

TEXAS WILL DISPLAY ITS POSSIBILITIES

Manufacturers Association to Emphasize Importance of **Buying Texas Products.**

San Antonio, Tex.-That Texas is developing into an industrial state is brought out in a statement this week by G. M. Knebel, executive vice president of the Texas State Manufacturers Association.

"Texas is in the limelight today as possibly it has never been before, and will continue so to be for years to come. We have a land area of 262, 298 square miles, with a population of 4,663,228, which is about 18 persons to every square mile of our territory. We have on deposit in the banks of Texas \$844,554,000; the value of our farm crops in Texas, according to the 1920 census, was \$1,071,527,000; during 1922 Texas produced 116,670. 000 barrels of petroleum, more than 3,000,000 bales of cotton, 158,037,000 bushels of corn, oats and wheat. Texas has more than 6,000,000 cattle. 2,862,000 sheep and 2,326,000 swine. Texas has a railway mileage of more than 16,000. The assessed Texas property value is \$3,380,000,000. Our common school expenditure is over \$30,-000,000 annually. Every citizen of Texas is proud of his citizenship, and the eyes of the world are turning toward Texas and its unlimited possibili-

"To those not informed, little would be thought of Texas as a manufacturing state. However, we lead all Southern states in the value of our manufactured products, which, according to the 1920 United States census, amounted to just \$4,000 less than \$1,000,000,-000, or \$999,996,000.

"In order to remind the people of Texas of the importance of our manufacturing industries, the Texas State Manufacturers Association will inaugurate, during the early fall, a statewide movement, to be known as "Made in Texas" week. Governor Neff will calling for a statewide observance of the week. 'Made in Texas' week will open at high noon on a Monday with the blowing of sirens, whistles, etc... in every community within the State of Texas. In many Texas cities trade parades will be given featuring Texasmade products, or home industry products. "Outlines of the program will be furnished every community within the state, and this can be changed in any way desired. There are some 150,000 people employed in the industries of Texas and for the future welfare of the state these workers should have constant employment. We can expect our state to grow along industrial lines in the same proportion as we stand back of our industries, for it is then that new capital will seek investments within our state. We should learn to live at home, convert our raw materials into the finished products, consume what we need in the state, and sell the remainder to clothe and feed the world. Every citizen of Texas will be expected to give active support and co-operation to this statewide movement. not only during 'Made in Texas' week. but now and every day in the year."

Daily Rations for Draft Horses, Mares and Colts

Experimental and demonstration work by the University of Missouri College of Agriculture shows:

That draft horses averaging in weight approximately 1,600 pounds and which did 4.8 hours a day average farm work, required an average daily ration of 14.91 pounds of grain and 17.12 pounds of timothy hay.

That brood mares may be used effiby gelding or "dry" mares doing the be picked. same work.

That brood mares working and nursing foals required 47 per cent more grain and 32 per cent more hay daily during the suckling period than dry mares. That foals during the suckling

period consumed an average daily ration of 3.58 pounds of grain and 1.35 pounds of hay, in addition to their mother's milk.

That draft colts consumed an average daily ration of 6.68 pounds grain, 7.42 pounds hay daily from weaning time until they were turned in pasture in the spring, a period of 219 days, during which time they gained 330 pounds and weighed at the close of the period 836 pounds.

That it required 4.40 pounds of grain and 4.83 pounds of hay to produce one pound gain on draft colts from weaning time until turned on pasture the next spring.

That in using a grain ration composed of 2 parts corn, 2 parts oats, 1 part bran, it required 10.46 bushels of corn, 18.30 bushels of oats and 292.9 pounds of bran to keep draft colts in good growing condition from weaning time until they were turned on pasture.

The farrowing pen should be dry and well ventilated. Spread straw on the ground, but not enough to let her build a deep nest. Pieces of 2 by 4 nailed pen about eight inches from the floor and eight inches from the wall will tend to keep the sow from crushing her pigs against the walls.

