Dr. R. L. Irving of Fort Davis, delivered a magnificent Memorial Day address or sermon, which eclipsed any Chautauqua address ever delivered in our city.

Dr. Irving has won for himself the admiration of every true American in Marfa for he voiced their sentiments and did not beat around the bush to tell them what had to be done to uphold our good Government.

We only wish everyone in Presidio county could have heard this wonderful speaker, for he would have put them to thinking.

At the conclusion of the services at the Opera House, the American Legion departed for Fort Davis, where an appropriate program had been prepared and where the Legion members also placed several markers upon the graves of departed comrades.

From there the Legion departed for Valentine, where they also conducted the services in that place.

After the conclusion of the services at Valentine the town turned out and gave them a royal welcome and prepared for them a delicious supper, which was certainly appreciated, for the Legionnaires had become quite hungry and fatigued from the long overland drive.

Much credit is due the American Legion for the way they handled this Memorial Day program and to Col. McNarney for his cooperation.

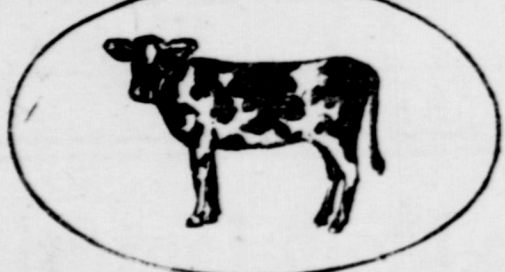

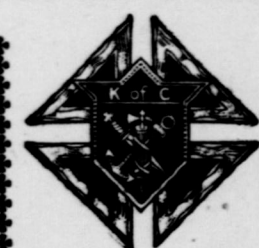
