## WEST TEXAS CHURCHES OF CHRIST HOLD BIG CONVENTION IN MARFA

Last Monday night marked the close of the big convention held in our city by the West Texas Churches of Christ.

The Convention was called to order Saturday evening, September 30th, by Rev. H. M. Bandy, who acted as chairman, and the work for the three days session was soon under way.

Bro. Bandy presided in his quiet, dignified way throughout all the sessions of the Convention. His many years of consecrated service as a pioneer preacher in this great state made him especially prepared to make instructive and encouraging mention of each topic and speaker.

It was one of the most interesting assemblies of Christian people that ever met in our city and was attended by many delegates who came from far and near.

After Rev. Bandy had finished with the formalities of opening the Convention, Rev. M. A. Buhler lead the

devotional services, following came the "Get Acquainted Service," which closed with a special song.

Rev. J. B. Holmes then addressed the Convention on the subject of "Texas Missions," and his message was well received by all present.

Following this address came the appointment of the various committees, also some announcements and the final adjournment for the first days work.

The Lord's Day morning session opened at 8:30, with Praise Service by Rev. M. A. Buhler, followed by a magnificent address by J. D. Jackson of Alpine, Texas, on the subject of "The Need of More Efficient Teachers in Bible Schools."

Then came a general discussion, at which Mrs. J. T. Brown of Alpine, gave a very instructive lecture on "Teachers Preparation."

Mrs. Percy Magee of Pecos, lectured on "Teachers Character," which was very good. Mrs. L. C. Brite then addressed the Convention on "Teachers Influence," and her address was very interesting and instructive. Also the lecture of S. B.

T. Van Horn of Barstow closed the discussion with a talk on "How to Make a Lesson Stick," and it was to the point.

Then the regular Sunday school, led by Supt. George Chastain, was held and a good attendance reported.

Following came a song service by the Christian church choir and the special songs were sweet and in hearing with the occasion.

Rev. A. C. Johnson of Pecos, then addressed the Convention on the "Message of the Churches of Christ of West Texas, and Why," and he held the audience with his eloquent way in which he presented his appeal. It was a wonderful address and greatly enjoyed.

With a few announcements the morning service closed.

The Sunday afternoon session was opened by Rev. H. M. Bandy, who held the Devotional Services. Then followed the roll call and reports from churches, and it was a revelation to hear of the good reports that most of the churches of Christ reported—of the wonderful

work that was being accomplished in the various communities.

Mrs. Una Casner of Alpine, then conducted session on Woman's Work, having responses from Mrs. O. W. Williams of Fort Stockton, Mrs. R. E. Johnson of Pecos, Mrs. J. W. Harris of Marfa. Then Mrs. Berta E. McMasters, State Secretary of Womens Societies, gave an inspiring talk of the work and needs in the world-wide mission fields.

Rev. S. R. McClure of Fort Stockton, then addressed the Convention in a general way on the "Field of West Texas," and he gave light as to the real needs of various communities. It was a very fine address and much appreciated.

With a song and benediction, this closed the Sunday afternoon session. Sunday evening session opened with the discussion of Christian Endeavor work, led by Mrs. J. T. Brown, of Alpine; also a fine program of special music, which the choir rendered.

Then Rev. J. B. Holmes delivered a splendid sermon which was preached to a crowded house, after which a prayer was said and the evening session closed.

Monday morning's session opened with a devotional service, led by A. C. Johnson of Pecos. Then "The Co-operation needed among our congregations in West Texas" was presented by J. T. Terrell of Alpine.

Business session period resulted in a decision to have the next meeting at Pecos and selection of present district officers of Convention. "Maintenance of Budget," given by J. B. Holmes was instructive and well received.

Then M. A. Buhler gave a short address on "Evangelism."

The sermon of the morning was by Paul G. Preston, pastor of First Christian church, El Paso. His masterly and eloquent Gospel message on "How I May Know I Am A Child of God" was a spiritual feast.

Monday afternoon session. Devotional period by Dr. Preston. The message on "Stewardship of Life and Property," given by L. C. Brite, was appreciated.

