The plant ophids which are sucking insects should be sprayed with the following mixture. Take three and one-half pounds of hydrated lime and place in can of some kind that has a lid. The regular one gallon molases can is desirable for this purpose. Then place one-half pound of quick lime on top of the hydrated lime, and sprinkle four ounces of black leaf 40 on top of this and stir in. The lid is placed on then and it is a good idea to shake it up well before useing. This is then applied with any of the hand dusters in the dust form. <br> For chewing insects, such as the potato bettle use Lead arsenate, 1 and one-half pounds to 50 gallons of water.
