### DR. B. F. BERKELEY, MAYOR OF ALPINE, TO RUN FOR SENATE

Dr. Benjamin F. Berkeley, mayor of Alpine, yesterday threw his hat in the ring as a candidate for the unexpired term of Senator R. M. Dudley, provided the latter is successful in his race for mayor at the city election in April. A special election will be held to choose a successor to Senator Dudley if he resigns.

Dr. Berkeley, who is the first publicly announced candidate for the place which may be vacated by Senator Dudley, is president of the Alpine State bank. He has been chief executive of his home city for seven years and a resident there 25 years. He is a native of Kentucky and is 47 years old.

"Of course it is problematical now," Dr. Berkeley said yesterday, "but I am in the race if Senator Dudley is successful in his candidacy for mayor of El Paso. I am not a lawyer and I am not a politician; I am deeply interested in the livestock and agricultural industries of this section.

"I am not going to make any promises. It is enough to say that if I am elected to the office, it will be my purpose to give the people of this section what they deserve."

Dr. Berkeley said that he had always taken an active part in state and national politics and in 1916 campaigned in New Mexico for the Wilson ticket. He was at one time president of the dry farm congress. He has no other political office than that of mayor of Alpine, he stated.

(Editor's Note.—Dr. Berkeley is the brother of Mrs. John Hart, of our city and has many friends in Marfa who will be glad to hear of his announcement. That he will get the whole-hearted support of Presidio county goes without saying, for we know that if there is a man in this section of the great Southwest who is interested in our welfare, Dr. Berkeley is one of them. He is a public spirited man, a booster of every enterprise worth while and a man who helped put Alpine on the map. The New Era is for him and we hope he will make the race without an opponent, for he is worthy of the position.)

THE KLU KLUX  
(J. J. Kilpatrick)

Somewhere in the South, I will not say where, lived Zeb Smith with his wife and several children. Smith occasionally got drunk and when he did, he sometimes, though not severely, would chastise his spouse for upbraiding him. While the good wife doubtless meant well, yet a woman at times can be insanely provoking.

A number of attempts were made to have the cave-age husband legally punished, but it seemed that a majority of the leading citizens believed a man's wife was his property and that if he saw fit to administer to her, now and then, a gentle spanking it was nobody else's business. However, a few people thought otherwise and finally one dark night horded men dressed in white, took old Zeb out and after belting his rump a number of times, stripped him and re-dressed him in a suit of tar and feathers. In other words, they klu kluxed him, and the question is, did they do wrong?

A year or two ago a Mexican, an American citizen, killed an officer and fled into Mexico. All legal means, I understand, were exhausted to bring the murderer back to this side. Recently three men went over the River and tried to klu klux him, that is, to kidnap him. Did they do right? I do not say they did, but there is an unwritten law whose locus is a variable higher than, or above the unwritten law under which one or more persons are sometimes justified in acting just as there are circumstances when it is right to do wrong that greater good may be accomplished. When, however, the great masses of the people act under this higher law, it is no longer a tar and feather performance or a lynching incident, but a revolution which sweeps away

despotic thrones, parasitic principalities, oligarchies and all other forms of oppressive and corrupt Governments.

While I myself do not believe the Catholics are trying to Romanize our Government or the Jews to get their paws on the State for any evil or unpatriotic motives I do know that in the heart of the Jim Crow Negro there is jealousy, envy and even hatred of the white man and that there are to many foreign agitators among us—opposed to our customs, institutions and laws. And sometimes, in view of the impossibility of reaching the hearts of the buck negro and offensive foreigner by any other means, the "patter-roller" methods of ante-bellum days, followed by a good coat of tar and feathers, would appear to be the most appropriate and efficacious punishment that could be administered.

**MUSIC RECITAL**  
The lovers of music in Marfa were afforded an unusual opportunity to hear good music on Tuesday evening, November 21st, when Miss Mary Vance Pickett, of the Marfa High school faculty, gave a recital in piano, violin and clarinet. This was Miss Pickett's first public appearance in Marfa. She has a solid technical foundation, founded on her study with Madame Marie Kolmova, of Prague, combined with a natural musical taste, which points to a promising future.

It is a long and difficult composition but it was played with perfect technique and excellent interpretation. Miss Pickett's last encore, "The Rosary," a difficult arrangement of double stops, was enjoyed by all. Miss Pickett was assisted by Miss Katherine Mitchell, Miss Frances Mitchell, and Miss Elbertine Williams. As is always the case, Miss Williams pleased the audience equally well with her wonderful voice and her charm of manner. "The Waters of Minnetonka" in all its simplicity and beauty, was sweetly sung by Miss Katherine Mitchell. A bright and attractive number was a violin duet, "The Serenade," by Godard, played by Miss Pickett and Miss Frances Mitchell.

He is putting his milk through a cooling process just as soon as it has been milked; in fact, after the milking of each cow, and the milk is kept at 60 degrees. This keeps the bacteria from multiplying as rapidly as when the milk is not treated.

Mr. Means calls attention to the following clipping from a report of Dr. Craig F. Proper of El Paso, which points out how important it is to keep the milk cool after each milking: "It is pointed out that bacteria multiply in warm milk. A table is appended showing that in milk of a temperature of 140 degrees the number of bacteria doubles in 17 minutes, at 95 degrees in 22 minutes, at 85 degrees in 29 minutes, at 77 degrees in 40 minutes, at 68 degrees in 95 minutes, at 60 degrees in 120 minutes, and at 50 degrees in 955 minutes."

### GREAT MONUMENT TO TO BE ERECTED

To Perpetuate the Memory of the Old Trail Drivers—Public is Asked to Help Build It

All patriotic Texans are urged to contribute from five dollars up toward the erection of a monument to the old time trail drivers—the men who "went up the trail" to Kansas in the early days. The Old Time Trail Drivers Association, of which Geo. W. Saunders of San Antonio is organizer and president, has started a movement to erect a \$30,000.00 monument at Brackenridge Park, San Antonio, which is the logical point on the old trail. Every individual who contributes as much as five dollars will be listed and his or her name will be printed in a neatly bound booklet which will be sent free to all contributors. It will contain interesting facts about the aims and purposes of the Association as well as data in reference to trail driving.

The early cowboys blazed the way for the civilization we today enjoy; they had a part in the history of our great state, and we should perpetuate their memory by erecting this monument. A Texan cannot stand on the field of San Jacinto without feeling a greater devotion to his state; he cannot stand within the sacred precincts of the Alamo, where men died for others, without having his heart purged of selfishness, he cannot think of the old cattle trail without remembering the sacrifices and dangers encountered by the pioneers of a great industry—the cattle industry of our state.

The Northern Trail started in 1867 and closed in 1895. During those 28 years, 9,800,000 cattle and 1,000,000 horses were driven, which estimated 810 per head, amounted to a grand total of \$108,000,000, which was placed in circulation during those years by the establishment of the cattle industry. At the close of the Civil War and during the early seventies our ranges were overstocked with cattle. There was no money in the state. It was up to the early cowmen to find a market for their cattle and the great problem was solved by a few of our most venturesome cowmen driving small herds to Kansas in 1867 and 1886 and from that time on until the trail closed, a steady stream of herds was kept up and the ranges in the different states were gradually stocked, bringing to Texas that prosperity which has existed for so many years.
