Del Rio, Will Stage Big Event July 27-28-29

Promises that it will be the greatest event of its kind Staged in Texas

DEL RIO, TEXAS, July 16.—The Waddies are hitting the trail for Del Rio. They are coming for the convention and sale of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' association and the city's seventh annual rodeo and Frontier Day Celebration. Del Rio promises that it will be the greatest event of its kind ever staged in Texas.

Between 5,000 and 8,000 people are expected. To entertain them the merchants through the Chamber of Commerce have raised \$5,000, while individuals are spending \$2,000 additional for souvenirs and personal entertainment. This will mean an expenditure of virtually a dollar per person for entertainment for the three days, July 27, 28 and 29.

No less than 250 large American flags are being bought with which to decorate the town. A 100x100 ft. Stage is being erected for a free dance on each of the three nights at the Rathhouse. Virginia Orquesta of San Antonio is to furnish the dance music.

Over in Mexico there will be chuck wagon dinner, served where Volstead

is unknown. Sellers Brothers are staging the rodeo, to which one of the attractions will be Chief Corrals of Brenham, a full-blooded Choctaw Indian, who will enter the bronc riding contests. The rodeos will be held each afternoon the business meeting of the association and in the evening before the dance. Purses of \$2,500 have been posted as prizes.

There will be real buffalo riding, goat roping, bronc riding, wild horse races, calf roping contests, steer bulldogging and every other sport known to the cowboy.

The sales will be held in the mornings. To these sales are being sent prize sheep and goats from all parts of the United States. The business sessions will be held in the Court House in the afternoons. Speakers of National reputation have been secured, headed by Congressman Claude Hudspeth. After the business session each day the lid comes off the town and visitors need not go to the beds the housing committee will have for them unless they want to.

MARFA STOCKMAN VISITING CORNBELT

W. B. Mitchell, prominent ranchman of Marfa is making an extensive trip through the corn belt on Kansas, Missouri and Illinois, where there are many Highland cattle on feed, with the idea of seeing what they are doing and what the demand for this fall is going to be. In a letter from Mr. Mitchell to the Highland Hereford Breeder's Association, he gives the following farm and cattle report: Conditions are good across the state and into Kansas. I have never seen Texas in as prosperous condition as now. There is some complaint about cotton insects but the plant itself looks good, and I hear wonderful reports of the wheat and corn, and corn is nearly made. In talking with a number of the best cattlemen in San Antonio, I learned that most of the fat cattle have gone, the general report is that not to exceed 15 to 25 percent are set to come. In many cases, these cattle have made money, while in others, they have not, depending on how they were bought and handled. Mr. Mitchell, after conferring with R. J. Kinzer of the Hereford Association, T. E. Wilson of the Wilson Packing Company, other influential cattlemen and editors of prominent livestock papers, relative to the Better Beef Conference to be held in Kansas City the 22nd and 23rd of July, thoroughly endorses the organization and urges the Highland Hereford Breeder's Association to do so, and without failure, to send a delegation of members to the meeting. Mr. Mitchell says that unless something is done to stimulate the eating of better meat, those who are breeding better cattle are going to lose out, because all feeders and buyers of cheap cattle have been making money and the people who have bought the better cattle, are feeding them at a loss.

The Big Bend Prosperous with plenty water & grass

First branding is over and the second branding has been started

Dr. A. J. Hoffman and Tri-County agent R. S. Miller, who lately have been over many sections of the Big Bend Country report that Cattle are fat with plenty of nutritious grass and water everywhere.

The first branding is about over and that the second branding will soon begin. Fifty percent of this year's calves were branded in the first branding. It is estimated that more than 50,000 head of cattle will be the Big Bend's output shipped to the several cattle markets this year.

A number of the ranchmen operating independently will make heavy shipments, in addition to the Highland Hereford association, whose cattle shipments are probably the largest in the state.

Messrs Hoffman and Miller are studying the causes of a few cattle losses in this section over a period of year. The losses are supposed to be caused from poisoning. Symptoms of the disease appear both externally and internally, and some of the ranchmen are of the opinion that the stock showing these symp-

oms have eaten some kind of weed; however, the cause of the few losses has not yet been exactly learned.

The Brewster County Cotton crops are in a better condition at this season of the year than in any year. Fortunately they have not been damaged to any extent by insects, and if insects pests can be prevented for 2 or three weeks longer, many cotton bolls will have reached the full growth.

Presidio County Cotton crops are looking very good, according to R. S. Miller, Tri-County agent, who has just returned from Presidio valley farms.

He says that there are no insects to amount to anything in the Presidio farms, and that grasshoppers have been destroyed from all cotton fields in that section.