After farrowing, the sow should receive no feed for from 24 to 36 hours, being given only lukewarm water. She should then be fed a small amount of feed for a day or so, and the ration can then be gradually increased. The bulky feeds used during pregnancy are not in order now, for the gains secured on the suckling pigs will be the most efficient gains they will ever make. Skim milk tankage, ground oats, middlings and linseed meal are all good to supply bone-and-muscle-making material, while corn or barley may be used liberally in combination with any of the above mentioned feeds.

BOLL WEEVIL TEST INTEREST FARMERS

Experiment Is Being Made on Farm Near Corpus Christi, Texas.

San Antonio, Tex. - Experiments with the Florida system of boll weevil extermination at the United States experimental farm on the Corpus Christi road is being watched with interest by the cotton planters throughout Southwest Texas. The experiments were started when it was believed that the boll weevil had come out of hibernation for the summer. According to the Florida system of combating the boll weevil, the work is started when the squares on cotton begin to appear. The squares formed at that time are taken off and a poison solution of calcium arsenate is inject ed in the terminal bud. By plucking the first squares on the cotton the plant becomes rid of the eggs or larvae which form on the bloom and the injection of the poison solution gives the boll weevil no place to eat in the ter-

minal bud. Sphaghetti and Cheese.-Take one-half pound of spaghetti broken into pieces and cook in boiling salted water until tender, then drain. Make a white sauce using a tablespoonful each of flour and butter, with one pint of milk. Cook together court's opinion, written by Chief Jus- until smooth, adding salt to season and one-half pound of mild cheese cut fine. When the cheese is melted, add one cupful of cooked corn, one large green pepper finely minced, and the spaghetti. Pour into a buttered baking dish, dot with butter, and brown in a hot oven. A teaspoonful of Worcestershire sauce is an improvement if liked.

Tuna With Mushrooms.-Take two cupfuls of tuna fish, one cupful of thin cream, one teaspoonful of butter, onehalf teaspoonful of salt, a few dashes of cayenne, a grating of nutmeg, two cupfuls of mushrooms cut in dice and cooked in a little butter for five minutes, one cupful of thin white sauce, and a tablespoonful of minced parsley. To the tuna add the mushrooms, cream and seasonings. Mix and stir in the butter, simmer for fifteen minutes. Serve on strips of buttered toast and pour hot, well-seasoned white sauce with the parsley added over all.

Asparagus Soup .- Take one bunch of asparagus, peel, cut off the heads and set aside. Cut the shoots into inch pieces, cover with one quart of water and boil five minutes; add salt and pepper and simmer gently for thirty minutes or until the asparagus was going good, Dempsey failing to is tender. Press through a colander, add one pint of milk and two tablespoonfuls of butter, blended with three of flour, season with salt and cook until smooth. Strain, reheat and

> California Egga.-Have eight hardcooked eggs cut lengthwise. Parboil the tender portions of a bunch of asparagus cut in inch-lengths. Butter a small baking dish, put in the eggs yolks down. Make a white sauce using the asparagus liquor and cream, thicken with butter and flour cooked smooth, then pour this mixture over the contents of the dish; sprinkle with buttered crumbs and bake fifteen min-

Banana Short Cake-Bake a plain layer cake, flavoring with crange extract. Make an orange filling and slice bananas over the filling and on top. Whipped cream and bananas may be used if desired.

CROP IS ESTIMATED AT 3,910,000 BALES

The Acreage Is 14,077,000, A 15 Per Cent Increase Over Last Year.

Houston, Tex.—Texas will produce approximately 3,910,000 bales of cotton this year, according to the condition and acreage as surveyed June 25 by H. H. Shutz, statistician for the state of the United States department of agriculture, and announced this week.

Conditions are 77 per cent normal. The acreage is 14,077,000, which is a 15 per cent increase over last year's

The report is as follows: "The growing condition of the cotton crop in Texas remains unchanged since the report a month ago. The condition is better than in any of the important states of the cotton belt.

