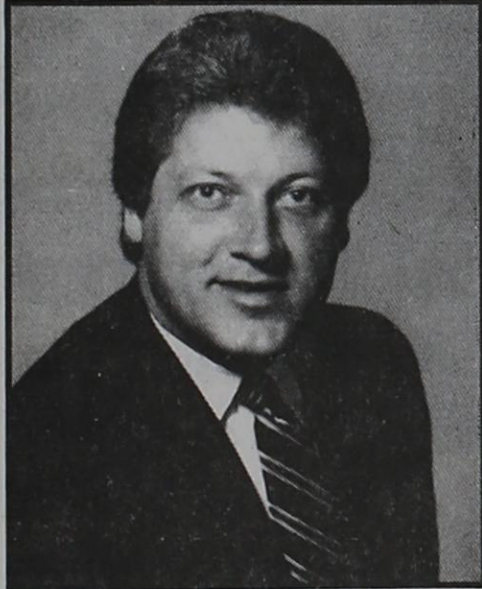

Frionan's Grandson Receives Bell Award

Profoundly hearing-impaired five-year-old, Phillip "P.J." Gregory, of Albuquerque, New Mexico, has been awarded a 1999 Parent-Infant Financial Aid Award from the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf, an international organization based in Washington, D.C.

Phillip is the grandson of Bob and Judy Beck, and Harold and Trell Taylor, of Friona. Phillip's parents, Phillip and Debbie Gregory, will use his award for tuition at the Presbyterian Ear Institute's oral school at La Voz de Ninos in Albuquerque. They will also purchase replacement ear moulds for his hearing aids.

Phillip was diagnosed with profound hearing loss when he was three years old. He was then fitted with hearing aids and began special training.

Early identification, immediate amplification, and intensive attention-including specialized training both in and outside the home--will make it possible for Phillip to make great progress in his communication skills as he grows and acquires speech and language.

Already, Phillip is a good listener and he can lipread well. He also uses a mixture of gesture and speech to communicate--especially in regards to his interests: dinosaurs, crafts and sharing about his family.

With an oral education, Phillip is being given the opportunity to participate fully in the normal-hearing world, eventually using his speech and listening skills to become an independent member of society.

This year, families of 116 hearing-impaired infants and toddlers received more than \$100,000 from the Bell Association Parent-Infant Financial Aid Program. Now in its thirteenth year, the program has helped nearly one thousand youngsters and their families undertake a successful oral education--from the start.

Founded in 1890 by Dr. Alexander Graham Bell (best known for his invention of the telephone), the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf is a unique organization dedicated to

improving opportunities for people who are deaf or hard of hearing.

The association's mission is to promote early identification of hearing loss, and to encourage individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing to learn to speak, speechread, and use their residual hearing to communicate and succeed in the normal-hearing world.

Members include parents of children who have hearing losses, people who are deaf or hard of hearing, educators, audiologists, speech-language pathologists, otologists, psychologists and other professionals in the fields relating to hearing loss.