Due to diversified crops of wheat, alfalfa and other grain and feed crops there is a decrease of approximately 1,000 acres planted in cotton this year; however, the average in cultivation is greater in lower Presidio County than last year.

Rotor Ship Runs on "Blue Coal"

Strange Vessel That Realizes Inventor's Boyhood Dreams Crosses Ocean.

New York.—When the little rotor ship *Baden-Baden* slowly sailed up the harbor recently, ending her voyage across the Atlantic, old shipmasters gazed in wonder. Was wind power, harnessed in a new way, to recover a place for itself on the sea? Since then the vessel, with its two revolving cylinders, has been making frequent trips and has become a familiar sight in the harbor.

Her inventor, Anton Flettner, visualizes the return of wind power to the seas. He has already adapted the rotor principle to several land uses that are interesting American business men, and is convinced that "blue coal," as he terms power derived from the wind, will be an important development of the future.

One of the largest automobile manufacturing companies in the country has installed rotor ventilators on some of its enclosed cars and is considering using the device on all its vehicles. Inquiries have come to Mr. Flettner from Arizona—his rotor windmill, it is thought, might be used for pumping water in irrigation projects and for electric generation. The inventor predicts the eventual replacement of the planes on airships by rotors. In addition, he is working out several other applications of rotors to industry. The development of the rotor ship the inventor regards as practically completed.

The invention of the rotor ship is the fulfillment of a vision that came long ago to Anton Flettner when, as a boy, he shipped on a sailing vessel to Australia to serve his sea apprenticeship.

His Sea Background.

Born in a small village near Frankfurt, Germany, he comes of a family of mariners and ship-owners—men who have sailed rivers as well as the high seas. His father was one of the first ship-owners to order steam tugs for river towing, thus replacing horses. After attending primary and high schools, Anton Flettner spent over a year and a half on the sea, with the intention of becoming an officer in the merchant marine. Color-blindness, however, made him give up the idea.

"My first trip was to Australia," he said. "The voyage, in a sailing vessel, was a long and tedious one. It took 122 days. At times the boat sailed briskly enough, but on other days we

were in the doldrums—not a breath of air stirring. During the calms I used to wonder whether some device might not be found to make sails more efficient. The cheapness of wind-power was attractive.

After color-blindness had forced him to give up his ambition to become a mariner, he became a teacher of physics and mathematics in technical schools. At the outbreak of the war his technical knowledge brought him into army aviation, where he served as an advisory expert. One of his inventions, a rudder, was used on hundreds of airplanes. At the end of the war he adapted this rudder for use on ships. Several years ago work on the invention of a more efficient sailing vessel engrossed his attention.

First Attempts.

"My first endeavors in this line," Mr. Flettner relates, "were to substitute for the canvas sail a metal one, designed like the wings of an airplane. I soon decided, however, that the canvas sail, through hundreds of years of evolution, had been developed quite in accordance with the laws of aero-

dynamics and could not be bettered in any important way.

"I then decided to try other methods of utilizing the wind. My studies in physics had familiarized me with the Magnus law, discovered in 1852. In accordance with this law, certain wind pressures are set up by a revolving cylinder, and these I determined to utilize in my search for a more efficient propelling device. I called these revolving cylinders rotors."

Mr. Flettner says that he has found an erroneous conception among Americans, who suppose that the rotors are turned by the wind and thus operate the propeller at the stern. The true process is this:

The rotor is revolved by a small electric motor, thus setting up the desired wind currents—a vacuum area in front of the rotor and a pressure area behind it. As on the phantom ship described by Coleridge in "The Ancient Mariner," the air "is cut away before and closes from behind." Ten times the propulsive force of sails of the same area is thus produced. The propeller at the stern of the ship is operated by an auxiliary motor, and is used when the wind falls or is insufficient.

Concerning the future of "blue coal" Mr. Flettner is very optimistic.

Ex-Kaiser's Palace to Be Gambling Resort

Corfu, Greece.—The magnificent palace here once owned by former Emperor Wilhelm of Germany soon is to be converted into a gambling casino. The Athens government and an Italian promoter are negotiating with the idea of making the long-abandoned imperial residence a profit-producing enterprise for the Greeks. Many residents of Corfu long have been in favor of converting the island into a modern Monte Carlo with its center the one-time German imperial estate.

