District Title On Line As Chiefs Visit 'Cats

The Friona High School Chieftains need to be cautious when they visit Littlefield on Friday, November 5, for their 7:30 p.m. regular season finale.

Friona may find out what it's like to play a "cornered Wildcat" Friday night. The home team will definitely have the incentive to win, as a loss would knock the 7-2 (3-1 in district) Wildcats out of the playoffs.

The main prize from Friona's standpoint would be the outright district title, a trophy they have claimed three of the past five years. A loss would leave Friona and Littlefield as co-champions.

With their exciting 21-14 win over Muleshoe last Friday, the Chieftains have the luxury of going into the game with their playoff position already known. The Chiefs will be the district's number one seed for "Division II" (small schools), regardless of what happens Friday.

As the number one seed, Friona will play District 1-3A's second seed. At this point, the main candidates are Dalhart and River Road, although there are other prospects as well.

A win would also make it four consecutive years for the Chieftains to win at least nine games.

Littlefield's only losses have been to Snyder, a class 4A team, 28-13 in week number one, and to Shallowater, 25-14, in district play two weeks ago.

"They are a good team, and have been very consistent, except for their bad week against Shallowater. Littlefield has played well, and accomplished a lot of things. They have their backs to the wall (as regards the playoffs), and know they have to win. We expect a big effort on their part," said Coach Mike Scott this week.

"Before the season started, everyone was expecting Littlefield to win district, and they did upend Muleshoe (the defending district champions) in their district opener. And if they did that, they're a good team," the coach continued.

Not only have the Wildcats beaten Muleshoe, they also beat Lamesa, 37-21, in week 4. Lamesa is the top-rated class 3A school on the South Plains.

"They have played well against the good teams, and we had better be ready to play when we take the field on Friday," Scott warned.

The Wildcats rely mainly on their ground game, which is a trademark of Coach Lewis Boomer's teams. But their quarterback, Taylor Allen can also throw the ball. "He's a big kid with some good receivers, so he's a threat anytime he has the ball," Scott said. The Wildcats, like most of the teams Friona has played, have some good size in their front line.

Scott said that when the Chieftains have had good workouts this season, they have played well in their games, and indicated early in the week that the practices had gone well.

"We have got to play well the rest of the way, because we'll only be playing outstanding teams," Scott

pointed out. On the positive side, the team suffered no new injuries against Muleshoe, and should be in good condition for Friday's game. This will be an improvement from a week ago, when the team faced off against Muleshoe with some of their top players more or less questionable from a physical standpoint.

But last week, the team managed to forget about their infirmities as the game went on, and played an outstanding game overall. --BILL ELLIS

IF YOU ARE sick of hearing about the "top 100 this or that" of the 20th century, or the "50 best whatever's" of all time, then you might want to just skip this column. There was a recent four-hour televised discourse on the 100 most influential people... those who have made the most enduring mark on humanity during the millenium now ending. Don't worry, I'm not going to run through the entire list, mainly because I didn't think about jotting them all down.

My Good Old Boy guessed it right! We were getting down to about the top 15 with Thomas Jefferson, Thomas Edison, Louis Pasteur, Leonardo Divinci, Galileo, Einstein, Columbus, etc. when Bill said "I wonder if they're going to leave out Mr. Gutenberg?"

Then they got to the top five with Shakespeare, Charles Darwin, Martin Luther, Isaac Newton, and the number one person who had the most impact on life as we know it, was none other than Johann Gutenberg. We think of him as the inventor of the printing press. Actually he was the inventor of moveable type, which sped up the process of printing books, making them less costly. In the year 1450, for the first time, the ordinary person could buy affordable books and learn to read. Gutenberg had ushered in the modern world of mass communication.

Wouldn't Johann be surprised at what has grown out of his idea of making each individual letter into a raised character on a small piece of metal that can be reused over and over again! With the onslaught of printed books came the education of the common folks, followed by freedom of expression via newspapers, magazines, then radio, television, and now every person in the world has the privilege of expressing themselves to the rest of the world on the internet.

