A copy of this book in good condition is in the Garcia library of the University of Texas, and if one is familiar with the Spanish language he may here read the first printed account of Texas.

Fire insurance premium rates on steel tanks for storage of crude oil or gasoline were lowered by the Texas fire insurance commission Saturday and the rates on wooden storage tanks greatly increased. Both increases and decreases vary according to conditions surrounding the location of tanks. Rates on storage of oil in steel tanks having wooden roofs were more than doubled, while the rate on oil stored for periods of more than eight months in steel thanks was lowered 25 per

State highway division No. 16, with headquarters in Corpus Christi, expended \$235,000 last month, according to figures just made public by T. R. Spence, engineer in charge of the division. Hidalgo County leads the field with \$135,000. Nueces County was second with \$54,009, this figure being independent of the road work now going on in the county. Karnes County received \$25,000, Brooks County \$17,000 and Starr County \$4000. The money expended in April was from State and federal aid.

### THINGS UNUSUAL

**ELLIS ISLAND** 

(@. 1924, Western Newspaper Union.)

Ellis Island, in New York bay, near the Statue of Liberty, is the chief landing place provided by Uncle Sam for immigrants. Through it passes the constant stream of foreign-born which flows America-ward and from which they scatter to the four winds.

Formerly known both as Oyster and Gibbet island, it was acquired by the national government from the State of New York in 1808 and became our leading immigration station in

After leaving quarantine immigrants are landed on barges which are towed to Ellis Island. As the immigrants land they are formed into lines and file past the inspectors who "size them up" to discover if there is any reason why they should not be permitted to enter America. They are reviewed by doctors and examined by inspectors and vice investigators. Feet, legs, hands, arms, body, face, eyes, head, are gone over. They are carefully scanned for skin, communicable and eye diseases.

If found to be O. K. in every way, immigrants are permitted to pass, purchase tickets to destination, their money exchanged for its equivalent in our currency and given assistance in locating friends or relatives. Otherwise, they are held for further investigation and developments and finally passed or returned to the country from which they came, as conditions warrant.

The majority of these newcomers go straight-away to the big citiesthree-fourths of them, it is said, to the territory east of the Mississippl river and north of the Ohio river.

Ellis Island is intensely interesting. Amusing and pathetic incidents occur daily. All immigrants approach it in fear and trembling lest they prove unfit to enter. To nearly all of them our language and customs are unknown, hence they do not understand what it is all about. 'Tis said that more tears have been shed here than any other place in the world. With the perfection of electric traction came the subway or underground transportation.

Crowded conditions on Manhattan island, where in some sections authorities claim population reaches the unbelievable density of 700 persons per acre, are unmatched. New York city not only leads the world in subway operation, but probably possesses more miles of subway than all other cities combined.

### CAPITOL SYNDICATE TRACTS TO BE SOLD

Recovered Land Will Be Cut up and Sold for Farms.

Austin, Tex.-Curtailment of large land holdings in the Texas Panhandle and the settlement of that section with "dirt" farmers, is one of the reasons back of the decision to parcel the state's 57,000 acres of capitol syndicate lands into 200-acre tracts according to E. S. Robison, state land commissioner.

This land has been recovered by the state after extended litigation on the ground that the original survey of the approximately 3,000,000 acres given for building the state capitol was in error.

Robison went to Dalhart last week to confer with R. S. Dodd of Aline, who will make a survey of the land for the land commissioner. Dodd was a member of the commission which set aside the 57,000 acres from the Capitol Land Syndicate tract. The exact amount coming to the state, after deductions for improvements, is 57,-8401/2 acres. The land is in Dallam and Hartley Counties about seventyfive miles north of Amarillo.

It will require about two months to survey th land, which will be placed on the market for sale at public auction next September.

"We have decided to cut up this land into 200-acre tracts for a number of reasons," said Robison. "In the first place this is just about enough for one farmer to handle in the Panhandle, considering that about 50 acres will be grazing land. Two hundred acres also is just the size of the constitutional homestead exemption in Texas. We believe that by cutting it up into this acreage we will encourage greater settlement of the Panhandle, curtail large land holdings and bring more actual farmers to this section-farmers who own and work their own farms."