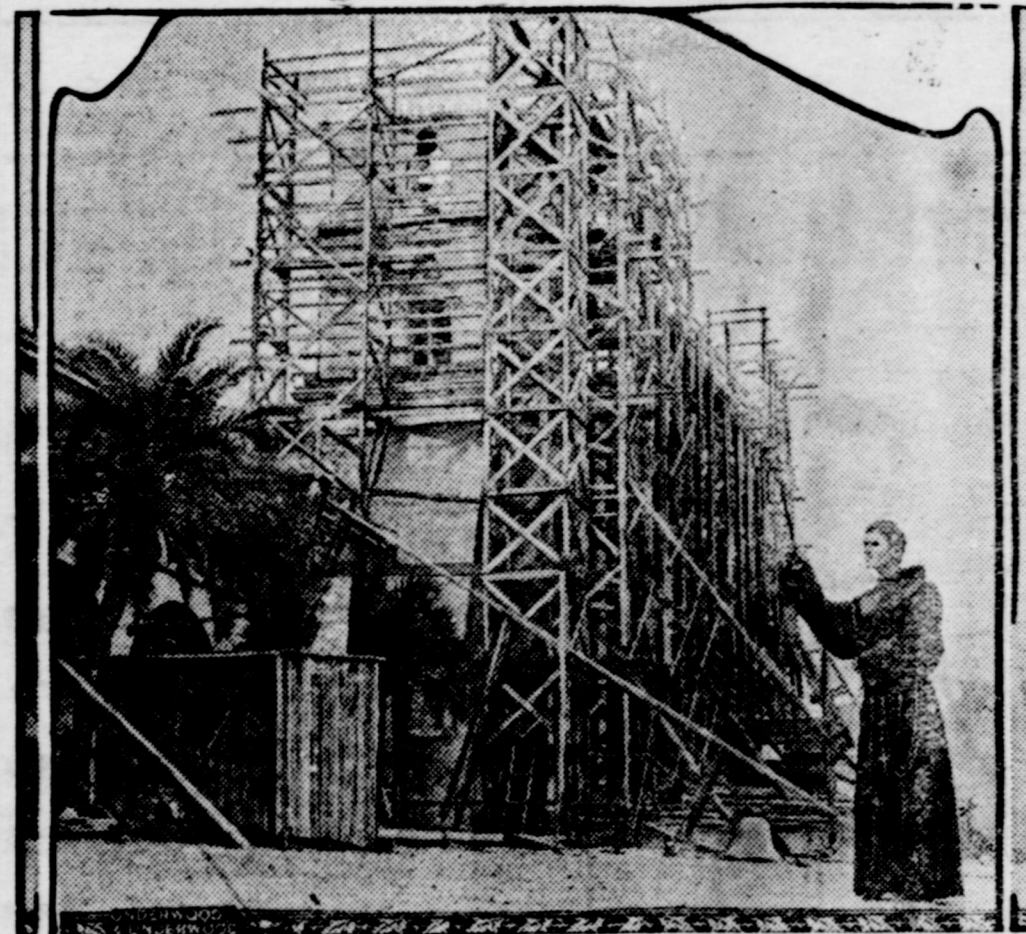
From Doorn, Holland, where he is in exile, the former German war lord has protested that he still is the owner of the palace and its spacious grounds, and says he objects bitterly to the plan of transforming it into a gambling resort. His claim is not recognized by the Greek government, which confiscated the property under the alien property act during the World war. For a long time the building and grounds were occupied by the American Near East Relief hospital. Thousands of Greek refugees were treated there after the Smyrna disaster.

The palace was erected by the former kaiser many years ago as a gift to his sister. As she never occupied it, William himself used it as a stopping place on his Mediterranean cruises.

MOTORISTS FEAR HOLDUP; SPEED PAST DYING WOMAN

Body Is Found at Daylight, With Husband Injured and Exhausted as Result of Wreck.

Riverhead, L. I.—Robert Bertschy, manager of the Capitol theater at Riverhead, tried vainly to stop motorists at a bridge over the Long Island railroad tracks, three miles west of here, for several hours, as his wife lay dying under his wrecked automobile at the bottom of a 30-foot embankment. She was dead by the time help arrived.

Bertschy and his wife, Charlotte, were returning to their home in Riverhead from Smithtown, when, at 1:30 a. m. another car started to pass him on the right. Bertschy swung his car to the left and struck a fence, the automobile going over the embankment.

Bertschy was stunned and badly hurt. When he crawled out of the wreckage he heard the groans of his

wife, pinned beneath the car, and he could not extricate her.

Bertschy saw an automobile approaching and with great difficulty struggled up the side of the embankment and waved to the motorist to stop. The motorist only put on speed and went past him. Bertschy then went back to console his wife, who continued to pray until she lost consciousness.

Weak and sore from cuts and bruises on his face and body and with his nose fractured, Bertschy several times climbed the embankment and sought to stop motorists, but all went by him, apparently fearing a holdup. Finally Bertschy fell beside the car, almost unconscious, and there he was found by a man at daylight. This man stopped a motorist and other help was summoned, but Mrs. Bertschy was dead.

