



STATE ISSUES REPORT ON ACREAGE AND CROP CONDITIONS Fancy clean future were 1 point up

Austin, Tex.-A 10 per cent increase June stood at 6.00c, July at 6.12c and in cotton acreage in Texas this year October at 5.24c. is indicated in the first acreage and condition report issued by the state department of agriculture. While cotton shows an increase over last year, the crop is only about 69 per cent of normal. Corn, on the other hand, registers a decrease of 12 per cent, with condition at 83 per cent of normal, the report says.

The summary was issued by George B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture, with the comment that it had been delayed by lack of clerical help. The report follows in full:

"This is our first acreage and condition report. It shows the acreage and condition of June 1. It should have been out sooner, but some reports were not received by June 1 and we waited a few days in order to use them. The statistician has no clerical help and it takes considerable time of his parachute and started down for one person to tabulate these reports, hence this delay.

"The state is divided into six districts, and we have compiled acreage and condition by districts, but will only give out averages for the state.

"Reports were received from a large corps of correspondents representing 223 counties, and are as accurate as their information and judgment can determine.

MAKING OF GUMMED PAPER DRESS FORM clothes for her in her absence.

Any Woman Can Fit Own Garments Without Help.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Outstanding among the problems of the rural homemaker, or, indeed, of any housekeeper, is the making and remodeling of the family clothing, especially her own. To meet this need extension workers co-operatively employed by the United States Department of Agriculture and the state agricultural colleges have for several years taught the making of gummed paper dress forms, so that any woman possessing one can fit her own garments without help. By demonstrating the method of making these forms at club meetings a great many women have learned how to do it and have helped to make them for others. The form may be made by one person for another, but if four people join forces, two to paste the paper strips on the model and two to cut and moisten the strips, the person whose form is being made will not have to stand so long.







However, Andre and King, whose tastes were similar, became close friends. General King escorted his prisoner to West Point and stayed until the execution. Andre objected to nothing but the mode of his death. From all accounts, he appeared glad that Arnold had made his escape.

To return to the battle of Ridgefield. It was continued next day, Arnold's forces pursuing Tryon to the ships at Compo. Had not Sir William Erskine reinforced Tryon with an overwhelming number of marines from shipboard he would have been defeated.

General King became an important personage in Ridgefield. His descendants, the J. Howard Kings, have built a house on the place where his homestead used to stand. They keep a chair which was a favorite of Andre's. King was one of the members of the convention which formed the Connecticut constitution at Hartford in 1818. 

Barnard and Pulling were waiting for him with instructions to hang up two lights. That task performed he regained his room the way he came, but his lodgers, hearing sounds overhead. were astir. It had been raining and Newman's garments were wet. These he cast off in a pile on the floor and jumped into bed. This would not have saved him had not his wife hidden the clothing in a closet and substituted for them dry clothes. These were accepted as evidence that he had not been out of the house.

William Dawes as well as Paul Revere was intrusted to make the ride to Concord and rouse the farmers on the way. They seem to have ridden separately, but they came together at Lexington and were joined there by Samuel Prescott, whose lateness abroad was due to a visit with his sweetheart. Instead of riding alone into Concord at 2 o'clock in the morning, Revere did not reach Concord at all. After leaving Lexington the three men met a mounted patrol of the British, who tried to capture them. They took Revere, but Dawes and Prescott escaped. Dawes it was who first reached Concord and spread the news that the soldiers were coming. It was not until 1889 that the Massachusetts Sons of the American Revolution paid tardy tribute to William Dawes by placing over his grave a tablet commemorating his part in the historic ride of April 18, 1775.




