



RAIN BENEFITS COTTON IN TEXAS Price Range of Cotton, Grain,

Condition in Texas More Favorable Than in Many Other States, Says Report.

Washington.-Conditions during the week, ending May 29, generally were too wet or too cool for growing crops made public Saturday. It was generally and decidedly too wet in the Southeastern States, except in parts of the Carolinas, while sunshine was deficient and the nights too cool during part of the weeks for warm weather Crops.

Conditions varied in the trans-Mississippi States. It was generally warm and sunshiny in Texas, with beneficial crop growth. *Conditions were decidedly unfavorable, however, in Oklahoma and much of Arkansas.

The weather continued unfavorable for cotton in most sections, the review said and continued:

Much of the week was too cool in the northeastern, central and eastern portions of the cotton belt and rainfall was frequent and in many places heavy or damaging in those sections. Temperatures were above normal in the west gulf sections, however, and beneficial showers occurred in that area. Cotton made fair to very good progress in Texas and chopping and cultivation advanced satisfactorily. It was too cloudy, cool and wet in Oklahoma and much damage resulted from flooding and hail.

The cotton crop condition in Southwestern States was given as follows: Texas: Warm and sunshiny with beneficial rain at about three-fifths of reporting stations. Progress and conditions of cotton were fair to very

good. Some weevil worm activities in

south but damage light. Oklahoma: Cool and sunshine ining rains, hail and flooding bottom lands. Cotton deteriorated generally; washed, drowned out and large acreage must be replanted.

The result is that today there is virtually a complete directory The writer of this received a list of the names of the men who entered the Military academy as a part of the class which graduated in 1883. This class entered the academy in the spring of 1879. On the list received were the names of 20 men whose addresses were not known, and in some few cases it was not known whether those

It was possible for the writer to supply the information concerning six men of whose whereabouts there was ignorance. If anything like this average of returns was maintained it readily can be seen how easily and quickly the authorities of the academy found out where the wanderers are.

Old Ties Still Strong.

Old army men are wondering whether the ties which today bind the members of the individual classes at West Point together are as strong as they were in the days when the classes were small. The class of 1884, for instance, had a graduate membership of only 37 cadets. Three years ago in one class more than 200 cadets received diplomas and their commissions as second lieutenants on graduation meet every five years in reunion at the old school.

Some Clerks Work in Hallways. In some of the department buildings

clerks are working in the halls attempting to do their daily tasks unaffected by the passing of visitors and corridor-frequenters generally. The word is that efficiency is lost, and that it is a poor economy which forbids the spending of a million dollars or so for new buildings in order more than to offset the loss in time and in efficiency which are the net results from crowded and noisy conditions.

Some of the temporary buildings which the government erected in wartime have been removed already. They were insightly affairs, many of them fire-traps and many of them unsafe from '1' stability viewpoint. The razing of these buildings necessitated the removal of many of the clerks to older permanent government buildings

At one time the State, War and Navy building housed all the activities of the three departments named and housed them comfortably. Today only a small part of each of the working The means of tracing men who at forces of the three departments is housed in the building originally given over to the services of state and of the armed forces.

Army and Navy Buildings Crowded. Near the Lincoln Memorial there are two buildings, each of which covers many acres of ground. One of them houses the navy officials and clerks and the other those of the army. These huge buildings are overcrowded. and still other buildings are in use to take care of officials and clerks. One of these big structures is called the Navy building and the other the Munitions building. They were built rapidly just after the United States entered the World war. They will not be torn down for some time to come, for they are of a semi-permanent construction.

These buildings probably will last for twenty years, but one day they must come down because they will be unsafe, and then the country will be confronted by the necessity of erecting two structures, each of which must be much larger than the great State, War and Navy building, which it was thought when it was erected would be adequate for the uses of the three departments for all time.

COTTON EXPORTERS REACH AGREEMENT

Uniform Worldwide Standards Have Been Approved By Large Exchanges.

Washington.-Agreement has been reached between a group of leading cotton exporters and the secretary of conducting the cotton export trade under the new cotton standards act which becomes effective August 1, requiring use of the official cotton standards of the United States in all transactions based on standards in interstate and foreign commerce.

The cotton exporter had felt some uneasiness over the requirements of the new act and Secretary Wallace invited them to Washington.
