Keep Yorktown Liberty Shrine

Historians Plan Golf Course and Memorials on Washington's Battlefield.

Washington.-To restore and preserve the battlefield of Yorktown, where Cornwallis surrendered to Washington, as an international shrine of liberty is the purpose of a movement directed by three Yorktown organizations, the Historical society, the Forum and the Country club.

The movement has received the support of notables, including President Coolidge and his royal highness the duke of York, the latter having accepted the honorary presidency of the Yorktown forum. Included in the list are cabinet members, senators, representatives, Vice President Dawes, General Pershing and other high mil-Itary officials, governors, ambassadors and other diplomats, Stanley Baldwin, the prime minister of England; Field Marshal Haig, Sir Auckland Geddes, Sir Esme Howard, Lady Nancy Astor, Lord Bing of Vimy, the marshals of France and the descendants of Lafayette, Rochambeau and DeGrasse, who served at Yorktown with Washington.

Yorktown possesses a vital interest to Americans. General Pershing, in a foreword to a book, "The Glory of Yorktown," which is being circulated by the promoters, says that the fundamental proposition of the sovereignty of the people was made secure by the American revolution, and the struggle for national freedom, won at Yorktown, inaugurated a universal movement for national independence which spread over the western hemisphere and resulted in the establishment of twenty independent states in Latin America.

"This epochal movement," says General Pershing, "later spread to Europe and even to Asia, terminating the age-long struggle between democracy and autocracy, and bringing a new concept of popular government to the old nations of the world. Yorktown was one of the decisive battles

roe, Harrison, Tyler and Wilson, Every school child knows of the important place Yorktown and its siege occupy in the history of the Revolutionary war, but not all know the spot that marked events in three other wars. There was important military action there during the war of 1812, when the British captured Yorktown on their way to Washington; during the Civil war the Confederates under General Magruder and General Johnson occupied the old Cornwallis fortifications when the Union under McClellan marched up the peninsula to attack them, and during the recent World war Yorktown was an American naval base.

The Yorktown Historical society has established headquarters in Yorktown to receive visitors, distribute explanatory literature and deliver lectures on the battlefield and the historic facts.

World Assembly Proposed. It is planned to expand the Yorktown forum into a world assembly and international center comparable with The Hague, Brussels and Geneva. A classical temple is to be erected to house the forum and there will be closely connected units interpreting in symbol historical eras and epochs in the development of democracy. A perpetual endowment is to be provided.





SERVE COTTAGE CHEESE IN MANY DISHES



Making Cottage Cheese for Market-A Farm Woman, Mrs. W. W. Bond of Jackson, Tenn., Who Sells About \$13 Worth a Week.

Most people like plain cottage cheese, whether made at home or bought. It is especially pleasing in summer and can be used in a great many ways. It is often eaten, either salted or unsalted, with sugar and cream or whole milk. Rich sweet cream is usually blended with it when it is to be served in this way, but sour cream or melted butter may be used instead.

Flavor Combines Well.

The flavor of cottage cheese combines well with a number of other flavors. Berries, peaches, or fresh fruits served with it are good; also canned fruits, dates, raisins, or other dried fruits, brown sugar, maple sugar, honey, jam, marmalade, or chopped nuts. Especially Fine in Salads. Cottage cheese lends itself especially well to salads. If enough is used, the salad may be the main dish of the meal. French mayonnaise or boiled dressing go well with cheese salad. The cheese may be formed into balls or slices, molded in small cups, or passed through a pastry tube. A small quantity of finely ground leftover ham or corned beef may be mixed with cottage cheese, mustard used as seasoning, and the whole served on lettuce leaves with dressing. Home Canning Methods for Various Products

The bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture is frequently asked why the water bath method of processing may be used in the home canning of fruits and tomatoes, whereas nonacid vegetables must be processed under pres-

The explanation given is that for successful canning the temperature applied should ordinarily be the lowest possible that will insure a safe product. While no growing, or so-called vegetative, bacteria will survive for any length of time at the temperature of bolling water (212 F.), some bacteria are able to go into spore form. These spores are killed only by very long-continued heating at boiling temperature, especially if the fruit or vegetable being canned has juice that is alkaline or only very slightly acid. When the juices are acid, as in fruits and tomatoes, all forms of bacteria are killed more quickly at 212 degrees Fahrenheit, which is the highest temperature possible in the water bath. A water both canner is commonly understood to be any covered vessel of sufficient depth for the jars or cans to be completely immersed while processing, and equipped with a rack or false bottom which permits water to circulate around the jars or cans. A wash boiler frequently answers the purpose in the household.

Corn, peas, beans, and other vegetables that do not have acid juice need to be processed under steam pressure at temperatures higher than 212 degrees Fahrenheit, and for this reason, the steam pressure canner is recommended for canning them.

Coloring and Perfuming Soaps Is Not Hard Task

Various colors may be obtained by using aniline dyes. Dissolve a small quantity of dye in water and add slowly until the proper intensity of color desired is attained. 

Considering extreme cases, for example, if a car is registered on January 1st, the owner will have had thirty days in which to have the headlamps adjusted, and if a registration is made on January 31st, practically the whole month of January will have been available. In other words, the certificate of adjustment must not be over thirty days old at the time the car is regis tered. Of course, most motorists will have their headiamps adjusted about the time of registration.

Motorists are requested to begin registration at the earliests possible time and not wait until the latter part of January. Early registration will help the Tax Collector tre mendously, and will save time for the mororist. The regular registration period will begin in this county about December 1st, 1925, and will extend through January 1926. O A Knight

Concerning El Paso, he gives an absorbing account of the wild times leading up to Stoudemire's discharge and Captain Gillett's own appointment as city marshal, but modestly leaves his local services to other writers.

