



**AT GRADE CROSSINGS** During Past Six Years 426 Persons Have Been Killed; 1543 Injured

MARFA NEW ERA, MARFA, TEXAS

Austin, Tex .- Railroad grade crossing accidents in Texas during the past six years resulted in 426 persons being killed and 1543 injured in 1236 accidents, according to figures compiled by the railroad commission and made public this week. The largest number of fatalities in one year was in 1918 when 101 persons met death in grade crossing accidents, there being 241 accidents in that year, the largest number for any year. Motor car accidents led in the

causes of these deaths and injuries, more than one-half of the number of deaths and accidents being of persons in automobiles. During the past year three railroads

of Texas reported no grade crossing accidents.

In 1923, there were 213 accidents, resulting in the death of 72 persons and of injuries to 256. The International-Great Northern Railroad led in the number of accidents in 1923 with 35; the Santa Fe second with 25 and the Texas and Pacific third with 21. Total number of deaths and injuries during the past six years and causes are: Automobile, 233 deaths, injuries 978; motorcycle, one death and six injuries; bicycle, one death and four injuries; street cars, no deaths and 62 injuries; wagons, 15 deaths and 92 injuries; buggies, six deaths and 16 injuries; pedestrians, 62 deaths and 69 injuries; employes, five deaths and



#### DAUGHERTY SAYS HE

#### DEALT IN OIL STOCKS

Washington .-- U. S. Attorney General Daugherty Monday publicly acknowledged that he had dealt in Sinclair stock before and since he entered the cabinet, and declared he never

had misused official information in these transactions, and renewed his willingness to submit all the facts in any investigation the senate might order.

"In an open letter to Senator Willis, republican, Ohio, Mr. Daugherty said he bought some Sinclair stock before he became attorney general, and finally suffered a loss of \$28 a share. Six months after Teapot Dome was eased to the Sinclair interests, he sold part of his stock, in an effort to recoup osses. Austin, Tex .-- The call for payment of registered warrants issued Friday by State Treasurer Terrell represented \$366,890 and affected warrants up to and including No. 40500. The State treasury deficiency is now \$3,619,762, the lowest in several months.



# FEDERAL AID HELPS **STATES BUILD ROADS**

#### Many Miles of Highways of All Types Built During Fiscal Year.

Austin, Tex .- Eight thousand eight hundred and twenty miles of roads of all types were completed with federal aid during the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1923, according to the annual report of the bureau of public roads, United States department of agriculture. This added to the mileage completed prior to the fiscal year, brought the total of completed projects up to 26,536 miles, or more than enough to encircle the earth.

An outstanding achievement of the year has been the work done in selecting the roads to constitute the federal aid highway system. This has been done in accordance with the provisions of the federal highway act which requires that a system of roads consisting of not more than 7 per cent of the total rural mileage in each state be designated and that all federal aid be spent on such a system. The total mileage of rural roads in the United States, as certified by the various states, is 2,859,575 miles, which will limit the federal aid highway system to 200,170 miles. At the end of the fiscal year 35 state systems comprising 111,699 miles had been approved by the secretary of agriculture and it was not thought likely that the initial program will exceed 180,000 miles.

Analysis of the approved systems for 35 states shows that of the 1111 cities of 5000 or more population in these states, 1048 lie directly on the system and there is probably not one but that will be connected with the system by an improved road.

A detailed study of the system indicates that it is safe to say that 90 per cent of the total population lives within 10 miles of some route on the system.



Texas refineries during the year produced 535,784,405 gallons of kerosene, 2.117,900,928 gallons of gasoline and fuel oil, 235,951,356 gallons of lubricants and 52,777,113 pounds of wax.

#### Trade Activity Increasing.

Washington .--- The increased industrial and trade activity with which the current year started continues to be well maintained as a characteristic of the country's business conditions, the federal reserve board said this week in its February survey of business. Financial and, commercial interests review said, generally view the future with confidence and are shaping their policies accordingly.

#### Rice Largest Cereal Crop.

San Francisco, Cal.-Rice holds first place in the world's production of cereals, surpassing the growth of wheat, according to the California Rice Growers' Association. The rice produced in the central part of California during 1923 totaled 5,470,000 bushels, valued on the farms at \$6,126,000, the associated state. The crop was produced from 106,000 acres, an average of 51.6 bushels an acre. Most of the California rice crop is sold in Japan.

#### Many Killed by Explosion.

New Brunswick, N. J .- The number of known dead as a result of Saturday's disastrous T. N. T. explosion and celluloid fire at the little town of Nixon has been placed at eighteen. Rescuers who worked in the smoking ruins throughout Sunday said eight persons are missing, six are unaccounted for and sixty are being treated for injuries suffered in the disaster. #### CITRUS TREES SHIPPED TO VALLEY FROM OTHER STATES