Impromptu Bull Fight Staged in City Park

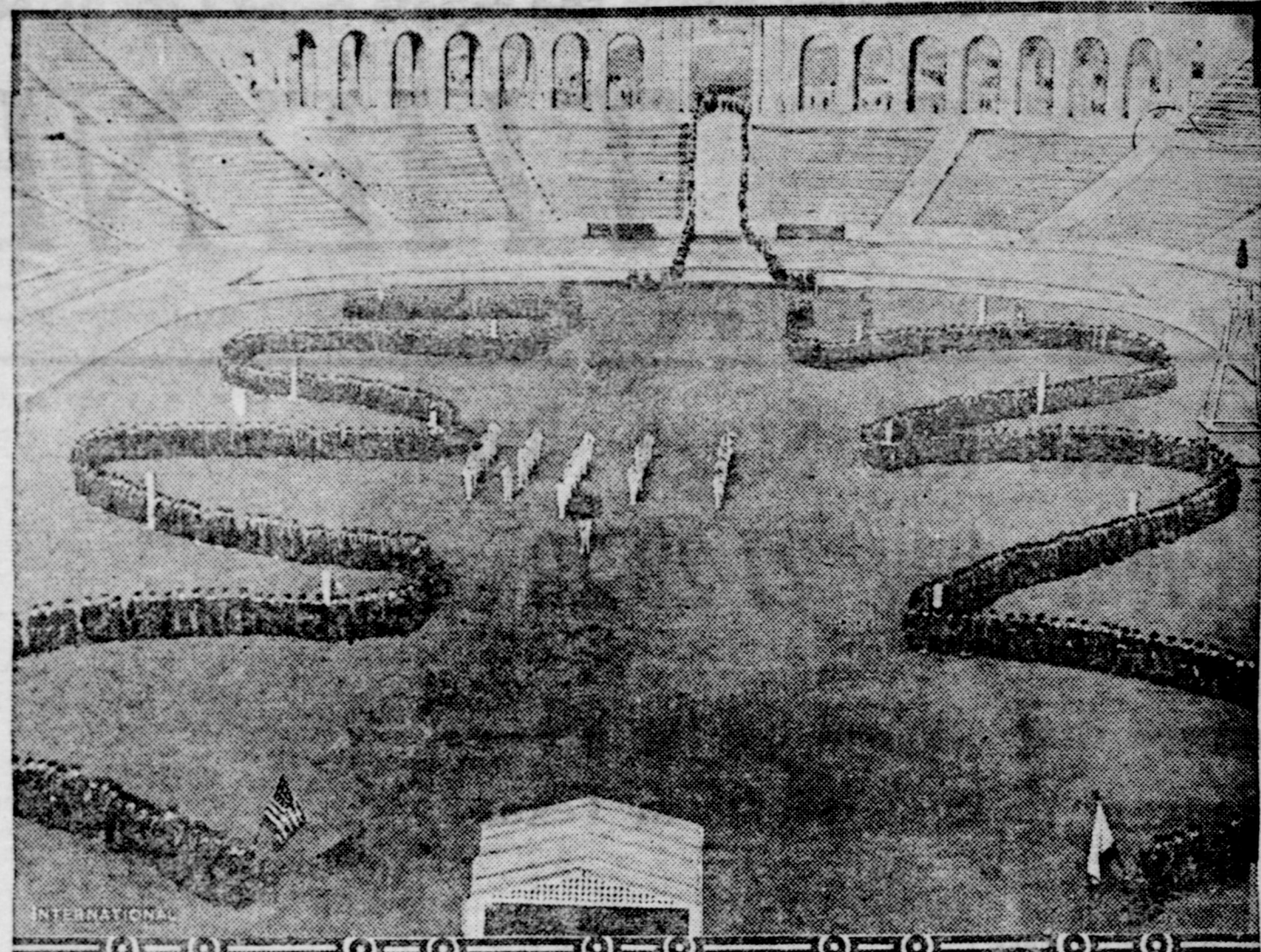

PORTO BELLO GOLD

Howden Smith is addicted in his quieter moods to costume novels, and when one appears it is a literary event of no mean importance; but when he gets excited and lets himself go, the result is sure to be something extraordinary, as when he writes a pirate story or one of those stirring yarns about the early settlement of New York and Canada. And such a pirate story as "Porto Bello Gold!" It takes up a number of Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island" characters at points in their careers before Stevenson became acquainted with them. It was inspired by the constantly reiterated expressions of friends, wondering "why someone doesn't write a pirate story that will tell us how the treasure came to be buried on the island." With the exception of this use of a few of the characters made famous by "R. L. S." and a few incidents which Stevenson noted merely incidentally as episodes of the past, the story is entirely Howden Smith's own. In a truly remarkable manner he has succeeded in recreating the color of the Eighteenth century and the atmosphere of Stevenson's masterpiece. The consensus of critical opinion is that "Porto Bello Gold" is a fit companion to "Treasure Island."

