NEAR EAST RELIEF SOUGHT

We have with us this week Dr. Dixie Tucker, who has come in the interest of the Near East Relief work. She will address the people of Marfa next Sunday night at 8:15 p. m. in the Opera House, and will present to us the conditions of things existing in Armenia and Russia.

In order to give Dr. Tucker full and hearty co-operation, the churches of Marfa have agreed to hold a union meeting, the pastor of each church urging his congregation to attend this service in the Opera House. A full attendance is hoped for, as Dr. Tucker promises to give a very interesting talk on the relief work now being carried on by the Christian people of America.

Moving pictures will be shown at this union meeting to give us an idea of what the conditions are like in the near East, for which this relief is sought.

Then on Monday afternoon, at the Queen Theatre, Dr. Tucker will show, free of charge, the motion picture entitled "Alice in Hungerland."

The time set for this picture will be at 3:00 o'clock sharp and everybody in Marfa is invited to attend. It is a wonderful picture and gives a vivid impression of what this hungerland, of which we know so little, is like.

Dr. Tucker will try to collect enough old clothes, bedding, shoes and other goods from Alpine, Marfa, Fort Davis and Valentine to make up a car load, which the railroads will carry to Dallas, Texas, free of charge.

In Dallas these old clothes and other goods are packed in strong boxes and shipped via New York, to Armenia and Russia, and handed out by American relief workers, now working in that field.

Dr. Tucker is a former missionary to the Near East and is loved by all Christian people for the sacrificing interest she is taking in furthering the aid for suffering humanity.

The New Era wishes her God-speed in her good work for we appreciate her untiring efforts to do good.

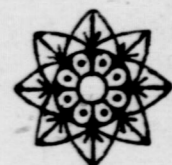

Among those who departed on this Mexico trip were: Tom Rawls, Jack Rawls, W. B. Mitchell, Burton Mitchell, Will Russell and Capt. J. C. Short of the Seventh Cavalry.

These men are determined to find out what is being done with the cattle stolen on this side and who is responsible for their theft.

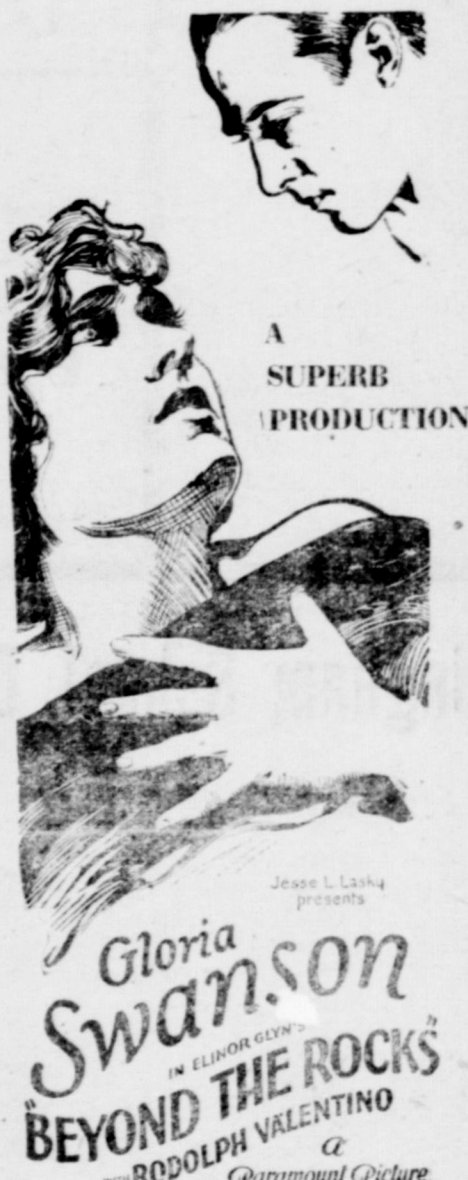

The Skillman Grove Campmeeting.

Tho' the quiet of the Valley may be disturbed by the roar of many autos and the pure mountain air be poisoned by the exhausts of noxious gases, these disturbances are only fleeting.

The eternal silence comes back with all of its intensity and the unlimited supply of ozone is wafted down from the hills for the glory of God and the health of the many campers out in this wonderful spot.

It is great to live these six days out with God; to gaze out over the verdant valley and stately moun-

tains, with their multi-colored cliffs. To see the workings of Nature, thrown upon Nature's screen as it pictures, the rising and setting of sun; the fleeting clouds; the brilliant foliage of the trees, and the laughing shadows as they cast themselves out over the landscape. And then, the mellow moonlight as it floods the valley with its silvery light—all these things go towards making each individual feel that God is really and truly a living being, whose omnipresence can be felt, and whose handwork can be so plainly seen.