The book is published with numer ous illustrations in a form worthy of the narrative's significance, and will undoubtedly continue to rank as one of the most important contributions made to the history of West Texas by one who, after a manner of speak ing, ate his west Texas history raw. -El Paso Times





SEASONABLE DISHES

At this time of the year when pears are plentiful they may be used for breakfast fruit,

baked; as a dessert for dinner and a salad for luncheon. They are especially nice baked with a bit of grated lemon rind, butter and a few teaspoonfuls of the lemon juice

with sugar to sweeten. Bake plain and serve with cream

for a breakfast fruit, or if ripe and good flavor, the fresh fruit is delicious. For a salad the combination of ripe tomatoes and pears cut into quarters then into eighths and again sliced, is good; serve with a rich mayonnaise. Pickled, canned and preserved pears are so well known and liked that they need but be mentioned. In winter the canned pears cut into halves make such tasty desserts and salads.

Salmon Souffle .- Season one can of flaked salmon with salt, paprika and two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice. Cook one-half cupful of bread crumbs with one-half cupful of milk five minutes: Add the salmon, the yolks of three eggs beaten thick, then cut and fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Turn into a buttered baking dish, set into a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven. Serve with:

Spanish Sauce.-Melt three tablespoonfuls of butter, add three tablespoonfuls of flour, stir until well blended, then pour on gradually one cupful of milk and one-half cupful of cream. When boiling add one-half cupful of pimentoes put through a sieve, one teaspoonful of salt, a dash of cayenne and paprika.

Cheese Straws .- Roll out any small pieces of leftover pastry very thin, cover with grated cheese, season with a dash of cayenne; fold up in thirds, folding in the cheese, roll again into long narrow sheet, cut into strips and bake in a hot oven.

Turnovers may be made with small pieces of leftover crust. These are good for the lunch basket, as they are easier to carry without crushing than ordinary cut pie. Pastry shells are oughly clean the little bowels and in a dainty small receptacles for holding preserves, lams or sweetened fresh

there is an excess of milk. An easy way to make it is to pour boiling water (equal parts of water and milk) into the well-soured milk. Let stand until the curds are formed then pour into a colander or cheese cloth bag to drain. Remove the curd. add salt and white pepper or cayenne and plenty of thick cream. Place on

ice. If cream is not at hand use melted butter, mixing well. When serving cream soups add a spoonful of nicely-flavored grated cheese to each bowl or cup; it adds to

the flavor and also the food value. Chicken Jelly .- Cut up a large chicken into small pieces. Take each piece and pound on a board until the flesh and bone are well-mashed. Put the chicken into a kettle and add a teaspoonful of salt and a quart of cold water. Simmer closely covered twenty minutes, then simmer for four hours on the back of the range or eight hours in a fireless cooker. Strain and mold; serve with lettuce and any desired dressing.

Horseradish Sandwich.-Cream three tablespoonfuls of butter, add two tablespoonfuls of freshly-grated horseradish, one-half teaspoonful of lemon juice and a cash of salt. Spread this on rounds of bread and decorate with slices of stuffed olives.

Graham Muffins .- Take one cupful each of graham flour and sour milk. one-half teaspoonful of soda, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, one egg and three tablespoonfuls of melted shortening. Bake in gem pans in a moderate oven.

Sardine Scramble.-Add the juice of half a lemon to one cupful of finely cut sardines. Use the oil instead of butter in the omelet pan when hot. add the sardines to six well-beaten eggs and cook as an omelet. Serve with lemon and parsley.







Call for Similarity

in Building Designs

The American home builder is conseemed cruel that so stantly casting about for something new, something unusual, in domestic architecture. Architects, therefore, have a difficult task designing new creations that will satisfy for a time, at least, the whims of a public. Due to this constantly changing, restless desire unusual houses have been created, and our country is gradually accumulating a collection of interesting types, whose equal is nowhere to be found.

At the present time the village or community idea is gaining favor with the home builders and buyers. Here and there, dotting our landscapes, villages are being constructed, each one employing a different type of architecture—in one case a French village, in another Italian or Spanish and in still another Mexican. The village idea is not a new one, but the adhering to a particular style of architecture for all the buildings is a comparatively new practice in this country.

The American home builder craves community spirit when he erects his home beyond the confines of the city; hence the village scheme appeals. Heretofore, when a parcel of ground was purchased for the purpose of erecting a home upon it the purchaser had no protection against the possibility of his neighbor erecting a house of a nondescript type. Usually that is what happens in most of our new land developments. The erection of houses of various styles of architecture, some unnameable, is the result. of the lack of comprehensive planning.

As City Grows, Wise

Planning Is Needed It is said with a great deal of truth that you cannot keep a good city down. People are attracted to the cities which have the most to offer in the way of employment, homes, institutions and public improvements. It necessarily follows that the city which has something to offer must increase in popula-

But when a city grows it is not all gain. It is the concensus of opinion that the larger a city becomes the less comfort there is for those who live in it. As a city grows its workers must move farther away from their places of employment or live in congested and sunless tenements. Traffic congestion increases with the population and the problems of government tend to become more complex. None will deny that after a city passes a certain stage in population the disadvantages

of living in it outweigh the advantages. The evils of the big city, however, will not dissuade the civic booster from working for his "greater" city so as his dream materializes great foresight must be shown to soften the hardships occasioned by the greater population. Cities that want to grow should at least grow wisely. The time to plan a city is while it is expanding.-Newcastle (Ind.) Courier.


