



-Rebecca Foresman. SWEET BREADS



A few cupfuls of raised dough saved from the bread-making may form a basis for many kinds of cakes and sweet breads. For a loaf that is easily made, take two cupfuls of light raised bread dough; to this aid one beaten egg,

add one-half cupful of shortening, onehalf cupful of sugar, spices to taste, with chopped fruits or nuts, or both. Cut in the shortening with the other ingredients, using two knives as in making pastry, then pour into a wellgreased angel food pan and let rise until light. Sprinkle with sugar mixed with cinnamon and bake in a moderate oven. Add flour as needed. This combination makes a good coffee cake if rolled out into an oblong loaf. Cover, sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon, and when light bake.

Raised Doughnuts .- To three cupfuls of bread dough add one wellbeaten egg, three-fourths of a cupful of sugar, four tablesponfuls of shortening, one teaspoonful of nutmeg or cinnamon. Cut in with two knives until well mixed; add flour to roll. Roll to one-fourth inch in thickness, cut into shapes and let rise well covered on the bread board until light. Fry in deep fat, hot enough to brown halfinch cubes of bread in one minute. For filled doughnuts, cut the cakes with a cooky cutter, place a spoonful of jam in the center, moisten the edges and fold over, pressing them well together. Let rise until light and fry as usual. Place two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar in a bag and dust them, one at a time, before serving.

Sponge Mixture.—Soak one yeast cake in one-half cupful of cold water; pour off the water and add one teaspoonful of sugar. Warm one and onethird cupfuls of milk, adding the yeast water after it is slightly cool, stir in one teaspoonful of salt and two cupfuls of flour with the softened veast Beat until thoroughly blended, then cover and let stand to rise in a warm place for several hours, until light and full of bubbles. Knead and mix and it is ready for the second rising, adding any desired fruit or sugar combination, depending upon the kind of bread to be made.

Eggless Gingerbread. - Warm together one-half cupful of brown sugar and one cupful of apple jelly with one third of a cupful of shortening. Remove from the fire, add three-fourths of a cupful of sour milk, two and onehalf cupfuls of flour, sifted with one tablespoonful each of ginger and cocoa, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of soda and onehalf teaspoonful of salt. Mix and beat well until light, pour into a well greased tin and bake forty minutes.

Quick Mayonnaise Dressing .- Take one-half teaspoonful each of mustard, sugar, salt and paprika, add one egg yolk and one-half teaspoonful of lemon juice, beat well then add one tablespoonful of oil drop by drop, beating all the time, then add oil to make three-fourths of a cupful all together with two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice added alternately.

Cabbage, Pineapple and Celery Salad .- Shred firm cabbage very fine, let stand in cold water to crisp. Drain, add a few tablespoonfuls of pineapple and minced celery to each pint of cab-

Orange Salad.—Remove the pulp spoon. Arrange on lettuce and serve sprinkled with a teaspoonful of pow-

ADEQUATE STORAGE FACILITIES FOR HOME



Compact, Orderly Arrangement in Clothes Closet.

It is easier to keep a house in order if it is equipped with adequate storage facilities. "A place for everything and everything in its place" is a good old adage, which if heeded, saves time and strength. 





Charm Plays Important Part in Real Estate

In nothing outside of art does the intangible element known as charm play so important a part as in real estate. The home-buyer is usually a very undecided and bewildered sort of person. He has a vague idea of what he wants, but can't quite find it. He is shown dozens of houses for sale. The price counts within his range. That is, say he will pay from \$6,000 to \$8,000 for a five-room house. Inside of that range the one thing that counts most with him is not the cost of the house, but whether or not he

Now that is where charm comes it. If the outlook is pleasant, the house convenient, and it has some beauty that makes him want it-the sale is made on your terms. If he does not quite want it, the price must be cut five hundred or a thousand dollars, to make the cheapness overcome his re-

It is surprising how few builders realize the great commercial value of beauty and good taste. I can take two houses exactly alike, side by side. The least expensive thing about a simple little house is tinting the walls. It costs perhaps, for five rooms, less than \$75. I can tint the rooms in one of these houses a drab, depressing color: the other a bright, pleasant shade. The bright one will sell for \$500 more than the other-and sell months sooner.

Indeed, a Ranger was expeced to mount, arm, cloth and equip himself; and all that the State of Texas provided was exiguo us pay, simple rations, cartridges, and authority to keep the peace in its name. If a man's horse was kill. ed in action the State compensated him, but it did not, in the first place provide him with a horse; and in several cases the author shows that Ranger officers had to arm and) mount poor recuits at their own; expense. Recuiting appears to have been a haphazard affair, and it seems quite easy for a Ranger o obtain his discharge-indeed, the author gives instances of Rangers aking their discharge rather than indertake a distasteful duty. There o not seem to have been any regu. ations or fomalities about recruiting, it being left to individual commanders to select their own men from whatever material might be available at the time and place. The author does not refer to any sort of drill or training other than that acquired by experience or from the example set by senior men. In such circumstances, it is sur.