And then, the human touch—we are His children, met here to serve the Great Giver of Life and the One who has made these things possible, and it is good to shake old friends by the hand and to feel that to them also, this spot and these emotions are sacred.

Is it any wonder then that the eloquent words of the ministers enter into receptive ears, tuned to catch the truth that is as old as the world, yet always new?

To eat of a breakfast as hearty as you do of any other meal, and to place these meals like this under your belt with "nary" a pain or regret as a remorseful conscience—then you have life as it is at our great Bloys Camp-meeting.

A well, 200 feet in depth, equipped with gasoline engine, elevated tank, pipe fixtures and pure water piped to every camp, cement floors for tents, metal houses and cook sheds, with brick furnaces—all these go towards the conveniences of the material man and are a permanent

fixture upon the ground—silent sentinels to watch the spot thru the twelve long months that intervene between meetings.

The camps are lighted with electricity, generated at the grounds.

The metal and cement tabernacle with the pretty memorial shaft to Bro. Bloys, stands in the midst of these permanent fixtures—the rest, the tented city—springs up like a great white flower, to linger six days, then to vanish away with the campers as they flit out through the gap to the West, or down the valley to the East.

One thousand people or more listened to heart-stirring sermons by Drs. Porter, Burma and Wright, and the tabernacle was seated to its full capacity, while great numbers listened to the Word of God from their autos, packed close in.

Thirty Mexican cooks prepare 24 fat, juicy beefs, soda biscuits, all kinds of fresh vegetables and canned goods, in a way that can be equalled by no other cooks in the world.

And the good housewives of the ranchmen bring in great quantities of home-made preserves, butter and delicious cakes of every variety to blend in with a perfect meal.

Between services the high-power autos enable the visitors to view the beauties of the landscape along the roadways to Fort Davis, Valentine and Marfa, which are respectively 16, 24 and 20 miles away.

The pulpit is adorned with flowers, delicate and fragrant, from the many ranch yards nearby. The meeting is in the hands of Rev. Dr. Irving of Fort Davis, and he can come nearer filling Bro. Bloys' place than any man in Texas.

The organist (or the pianist) is Miss Jessie Jones, who needs no introduction. The singing is in the hands of Mr. Chas. Stone, who has a wonderful voice and has thrilled us all by his solos.

Out here everybody puts their soul into their voice, and the angels,

listening, are well pleased.

We are indebted very much to Rev. Ira H. McClymonds for his perfect playing on the trombone, and to his wife for the harmonious accompaniment upon the piano.

Rev. L. R. Millican, the "Shepherd of the Hills," is even the strong arm of support for Bro. Irving.

The other ministers present are: Rev. Jno. A. McMillan, Alpine; Rev. Hubert Smith, Alpine; Rev. Slade, Valentine; Rev. George Baines, Ft. Worth; Rev. Strickler, Yoakum; Rev. Ira H. McClymonds, State College, New Mexico.

All these have permanent camp-sheds, tables, benches, etc.

There are many smaller camps that scatter about amongst the trees and many basket parties are held where the cooling breezes fan the cheek and whet the appetite.


To one and all this is a glorious spot, and each and all of us have dedicated it to God, that He may keep it sacred for His children for another twelve months.

And the farewell service on Tuesday morning leaves no eye undimmed by tears of the parting. With our hearts as well as our voices we sing: "God be With You 'Til We Meet Again."

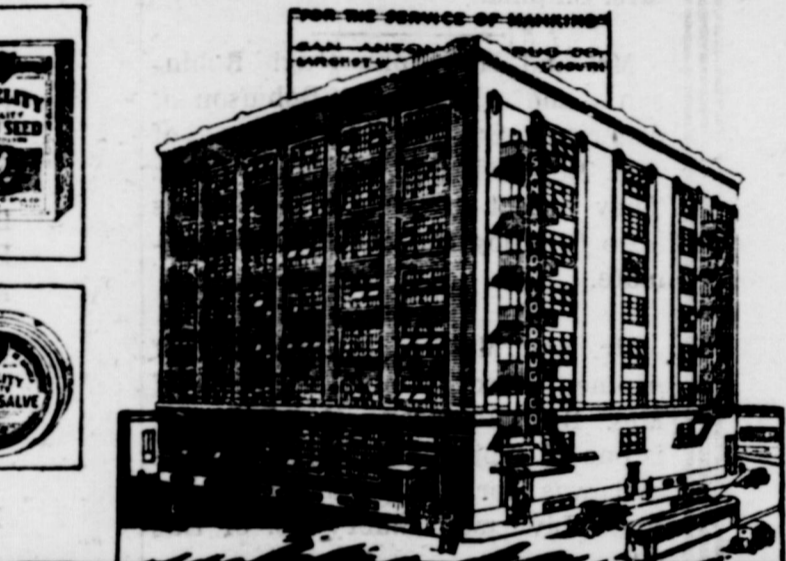