CHAPTER I

My Father's Secret.

I was in the counting room, talking with Peter Corlaer, the chief of our fur traders—he was that very day come down river from the Iroquois country—when the boy, Darby, ran in from the street.

"The Bristol packet is in, Master Robert," he cried. "And, oh, sir, the watermen do say there be a pirate ship off the Hook!"

I remember I laughed at the combination of awe and delight in his face. He was a raw, bog-trotting bit of a gossamer we had bought at the last landing of bonded folk, and he talked with a brogue that thickened whenever he grew excited.

"For the packet, I do not doubt you, Darby," I answered. "But you must show me the pirate."

Peter Corlaer chuckled in his quiet, rumbling way, his huge belly wagging before him beneath his buckskin hunting shirt, for all the world like a monster mold of jelly.

"Ja, ja, show us der pirates," he jeered.

Darby flared up in a burst of Irish temper that matched his tangled red hair.

"I would I were a pirate and had you at my mercy, you butter tub," he raged. "I'll warrant you'd tread the plank!"

"Every one," answered he.

"Very well. Then get you into the storeroom and sort over the pelts Peter fetched in."

He flung off with a scowl as I turned to Peter.

"My father will wish to know the packet arrived," I said. "Will you go with me to the governor's? The council must be on the point of breaking up, for they have been sitting since noon."

Peter heaved his enormous body erect. And I marveled, as always after a period of absence, at his proportions. To one who did not know him he seemed a butter tub of a man, as Darby had called him—a mass of tallow, fat limbs, a pork barrel of a trunk, a fat slab of a face upon which showed tiny, insignificant features grotesquely at variance with the rest of his bulk. His little eyes peered innocently between rolls of fat which all but masked them. His nose was a miniature dab, above a mouth a child might have owned.

Here he perceived who accompanied my father. Off came his hat, and he made an awkward bow.

"Your servant, your excellency! My duty, Master Colden! But I have no words to withdraw, for all I did not see who was near by to hear me. Aye, there is more to be said, much more; and matters have come to a pretty pass when the rascals come north to these ports."

Peter Corlaer and I joined the little group of merchants who were with the governor, and the other curious persons hovered as close as they dared.

"But I find this hard to give credence to, captain," said Governor Clinton pleasantly enough. "Pirates? In these latitudes? We have not been bothered by such of late. Did you have sight of the ship which pursued you?"

"Sight? Marry, that I did; and uncomfortable close, your excellency. She came up with a so'easter two days past, and at the first I made her out for a frigate by the top hamper she carried."

"A frigate?" protested Master Colden. "So big as that?"

"Aye, sir, my master! And if I have any eye for a ship's lines and canvas she was none other than the Royal James that chased me three days together when I was home bound from the West Indies in '43."

"That would be the vessel of the fellow known usually as Captain Rip-Rap," spoke up my father, and there was a quality in his voice which led me to regard him closely.

It was manifest that he labored in the grip of some strong emotion; but the only indication of this in his face was a slight rigidity of feature, and none of the others marked it. I was the more amazed because my father was a man of iron nerves, and also, though his earlier years had been starred with a series of extraordinary adventures, so far as I knew he had had nothing to do with the sea.

"True for you, Master Ormerod," answered Captain Farraday; "and since Henry Morgan died there hath not lived a more complete rogue. 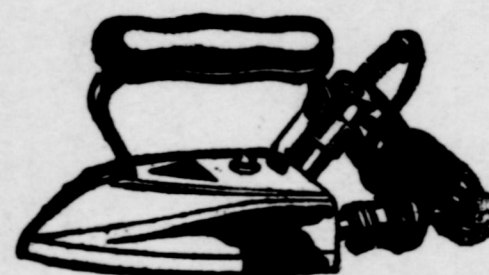

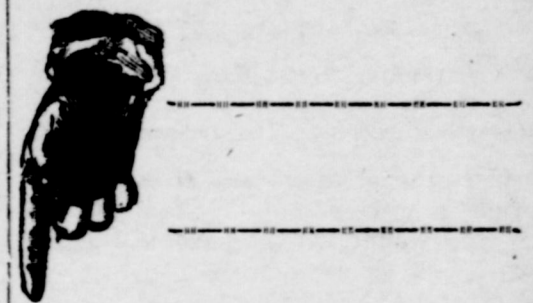

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Community Building

House Design Should Guard Against Fire

When one reads the reports which indicate the tremendous losses sustained by people in the United States on account of conflagrations, it is readily agreed that fire-stopping cannot safely or wisely be ignored by the home builder. The safety of the family and the preservation of the structural integrity of the home in large measure depend upon it.