Mr. R. L. Marcus, President of Sul Ross Normal College of Alpine in his usual efficient manner, brought a wonderful message on "Christian Education."

"The Church's Duty in Choosing, Training and Sending Out Workers," was the subject of address by Arthur W. Jones, pastor of Austin Park Christian Church, El Paso, Texas. Mr. Jones is well and favorably known in Marfa and it was a privilege to hear him again.

Mr. A. C. Johnson gave the report of the Committee on Recommendations, which was unanimously passed by the Convention.

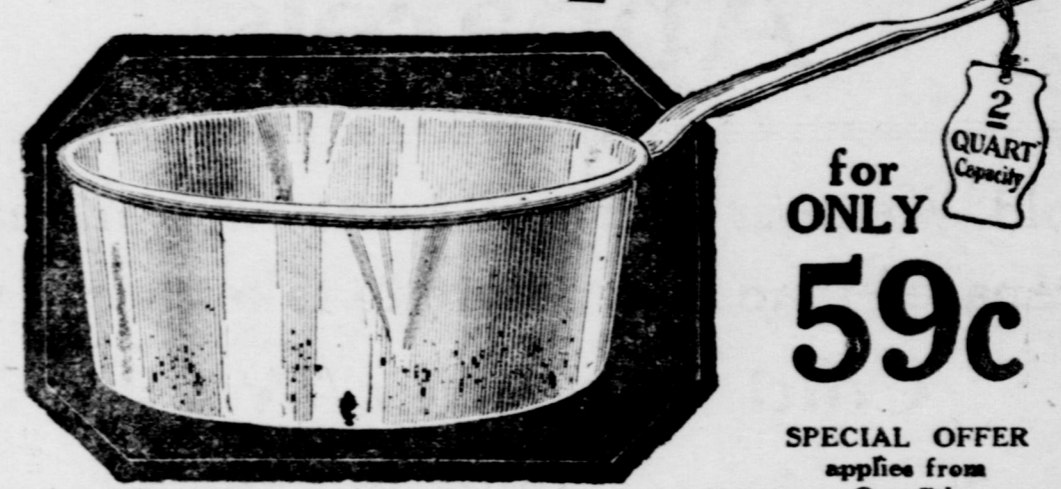

These Kokernot steers are in splendid shape and are about the last 3 and 4 year old steers in this immediate section of West Texas, other ranchmen having disposed of their old steers some time ago.

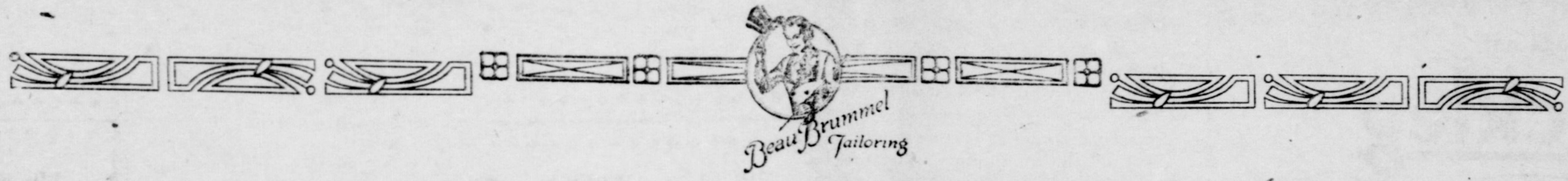

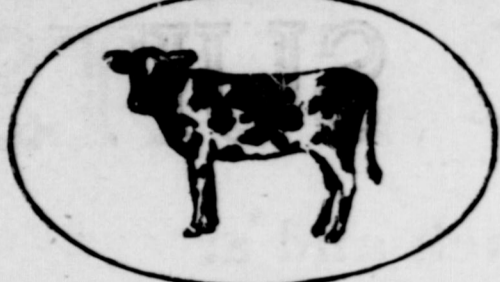

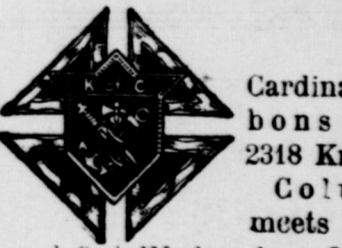
