

GUADALCANAL TURNED THE TIDE

Let's not overlook the anniversary connected with August 7th. Four years ago the men of the marine corps launched the first offensive move of the nation against the advance of the Japanese in the Pacific, attacking Guadalcanal and adjacent islands.

The battle for the island was a touch and go affair but after six months of hard fighting, including unexpected difficulties and handicaps, it was adequately secured and available as a base of further operations. Along with the stubborn battle on the island, there was waged another desperate fight for sea control, including the famous campaign up the slot.

Guadalcanal marks the definite turning point of our struggle with the Japanese. true that the battles of the Coral Sea and Midway had already blunted the offensive power of the enemy but the island was the earliest effort of the United States to take the initiative and it represents the first direct progress toward rolling up the extended Japenese line.

Before the battle was over the Marines had the assistance of some regular Army soldiers but the early days of the hard contest belongs to Marine history. Not many people know that, at times, they were practically out of supplies, ammunition and gasoline and that, at other times, they were almost without naval support. Dogged determination, however, won the day and the successful occupation of Guadalcanal will always be a highlight in the history of the Marine Corps.