The remedies for those fire hazards which are created by carelessness have been discussed in many books and newspaper and magazine articles. Yet in spite of these warnings fires continue to occur.

Though personal carelessness is the most common cause of fire, hazards of construction are an important factor in determining the extent of resulting property damage. One of the chief considerations in connection with these hazards is involved in fire stopping.

The usual methods employed in building small houses give but slight consideration to construction which will retard the progress of fire. Most such houses contain many concealed spaces which will allow fire to gain headway without discovery, to eat its way from floor to floor, and then suddenly to leap into open flame. There now exists a very real need for easily understood drawings of fire-stopping details which when employed in actual construction will confine fire to its place of origin, and thus reduce to a minimum the excessive preventable annual fire loss in this country.

Well-Marked Streets of Prime Importance

Progressive citizens of Boston have decided that "a signless city is an abomination to its citizens and particularly to its visitors." After a campaign their signs are to be placed on every corner. These signs are to be visible, conspicuous, uniform and durable.

Champaign is fast becoming a signless city. Many street signs are missing and others are too old and obscure to be of value. Many important intersections are not marked.

Another touring season approaches. Strangers will be as bewildered as ever unless some arrangement is made to guide them about the city by means of well-marked streets. Important entries to the city, the business section, main routes and streets should at least be marked and provision made to place signs on minor streets later.

Champaign is too progressive a community to remain a signless city much longer.—Champaign News Gazette.

Boy Scouts as Firemen

Boy scout firemen are real assets to a city. Their duty is to stop the fire before it happens—safety first. These organized units receive their instruction from some veterans in the municipal fire department. They make regular inspections for fire hazards in their districts. Are fire escapes clear, dark hallways unencumbered by rubbish and gasoline, kerosene and other inflammables stored in safe places? They learn different types of fire-fighting apparatus and how to administer first aid. In the event of fire they help the police preserve the fire lines, act as messengers and otherwise render efficient service. Nearly 10,000 scouts won a special merit badge in firemanship last year.—Harry B. Brainerd in the American City.

Preserving Shingles

Red cedar shingles will not require frequent repainting or restaining, as is the case with walls built of many other materials. This is especially so when good stain is used. Red cedar shingle roofs should be properly treated with a reliable creosote stain. Avoid stain mixed with kerosene or benzine. Shingle side-walls may be stained in a wide range of shades. Certain silver grays are popular to produce quickly a "weathered" effect. Soft nonpareil white, light gold, moss green, golden brown, deep brown, reddish brown, walnut tones—all these and more are to be had in finest quality. The red cedar shingle responds to any of them and retains them faithfully. It does not rot, rust or corrode.

Consider Before Planting

In regard to the placing of trees and, with respect to larger property, the design and construction of their grounds (road building, grading, disposition of lawn areas, gardens, whether formal or informal, and all other features of beauty and service) able counsel should be obtained. It is desirable that trees and shrubs, when transplanted to beautify grounds, should be well placed, both scientifically and artistically, in order that they may form a permanent and beautiful planting.

FLANK STEAK MAKES A GOOD MOCK DUCK



Preparing Mock Duck for Dinner.

Have you tried mock duck? When it comes to the table, it looks like a duck—a neat browned roll, dressed with a bit of parsley—but it's really a flank steak. This, of course, is one of the least expensive cuts of beef, so your household allowance for the table today will go a little further than usual. A flank steak is almost the only piece of beef which has no bone, the United States Department of Agriculture points out, and as there is little fat or other waste on it, two pounds will be enough for the average family. Be sure the butcher does not score it. Scoring, or cutting the surface, merely lets most of the delicious meat juices escape into the pan, and the result is a dry and tasteless dish. The flank steak is to be stuffed and rolled, then braised in a covered roasting pan, and served with plenty of gravy.

Ingredients for Stuffing. Make a stuffing of the following ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups of stale bread (soaked in warm water and squeezed out until it is just moist)
- 1 small onion (minced)
- 1/4 cup finely chopped fat either beef suet or salt pork)
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup of celery

Mix these well and spread the stuffing over the steak. Roll it up so that when cut for serving you will cut through the grain. Fasten it with butcher's skewers or tie it with clean string. Roll the outside of the "mock duck" in flour, then seal the surface in a small amount of fat in a baking pan. Add more flour if necessary, so as to have enough for brown gravy. When the meat is thoroughly seared on all sides, add a cup of water, cover closely and cook until tender. This should require about 1 1/2 hours. Add more water if necessary when making your gravy. When the meat is done, mix two tablespoonsful of fat with an equal amount of flour, add the liquor from the meat pan and enough water, which may be that which you have drained from the potatoes, to make as much gravy as you need. If the steak had fat on it there may be enough fat and also flour in the pan to make the gravy without adding any other.