This is the largest single block of state land to be handled by the land office in many years. It will be sold under the same conditions as other state lands are sold. The terms will be an initial payment of one-fortieth er a bargain. of the price offered with 40 years in which to pay the balance. The unpaid portion will draw interest at the rate of 5 per cent a year. The land commissioner places a minimum price per acre on the land.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE VETOES SOLDIERS' BONUS BILL

Washington.-The soldier bonus bill was vetoed by President Coolidge Thursday on the grounds that it was economically unsound and morally un-

The president in his veto message, document of more than two thousand words, declared he could see no justification for enactment of the bill into law, and added: "Our country can not afford it. The veterans as a whole do not want it. All our American principles are opposed to it. There

is no moral justification for it." This is the second time a bonus bill has been vetoed. Two years ago President Harding turned down the first measure passed by congress. His veto was overridden in the house but sustained in the senate.

On passage of this bill the house voted 355 to 54 and the senate 67 to 16.

Hundreds Flee From Floods Washington.-The banks of the Potomac river were swept by a flood in this section Tuesday which brought the highest water levels since 1889. the year of the Johnstown disaster. Hundreds of homes and camps along the river banks have been inundated and at high tide the waters were lapping over the seawall in Potomac park, threatening to swamp the road-

Bursum Pension Bill

Washington.-President Coolidge on Tuesday won the first clash in his campaign to keep government expenses within budget estimates. The senate by a margin of one vote refused to override the executive veto of the Bursum pension bill, which the treasury declared would require the outlay of \$58,000,000 next year and of \$415,-000,000 for the first ten years.

Exceeded Authority, Court Says.

Chicago, Ill.-President Coolidge exceeded his authority in pardoning Phillip Grossman, Chicago saloonkeeper, sentenced to jail for contempt of court by former Federal Judge K. M. Landis, according to opinions handed down Thursday by Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson and Judge George A. Carpenter.

Fund Debt of Hungary.

Washington.-A bill to authorize the funding over a sixty-two year period of Hungary's \$1,685,000 debt to the United States, as negotiated by the debt commission, was passed Monday by the house and sent to the senate. The money was advanced to relieve famine conditions in Hungary after the armistice.

Passes Bonus Over Veto.

Washington.-The house Saturday easily overrode President Coolidge's veto of the soldier bonus bill and put to the senate the final word on the legislation. The vote was 313 to 78 for repassage, or 52 more than the required two-thirds.



### HIGH COURT PASSES ON HOMESTEAD LAW

### Homestead, Supreme Court Says.

Austin, Tex.—The homestead is by the state constitution given to the family; it is given neither to the husband nor to the wife; it is protected from forced sale for all debts except those specifically mentioned in the constitution; it can not be sold or otherwise disposed of except as provided by law, and a family can have but one rural homestead, the supreme court held Friday in adopting an opinion written by Judge W. R. Bishop of the commission of appeals, in answer to certified questions from the Galveston court of civil appeals in the case of H. B. Crowder, Sr., et al vs. Union National Bank of Houston, suit in trespass to try title to eighty acres of land situated in Harris County. brought by the bank against Crowder and his wife. The Crowders defended under plea of homestead and the opinion by the commission of appeals in effect sustained their position.

It was held that the wife can not have one homestead and the husband another. So long as the relation of husband and wife exists the husband can not acquire a homestead different from that of his wife. They are constituent members of the same family. The land composing the homestead may be the separate property of either the husband or wife or community property.



### PROTECT FOOD FROM VERMIN AND RODENTS



Rats Are the Most Destructive Animals in the World.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Insects, rats and mice and other household pests not only destroy and pollute foods in obvious ways, but they may also infect them with micro-organisms dangerous to health. The rat has been called the most destructive animal in the world, partly because it spreads bubonic plague, and the common house fly fully deserves the epithet "typhoid-fever" fly, and is also a known carrier of the bacteria of cholera, dysentery and tuberculosis. Even the so-called "fly specks" often deposited on food and dishes may be infected with disease germs and the eggs of dangerous parasites.