It is usual for the crop to improve during June: in fact, only twice, in 1917 and 1919, of the past decade, has cotton showed a lower condition on June 25 than on May 25 in Texas. The ten-year average for June 25 is 78; the present condition of the crop is 77 per cent.

As was indicated earlier in the year, the acreage planted to cotton has shown a substantial increase and more land is devoted to this crop in the state this year than ever before in its history. With 12,241,000, June 25, 1922, and 11,874,000 picked, the preliminary acreage report for this year indicates an increase of 15 per cent in the acreage now standing. A considerably larger area was planted, but due to cut worms, grasshoppers, floods, rains, windstorms, many acres were abandoned altogether or replaced with feed crops. It is estimated that the acreage standing totals 14,077,000 acres, which, with a condition of 77 per cent, forecasts a production of approximately 3,910,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight, providing average conditions prevail until picking time.

COTTON CROP FORECAST AT 11,412,000 BALES

Washington. - This year's cotton crop was forecast at 11,412,000 bales Friday by the department of agricul-

The forecast was based on the condition of the crop on June 25, which was 69.9 per cent of normal, and on the preliminary estimate of the area under cultivation at that time, which was 38,287,000 acres, or 12.6 per cent more than last year's area on that

The acreage estimate and condition on June 25, by states, follow:

Exodus of Mexican Labor.

San Antonio, Tex.—An exodus of Mexican laborers from Texas to Northern and Eastern points, which authorities say is the biggest in history, threatens a labor shortage here and may result in an increase in wages and of prices of locally manufactured products. Expert estimates given by local railroad officials place the number of Mexican laborers shipped from and through San Antonio to Northern and Eastern points, sometimes in carload lots, at approximately 15,000 within the last ninety days.

To Abolish 12-Hour Day.

New York .- Influx into Northern industrial centers of negroes from the South and laborers from Mexico, the Philippine Islands, Canada and a few European countries soon will make possible abolishment of the twelvehour day in the steel industry. Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of the United States Steel Corporation, declared Saturday.

China's Cotton Crop.

Washington. - China's commercial cotton crop this year is officially forecast at 2,200,000 bales, according to a cablegram from Commercial Attache Julian Arnold at Pekin. This total is an increase of 10 per cent over last year's crop.

Mercedes Gins First Bale.

Mercedes, Tex.-The first bale of the 1923 cotton season from the Mercedes community was ginned last week by the Valley Gin Company from cotton raised by C. T. Brockington. The bale weighed 550 pounds and graded strict middling and was purchased by the Valley Gin Company.

Watson Appointed.

Washington.-Appointment of H. V. Watson of Albuquerque, N. M., as chairman of the committee in charge of the war corporation's agricultural loan agéncy in New Mexico, was announced Thursday.

Disastrous Fire at Goldfield.

Tonopah, Nev.-The town of Goldfield, with the exception of six buildings, were burned to the ground Fri-



MOTHER PERIPATUS

Mother Peripatus was talking to her child. Now a peripatus is a curious creature, as might almost be imagined by her name. With such name as that she should not really be an ordinary creature. "I'm something

like a worm," she told her child, "and yet I have breathing tubes which makes me something like an insect. I have a nice soft body and am of a nice color. I have little legs, which make me look

something like a centipede, and I like to live in an old log. I'm not a daytime creature. Night time is the time for me and for you, too, my child. I live here, far away in this tropical section of the country. When anyone touches me I squirt forth a funny kind of a juice.

"Not a very polite habit, perhaps, but it is my way! We, as a family, like it where it is warm. We're not fond of cold countries. In fact, we will be found only in warm, warm countries. Now, you are very smart, my child. Soon after you were born you were able to creep about. You knew enough to hide when danger was near, and now you have become so wise and so smart and so independent that you hide under the bark of the log just as the older members of our family do.

"There is something about our coloring which helps to protect us. We are smart in having such ways. But, my child, some people who are here studying the ways of curious animals were talking the other day.