By the way, we recently got to see one of the few remaining Gutenberg Bibles on display in a large glass case at the Huntington Library in Long Beach, California. About 200 were originally printed and we understand that very few are known to still be in existence.

We must not overlook the humble typewriter, which was also an offspring of Gutenberg's moveable type. In 1873, the first typewriter was being manufactured and sold on a large scale. Now, on the eve of a new millennium, young children are learning to type as soon as they learn their A-B-C's, in order to facilitate their use of computers.

Just because we live in a world of word processing software and laser printers, does not mean the typewriter is a total dinosaur. It has not yet passed on in the manner of the buggy whip or the bustle skirt. I don't know of a single school, office, home office, or business firm that can do without a typewriter. Sure, they'll do the biggest part of their business on computers, but when it comes to making a quick memo, filling out forms, addressing envelopes, or making individual mailing labels, the typewriter is still a necessity.

The good old electronic typewriters are still available, mostly second hand, at a few mom-and-pop typewriter stores in the bigger towns. But newer models with word processing features and memory functions are on the shelves of all appliance stores and the price tags are much smaller than buying a computer.

If we were putting together a top-fifty list of the most useful inventions of the century, I think the typewriter might fall into the top four or five, after the electric light bulb, automobiles and indoor plumbing.

70 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 8, 1929

Work on new buildings is progressing nicely this week, thanks to the good weather which has visited the area. O. G. Turner has the walls of his new building on the east side of town up, and the framework on the new Baptist Church has been erected.

Friona grain prices are as good as at any other Panhandle point, it is shown in an investigation in Monday. A false rumor had it that Bovina dealers were paying 15 cents per hundredweight more than local elevators, but the truth of the matter is that local prices were 98 cents on Monday, and had never been as low as the 80 cents, which was rumored.

65 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 9, 1934

The members of the Friona PTA held their annual Halloween Carnival at the high school building last Friday night, October 26. The king and queen were crowned with the usual ceremony. The king was George Taylor of the senior class, and the queen was Lois Presley of the junior class.

60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 3, 1939

The people of Friona were horrified this week when they learned of the death of R. H. (Reube) Kingsley, who had been terribly burned Wednesday morning in the west part of town. The burning occurred about 10 o'clock when a can of blasting powder exploded in the little workshop where Mr. Kingsley was working. Kingsley had workmen engaged in building a new garage at his home, and the can of powder had been used the day before in blowing a stump from the ground where the foundation was being built.

50 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 4, 1949

Three people were killed and three others critically

injured in a head-on collision of a truck and car three miles east of Friona on Highway 60 Thursday morning. Dead are Frank Phillips, 53, of Farwell, Mrs. Loretta Essie Stone, 25, and her infant son Billy, of Hereford.

45 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 5, 1954

Continued ideal harvest conditions, coupled with the record yields of Parmer maize fields this week, have taxed elevator and shipping facilities to the greatest extent since the early 1930s. Most elevators have experienced temporary shutdowns since the middle of last week, awaiting cars for shipment. Oscar Hellman, local agent for the Santa Fe, states that some 1100 cars of grain have been shipped this year.

40 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 5, 1959

Friona's building boom is still going on. Based on figures from the City Hall, which are complete through October 3, building permits in Friona since January 1 have come to a total of \$506,950. The total compares with a total of only \$486,895 in building permits issued for the entire year of 1958.

35 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 5, 1964

Friona Methodist Church will observe its 50th anniversary as a church Sunday with special services. Rev. Lester L. Hill, former pastor of the church, will deliver the Sunday morning sermon.

30 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 6, 1969

Deposits at Friona State Bank set a record for the third quarter "call" date on October 21, when total deposits stood at \$8,096,357.75. This was an increase of \$2,835,984.29 over the statement of approximately a year earlier, or 31.6 per cent.