Eggs Cooked Slowly Are Valuable for Children

Eggs contain protein of a particularly valuable kind for building the bodies of children as well as chicks. The chick gradually absorbs the almost pure protein of the egg white as he develops within the shell. Children, however, make the best use of egg protein when it is slightly cooked, believes the United States Department of Agriculture. Protein is very sensitive to heat. If cooked rapidly at high temperature it becomes tough and hard. Even if an egg is soft boiled, that is, cooked in boiling water for three minutes, the white nearest the shell becomes hard, while the rest of it remains "runny" and the yolk is practically raw. The coddled egg, which is dropped into a vessel of water just under the boiling point, covered, and removed from the heat and allowed to cook slowly for about eight minutes, has a tender, jelly-like white and a soft but sufficiently cooked yolk. Scientists who have studied this question, however, found that not only are eggs more appetizing when cooked slowly in this way, but they are actually more readily and completely digested.

Important Fat Substance

Fats are the most concentrated fuel foods in the diet, and from the commercial standpoint fat is the most important substance in milk, since it is the source of butter and is an important constituent of many kinds of cheese. The fat of milk, known also as butterfat, is in the form of small globules varying in size in the different kinds of milk, and, being lighter than water, these globules tend to rise to the top of the milk as it stands, thus forming cream.

Milk for Infants

That the best food for an infant is milk from a strong, healthy woman is admitted by everyone. When this is not obtainable, the more nearly the substitute resembles it the better. Cow's milk is the most common substitute and when necessary may be artificially modified.

REMOVING GREASE SPOT ON GARMENT

Carbon Tetrachloride Will Be Found Valuable.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Every housekeeper discovers from time to time a grease spot on some garment. She would like to be able to remove such spots herself. Unfortunately, almost all effective fat solvents are inflammable and are not to be recommended for home use. An exception to this is carbon tetrachloride, which can be purchased at

any drug store. It will be found to be a very valuable addition to the spot-removing materials kept in the cleaning closet. Place the wrong side of the fabric face down on a blotter and apply a small quantity of the solvent with a small piece of cheesecloth or a sponge. A pad of cheesecloth may be used in place of the blotter, sometimes to much better effect. The stain may be soaked in a small amount of the solvent placed in a small dish, although this method is more likely to produce a ring.

Using Rice Instead of Potatoes Is All Right

Rice and potatoes are not exactly the same in food value, even though they are both rich in starch. Potatoes contain some minerals and vitamins in addition to the starch. Milled rice is entirely lacking in these. If there are plenty of fruits and vegetables in the daily meals, however, using rice instead of potatoes makes little difference in nutrition. The needed minerals and vitamins are supplied by the vegetables and fruits. If the diet is so limited that potatoes are one of the few vegetables served, the situation is different. Then care must be taken to provide some foods that contain the substances lacking in the rice, the United States Department of Agriculture points out.

Sweet potatoes, rice boiled so that it is dry and flaky, hominy either whole or in grits, macaroni which is made from wheat, and dasheens are other American-grown starchy foods that can be added to the menu in place of potatoes. It so happens that this year when the potato crop was light, the corn crop was unusually heavy. Using corn products now will help in evening things up for the farmer.

What Foods Are Best to Correct Constipation

Dietitians are frequently asked what foods are best to correct constipation. This is a difficult question to answer briefly except along very general lines. In general, fruits and vegetables, and whole-grain products are valuable for this on account of the cellulose present, states the United States Department of Agriculture. The aim in correcting constipation is to get residue with sufficient bulk to stimulate the intestines and also to have one which holds water. Cellulose is very incompletely digested and tends to hold water. A physician should be consulted in any long-standing case of constipation.