"It seems they were down here before and they took photographs and moving pictures, and they showed these before a great audience when last year.

"They have been talking about it, and they have said many things which showed how interesting it was to others to see pictures of curious animals and their ways and of the scenery around these parts.

"They showed a picture they had taken of a Mother Peripatus and her young, and everyone it seemed, whispered to each other and said, "What in the world is a peripatus."

"First they showed some pictures of our part of the country here. They showed the tropical scenery. Then they had a moving picture of a Sleth, and of a Capuchin Monkey swimming along a river which, they explained, was a mile wide and which was haunted by crocodiles and by carib fishes, which the people had never heard of before. At least many of them had

climbed. "They showed pictures of leaf cutting ants carrying lots of heavy leaves on a windy day. Then they showed pictures of the great water falls near here and the deep gorge.

"Next they showed pictures of Mr. Northern Elephant Seal, who was supposed to be extinct or no longer in existence. Well, they saw they were still in existence! And they showed pictures of animals which had been born up in the Northern zoo-a Pygmy Hippopotamus, a Yak, Grant Zebra and some young deer.

"They showed pictures of a white porcupine-these white ones were very

rare -woodchuck, gray squirrel, pond frog, tortolse and rattlesnake. Next they showed pictures of cobra snakes and of a battle between the Indian Mongoose and a big King Cobra in which the Mongoose won even though a little creature.

Texas News

An election held at Alice on a proposition to raise the tax rate in the Alice independent school district from 50 cents to \$1 was defeated by a vote of 147 to 78.

Farmers in Walker County are taking advantage of the fine cotton growing days and are busy having the crop chopped out.

Crop conditions in Matagorda County are promising.

The attorney general's department had approved La Grange independent district school house bonds aggregating \$115,000. These bonds mature serially and bear 5 per cent interest.

Texas wool growers in general are fully determined not to sell the remainder of their clips at present prices and little is expected to be put on the market until fall, when the short fleeces will be marketed.

The statewide conference of educators and others interested in the educational survey ordered by the recent legislature, which had been set for July 12 at Waco, has been postponed until the latter part of August at a conference of leaders in the movement.

An election held at Brazoria Saturday on the proposition to issue bonds to the amount of \$25,000 was carried. The bonds will be used to construct a hard-surfaced road on the main highway leading from the Brazos River bridge to within six miles of Angleton, the county seat.

The attorney general, in an opinion this week, held that Nueces County can not use remitted tax money to build any part of a deep water project, but must confine expenditures to constructing a breakwater or seawall, in accordance with the terms of the act giving the state taxes for twenty-five years for that specific purpose.

Every car of wheat shipped from the plains country of Texas since the harvest of the new crop started has been graded hard red winter No. 1, the highest classification given. Although more than seventy-five carloads have been inspected by J. B. Wallace, licensed inspector, not one of them tested less than sixty pounds per bushel, he said.

Summarizing the work of the State supreme court for the term just closed shows there were 1116 items disposed of. These were divided into applications for writ of error acted on 513; cases and applications to file petitions for mandamus disposed of 272 and motions acted upon 331. The total number of cases pending and unlisposed of totals 240.

The seventeenth annual convention school of the Texas Commercial Executives Association will be held at Fort Worth, July 19-21. "Textile Mills for Texas" discussions will be heard. Presidents and chairmen of the various committees of many chambers of commerce of Texas are working on plans to establish such mills in their respective territories.

Washington and Orange counties have agreed to the whole time county unit work on the \$10,000 basis, insuring a health officer, nurse and sanitary engineer, according to State Health Officer W. H. Beazley. This is under the rural sanitary engineering co-operative arrangement. There are funds available for eight or ten more counties on the fifty-fifty basis.