25 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 3, 1974

Funeral services for Carl C.

Maurer, pioneer Friona resident, were conducted Wednesday morning at the Union Congregational Church.

20 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 4, 1979

Workmen, using a crane, unloaded a large receiving signal belonging to Friona Cablevision at the site north of Friona. The receiver will be utilized to pull in additional channels, including an HBO channel for the local system.

15 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 4, 1984

SCORE 6 TURNOVERS! Defense Sparks FHS Past Muleshoe, 21-14

The Chieftain defense made up for a sputtering offense, causing six turnovers, four in the second half when Friona captured the momentum and pinned a 21-14 defeat on a capable Muleshoe team last Friday at Chieftain Field.

Friona's defense "bent but never broke" in the vital game in which Muleshoe controlled the ball, 33 offensive plays to 19 in the first half. But, although the Mules outgained Friona, 215 yards to 89 in the first half, the Mules went to halftime with just a 7-0 lead, when their last-second field goal try from 26 yards went just wide.

"Stopping them at the end of the half like we did was a big deal for us. We told the kids at halftime that they had played a good half, and were just one play from being in a tie game. We told them to just go out and play their game, and something good would happen," said Coach Mike Scott.

"We knew we had to keep playing well, and to not turn over the ball. At the same time, we knew Muleshoe was prone to turn the ball over, so we just did our best to see that they did," said a pleased Scott following the game.

Playing on a cold, windy night, the Chieftains won the toss and elected to take the north wind, giving Muleshoe the ball. Muleshoe ate up over half of the quarter on a steady drive which Friona halted on their own 20.

Muleshoe QB James Barrett hit his first three passes, and the Mules benefitted from an untimely personal foul penalty against Friona on a second and 21 play when a pass fell incomplete.

Chieftain linebacker Adrian Cruz came up with a couple of defensive gems which halted the Muleshoe scoring threat. Cruz made a good open-field tackle against the Mules' Jesse Reyes, but the visitors converted a fourth-down gamble to keep their drive going.

Three plays later, Cruz stepped in front of the Muleshoe receiver and intercepted the pass at the Friona 13, and returned it to the 21.

Friona only got to keep the ball for three plays, punting on fourth down. This time, Noel Grajeda sacked Barrett for the second time, forcing Muleshoe to punt.

The Chieftains got their first first down on the second play of the second quarter, but a delay penalty negated an eight-yard scamper around end by Nathan King, and after a pair of passes fell incomplete, Friona again had to punt.

On Muleshoe's first play, Barrett hit fullback Mitch Mason on a screen pass that gained 53 yards, to the Friona 13. On the next play, Darrell Lewis scored for the Mules, who executed a good fake handoff. The point kick gave the visitors the lead, 7-0, just 2:03 into the second quarter.

The Mules' defense sacked King, and Friona was again "three and out" on offense.

A draw play worked great for the Mules to the Friona 11, but Lewis received a jarring tackle, fumbled and Charley Saiz recovered.

King swept left end for a ten-yard gain to move Friona across their own 20, and two plays later King again headed right on the run/pass option, got around the corner, and was finally forced out of bounds by the Mules across midfield at the opposition's 46.

A delay penalty again stalled Friona, and a third down pass to Joseph Bandy gained ten yards, but was short of a first down.

Muleshoe began a determined drive at their own 25, and drove to the Friona nine before the stubborn Chieftain defense dug in. With time running out, Muleshoe kicker Ryan Hodge's field goal attempt just missed, and Friona had refused to yield points on the drive.

The fired-up Friona defense forced a punt on Muleshoe's first possession of the second half. King fired a bullet to tight end Landon Martin, for a 16-yard gain to the Muleshoe 27.

Grajeda gave Friona a first down at the Mules' 16, but the Muleshoe defense allowed just five yards in three plays, bringing up fourth down at the Muleshoe 11.