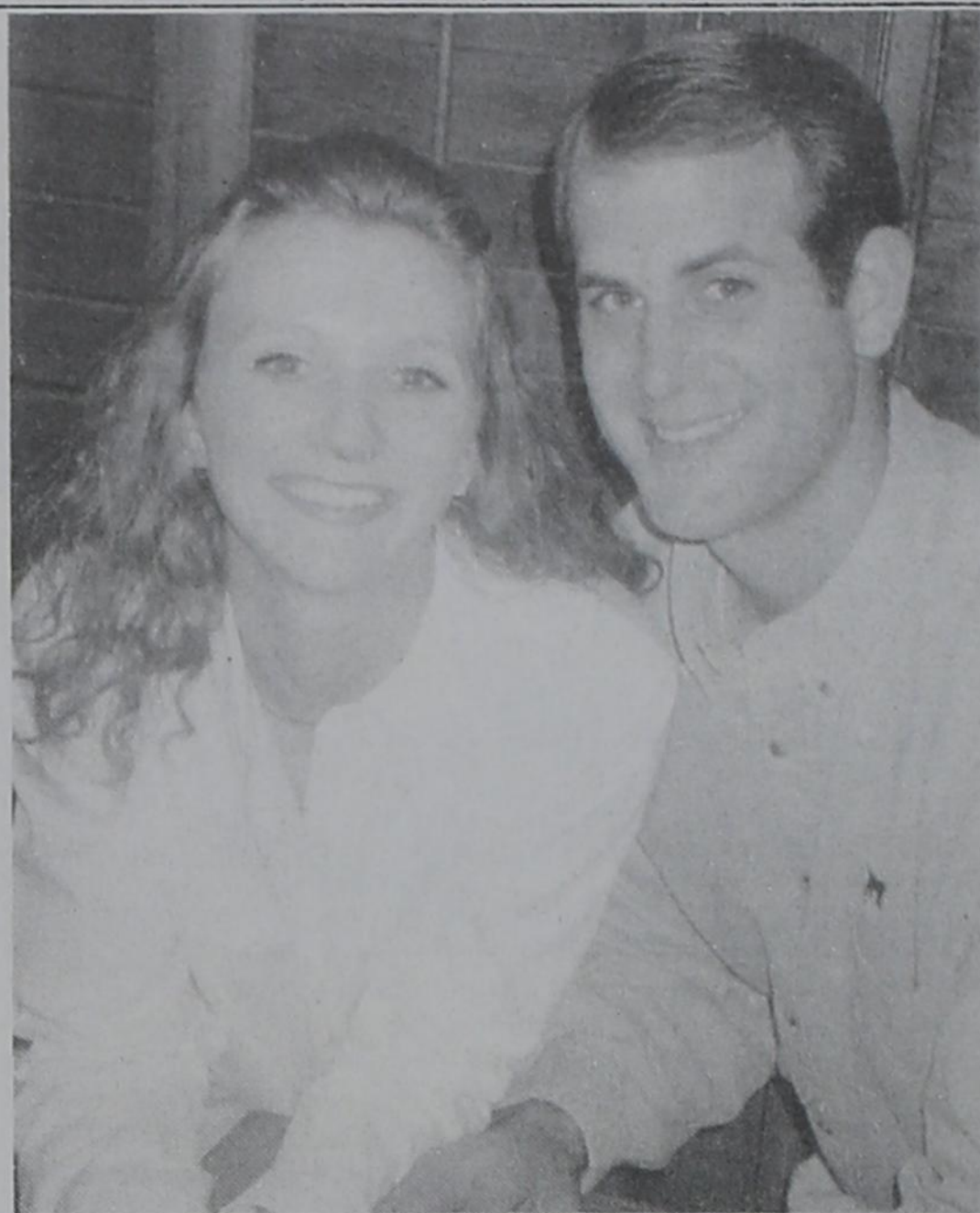

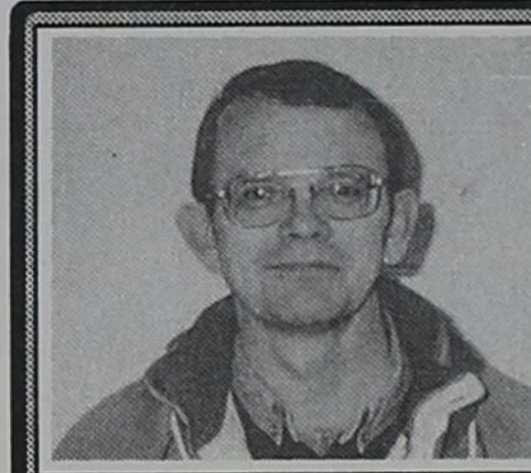

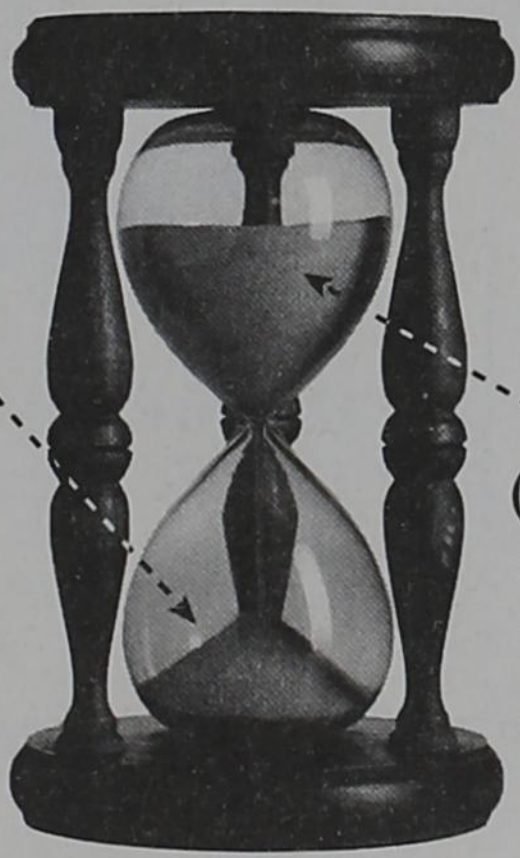

Choosing The Right Sunglasses

Now that many sunglasses are tested and labeled by the American National Standard Institute (ANSI), it's easier than ever to choose safe and effective protection against the sun's rays.



Look for sunglasses that block as much ultraviolet radiation as possible and at least 75 per cent of visible light. For most people, **general purpose** glasses are adequate for any outdoor activity. These block from 60 to 92 per cent of visible light, depending