The O. K. lignite mine, fourth in a group of four lignite mines in the Garrison vicinity, loaded its first car of coal July 5. Only a small force of men are at work now, but in less than two weeks there will be a force of at least 75 in this mine, with a pay roll of about \$4000 monthly. It is estimated that there is enough lignite in the beds on this lease to make at least seven years for each shaft, working a 45-foot circumference, to ex-

A movement is under way to secure additional labor for the cotton picking season in the Rio Grande valley and in several communities committees have been appointed to arrange for Mexican laborers sufficiently to handle the cotton crop. In the Mercedes and Weslaco sections, where a large acreage has been planted, arrangements have been concluded to secure a large supply of labor.

Import, export and coastwise shipping figures for June and for the first six months of 1923, compiled by the navigation and canal commission office, show a remarkable expansion of Houston port business and a notable increase as compared with corresponding data for 1921 and 1922. Cargoes totaling over 250,000 tons were handled through the port in June alone. of more than \$10,000,000.

Houston skyscrapers started during the first half of the present year have run the total amount of building permits more than \$4,000,000 beyond the amount issued during the first six months of 1923.

Only 13 aliens had been admitted through the Brownsville port when information was received from Washing. ton that the July quotas on many nationalities had been exhausted. Forty only state which produces diamonds, or fifty Europeans were in Matamoros awaiting an opportunity to enter, but will be obliged to wait another month. ALLIES AND TURKS REACH AGREEMENT

Concessions By All Parties **Bring Long Conference to** Successful Close.

Lausanne.-An accord has been reached between the Turks and the allies and peace probably will be sign. ed within a week.

Thus the Near East conference, which has been in continuous session for more than three months, has had a successful outcome. For a considerable period, the settlement hung in the balance on the question of Ottoman debt, concessions, and the evacuation of Constantinople and other Turkish territory by foreign troops. Both sides were forced to give way in a measure at the end and it was apparent at the first session Sunday that a termination of the discussions was close at hand.

It was after several hours' discussion Sunday that the allies and Turks reached their accord on all outstanding problems, which have long been threatening to wreck the conference and, barring unexpected difficulties over minor points, peace should be signed at Lausanne almost immediately.

The allied plenipotentiaries informed newspaper men that the draft of the protocol concerning concessions had been modified and made more precise to meet the American views on the principles involved.

The United States objected to the entered into before the war which had not received all necessary formalities; it was argued that these were too general and too vague and the principles were liable to be applied to all unknown contracts.

The allies and Turks agreed upon an amended clause specifying the concessions they wished to refer including the Vickers-Armstrong and Turkish Petroleum Company concessions and the French railroad concessions in Anatolia. Whether these modifications entirely meet the views of the United States remains to be seen. At all events the Turkish Petroleum company

Despite the allies' conciliatory attitude on the problem of the Ottoman debt, the Turks proved exacting in the meetings and unexpected difficultiss arose on all questions, including the concessions.

Joseph C. Grew, representing the United States, has been active recently. He interviewed Ismet Pasha concerning the concessions in which the United States is interested in connection with observance of the broad principle of contractural rights.

Turkey will join the league of nations if peace is signed, and the delegates believe generally that this will offer opportunities for an amicable settlement for further Near Eastern prob-

An official communique issued after the session declared that private meetings had succeeded in establishing an accord in principle on the three questions in dispute-the Ottoman debt, concessions and evacuation. An agreement was arranged whereby all foreign troops will be withdrawn with in six weeks after ratification of the treaty by Angora and the warships, arms and munitions belonging to the Ottoman government, now in the hands of the allied forces will be 1estored to Turkey. As to the Ottoman debt, the allies are agreed with the Turks that all reference to the debt should be removed from the treaty. This is a great victory for the Turks, because it means they do not go on official record as confirming the obligations of the debt. The allies, however, will make a declaration before the conference that the debt contracts can not be modified except by mutual agreement between Turkey and the bondholders. Turkey must try to negotiate with the bondholders some kind of moratorium for payment of interest, which she is bound to pay in sterling, but wishes to pay in French francs.

An invitation will be immediately dispatched to the Russian government to send representatives to Lausanne to sign the Straits convention. Considerable interest is manifest in Lausanne as to whether Moscow will accept or refuse.