King rolled out to the right on the option play, saw a small opening, and somehow beat the

defenders to the end-zone flag on the right side. Trent Cook's kick was blocked, but the Chieftains were virtually even in a 7-6 ball game.

The Mules responded, going 85 yards in 12 plays, and matched Friona with a fourth-down scoring play when Barrett hit a receiver in the end zone. Hodge booted his second PAT, and the visitors had the lead at 14-6 with just 44 seconds left in the third quarter.

Early in the final quarter, the FHS defense separated the runner and the football, and Chieftain defensive end Matthew Mata scooped up the ball and raced 30 yards for a second Friona TD.

Friona went for two points on the vital PAT. King rolled out, and hit Joseph Bandy in the end zone for the two-pointer that tied the game at 14-14, with just 53 seconds gone in the final period.

Muleshoe kept a drive going thanks to a Friona penalty, but on a big third-down play from the Mules' 30, linebacker Landon Martin read the play perfectly, dashing in front of the would-be receiver, and practically took the ball out of the receiver's hands for a big turnover.

Unfortunately Friona couldn't convert the turnover, and the Mules had the ball back at their own 32.

But just two plays later Friona had their fifth take-away of the game, when a Muleshoe runner again had the ball knocked out of his hands. Martin took the ball on a perfect bounce, and ran ten yards to the Muleshoe 32.

Bandy gave the Chiefs a vital first down to the Muleshoe 19, and two plays later Grajeda made one of his patented zig-zag runs, following his blockers and blasting into the end zone for his 15th touchdown of the season, as the packed Friona stands erupted with their approval.

Cook kicked the point, and Friona had the lead for the first time, 21-14 with just 3:41 remaining in the game.

Muleshoe converted a third down and moved to the Friona 30, before the Chiefs' defense came to the fore. Grajeda recorded his third sack on third down, and Barrett's fourth down pass was tipped away by Bandy. Friona got the ball with the lead at their own 36, with 59 seconds remaining.

The Mules used all three of their time outs to get the ball back, as the Chieftains worked to protect the ball. Cook got a 30-yard punt into the wind, backing the Mules up to their own 28 for their last play.

Barrett's "Hail Mary" pass went about 45 yards, but Joseph Bandy went up to intercept the pass and finish off the game for Friona.

Martin, Defense Lauded By A-J

Landon Martin, tight end-linebacker, and the Chieftain defense as a whole, was singled out this week by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal for the most impressive performance by any team in the newspaper's circulation area for the ninth week.

"A loss would have hurt the Chieftains' chances of earning a playoff berth and winning the district crown," the A-J article read, aluding to the fact that Friona trailed rival Muleshoe, 14-6, entering the fourth quarter.

But Friona's defense made the big plays when it needed to. "We knew we had to play a full game...and we knew we could come back in the fourth quarter and we were able to do it," Martin told A-J reporter David Jimenez.

Martin's contributions to the big defensive effort were an intercepted pass, a key fumble recovery, and eight tackles.

Friona tied the game in the fourth quarter when Matthew Mata grabbed a fumble and returned it 28 yards for a touchdown.

"Martin, a 6-1, 175-pound senior, set up the go-ahead score when he recovered a fumble at the Muleshoe 40. On the ensuing drive, Noel Grajeda rumbled in for a 19-yard TD run to give the Chieftains the lead for good," the article continued.

In addition, Joseph Bandy made five tackles, intercepted a pass late in the game and recovered a fumble.

Daniel Wiseman was in on 10 tackles; Cason White, junior defensive back, made a team-high 11 tackles; Josh Burleson, junior linebacker, was in on eight tackles, and Adrian Cruz, senior linebacker, made five tackles.