on color, and at least 95 per cent of UVB and 60 per cent of UVA rays. **Special purpose** lenses, best for beaches and for skiing, block at least 99 per cent of UVB and 60 per cent of UVA rays. **Cosmetic** lenses are lightly tinted and adequate for in-town use but not bright sunlight.

Test sunglasses yourself to make certain that lenses don't distort colors excessively or distort shapes and lines. Make sure that frames are comfortable and large enough to keep out light from the sides, the top and the bottom. Brown or amber tints screen blue light best.

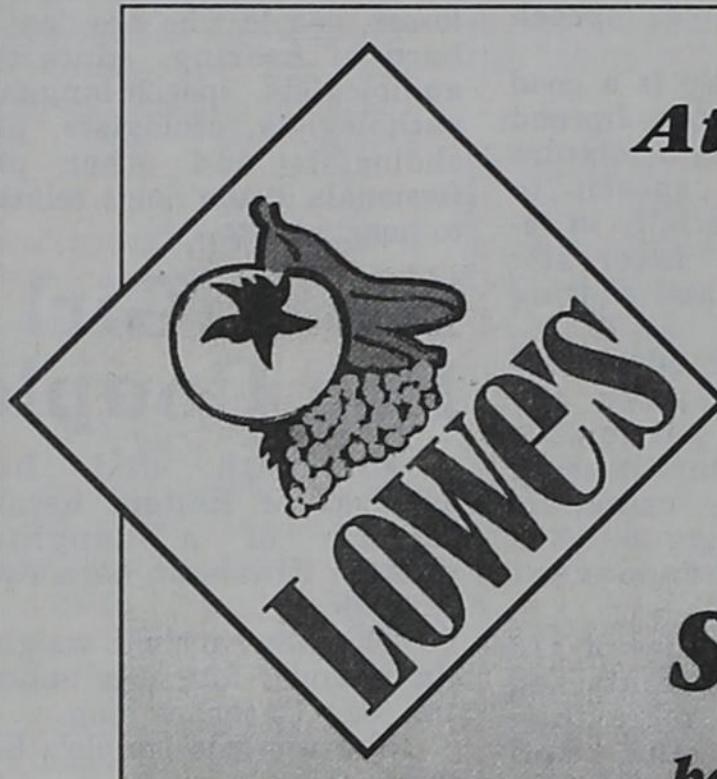




