This Act provides for adjusted compensation for Veterans of the World War of \$1.25 a day for each of overseas service and \$1.00 a day after April 5, 1917, and before July 1, 1919, in excess of 60 days. If the amount due the veteran is \$50.00 or less, he will be paid in cash, where the amount is over \$50.00 the United States Veterans Bureau will issue to the Veteran an Adjusted Service Certificate of the face value equal to the amount in dollars of the amount of his adjusted service at a reasonable rate. credit, increased by 25 per centum. would purchase at his age on his birthday nearest the date of the Cer tificate. It also proviles that if the veteran dies prior to filing an application, the amount in cash equal to his adjusted service credit instead of the face value of the certificate be paid to his dependents.