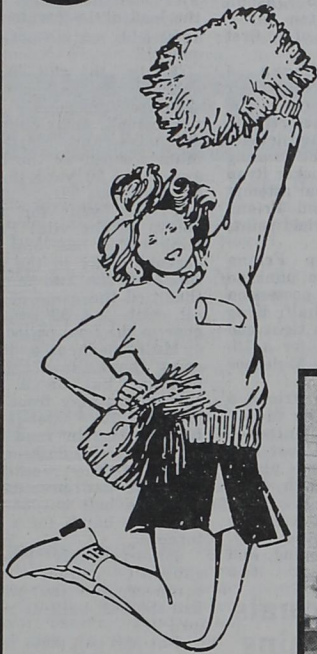

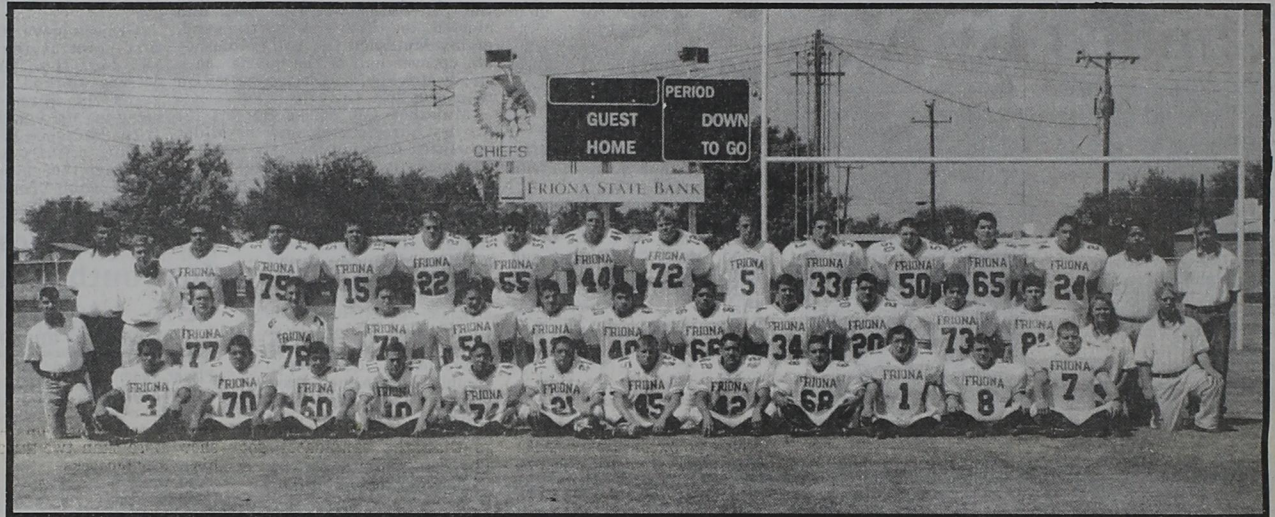

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Cotton News

from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

A meeting and tour of High Plains cotton fields provided Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) the unique opportunity to "put a face" on the unique factors that define cotton production in this area.

PCG's efforts, in conjunction with the National Cotton Council of America (NCC), was to provide researchers from Montana State University (MSU) additional information about the differences that exist within this growing region as well as to provide a better insight into the complicated roles management and environment play in the production of cotton.

The economists from MSU have been contracted by the USDA Risk Management Agency (RMA) to develop alternative methods for determining crop insurance premium rates for all crops. At the present time the USU team is working on cotton rates in the Texas and Oklahoma region.

Their efforts have already resulted in the new premium rates that will be implemented in the Mid-South, several Southeastern states and the Far West, for the 2000 crop year.

PCG, which has been closely following the recent developments in this area of the crop insurance reform process, arranged the meeting in order to provide High Plains growers the opportunity to demonstrate and explain the many differences that exist between cropping systems as well as how the current rating structure affects them.

As a result of the meeting several adjustments will likely be made in the process the MSU team uses to evaluate data from the High Plains and make premium calculations.

PCG will continue to work closely with both the NCC and the MSU researchers to ensure that the resulting

premium rate structure and the process by which future rates are calculated accurately reflect the situation in the High Plains region.

The first round of emergency assistance payments to producers included as part of the FY2000 agriculture appropriations bill have mostly been made as of this writing.

Now the work of implementing other portions of the emergency assistance program, can begin. Producers in several parts of the Texas High Plains could qualify for assistance under the disaster program which is expected to help offset crop losses incurred in 1999.

It is anticipated that the 1999 Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program will follow rules similar to those used for the 1998 single year Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program.

Another key part of the puzzle for cotton is the reinstatement of Step 2 of the cotton competitiveness provisions of the 1996 Farm Bill. It is hoped that a final decision on Step 2 is not far off and that it is made retroactive to October 1 as originally intended by Congress.

Other provisions important to cotton include doubling of the Loan Deficiency Payment/Marketing Loan Gain payment limitation from \$75,000 to \$150,000 per entity and the inclusion of an additional \$400 million for 2000 crop year crop insurance premium subsidies.

Anyone wondering about the effectiveness of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation's diapause treatments in the Northwest, Western High Plains and Permian Basin zones need only glance at this week's Agripartners Boll Weevil Grid Trapping results to see that producers are definitely

getting their money's worth.

Boll weevil populations sampled by traps typically exhibit a late season surge on the Texas High Plains as the insects run out of available food sources. This year that activity is clearly visible as is the effectiveness of the coordinated treatments applied by TBWEF personnel.

Trap counts are significantly different inside and out side the active eradication zones and should bode well for producers inside active zones in the coming crop year.

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give your children protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled in the area for November.

Protection will be against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B) and varicella (chickenpox).

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open.

The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.



Aging And Changing Eyesight



Do you sometimes wish that you had longer arms so you could hold a book further away to see the print clearly? By the time most people reach the age of 50, they have difficulty reading printed materials like a restaurant menu at close range. This is called "presbyopia," from the Greek language meaning "old eye." It's a normal part of aging. As people get older, the crystalline lens in the eye hardens. As a result, the eye can no longer focus sharply on nearby objects.

Generally, by around age 45, reading glasses are required. If near- or farsightedness is also a problem, bifocals or corrective contact lenses may be recommended by your vision care professional.

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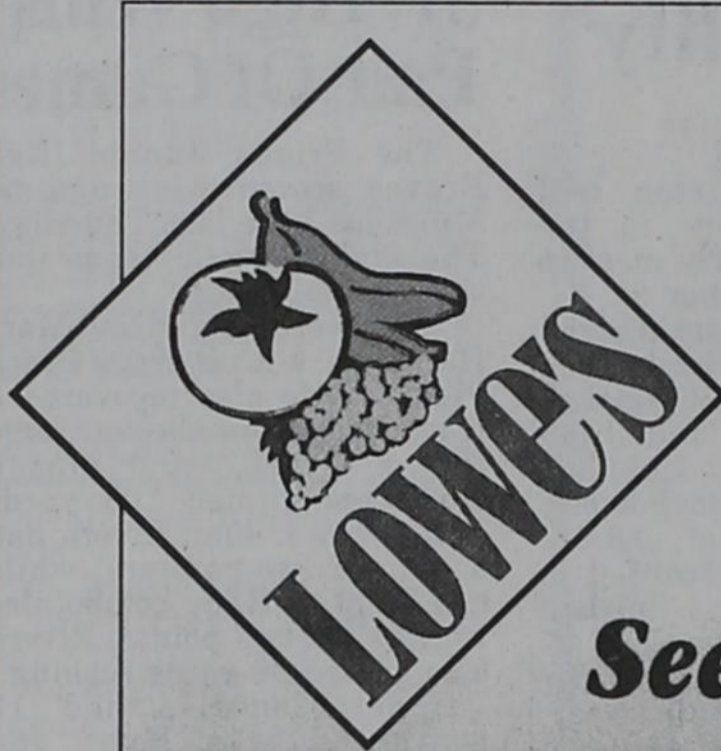