Money From the Water

A child playing with its mother's purse while being wheeled over Memorial bridge, Portsmouth, N. H., tossed a new \$10 bill to the wind, which carried it to the water below. Four days later a marine orderly on the navy yard ferry saw a \$10 bill near the end of a floating stage in about three feet of water. He fished it out and went in search of the owner. 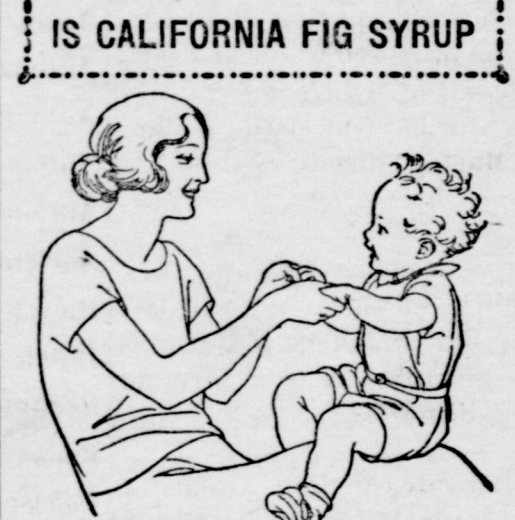

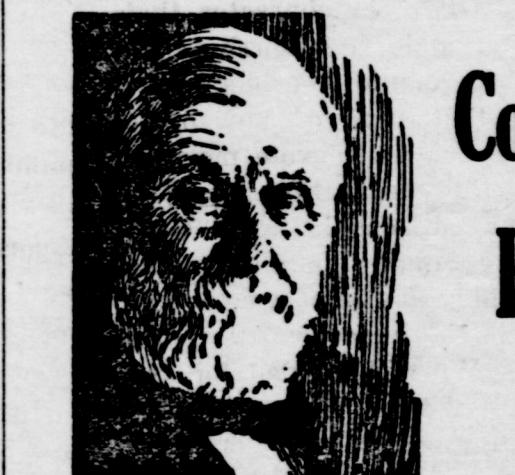

**"SCISSORS" PAINTED LAMPS;
MUCH IS MADE OF LACE**

There's no place like home, and every day in every way American homes are getting better and better. The most unpretentious of modern homes and the smallest of flats are built for comfort and convenience, with attention to interiors that will make satisfactory backgrounds for tasteful furnishings.

About the most important of small furnishings are lamps and lamp shades, and now come the new "scissors" painted lamps and crystalline lamp shades, handsome enough for millionaires' homes and inexpensive

transparent paint and crystalline are added. For this the transparent paint is thickened a little and applied to a section of the shade. To make the lamp use an unglazed pottery vase, or a glazed surface may be used by first painting it over with a mixture of denatured alcohol and transparent amber sealing wax, of the consistency of thin sirup. When this is dry a printed design is cut out from crepe paper and pasted to the case. Use a mixture of paste and glue and brush on the back of the design with the grain of the paper, being sure that the edges are well pasted. Put in position and press down very carefully. Now paint the entire surface again with the mixture of alcohol and sealing wax, and when dry, paint in the background in any desired color, using sealing wax and alcohol mixed to the consistency of cream. A second coat of the transparent paint may be applied as a finish.

To make the shade, a wire frame is first wound with white taffeta seam binding, sewing or pasting down the ends. Handkerchief linen cut on the bias is then stretched smoothly over

EVERYDAY GOOD THINGS

There is nothing that takes the place of a good salad for a luncheon, dinner or supper dish.



Garden Delight.—Take one each of fresh, green and red pepper, chop fine and mix with one cupful of cottage

cheese which has been well seasoned and enriched with butter or cream. Line salad plates with lettuce, and lay on each one-half of a banana cut lengthwise, add salad dressing to the cheese and cover each with the cheese dressing.

Halibut Souffle.—Take one cupful of halibut flaked, one cupful of thick white sauce, one egg beaten stiff, one tablespoonful of lemon juice, one teaspoonful of Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper to taste, one cupful of bread crumbs and two tablespoonfuls of grated cheese. Mix the flaked fish with the white sauce, add the lemon juice, and Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper, then fold in the egg white beaten stiff. Butter a glass baking dish; fill three-quarters full, leaving room for the crumbs and cheese on top. Mix the crumbs with melted butter and the grated cheese. Sprinkle over the souffle, bake in a hot oven fifteen minutes. Serve with a spiced tomato sauce if liked.

Prune Cake.—Take one cupful of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one cupful of cooked prunes, finely chopped; one-half cupful of prune juice, one teaspoonful of soda, two cupfuls of flour, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of cloves, one teaspoonful of nutmeg. Mix in the order given, sifting flour and dry ingredients together. Bake in two layers about thirty minutes. Ice with one cupful of powdered sugar, three tablespoonfuls of butter and enough cream to make of the consistency to spread. The butter should be well creamed with the sugar before the cream is added.

Ox Tongues and Spinach.—The canned tongue and canned spinach may be used for a hurry-up meal. Heat the tongue and place on a platter neatly sliced. Surround with a border of seasoned spinach chopped, garnished with sliced hard-cooked eggs.

Baked Ham.—For each thick slice of ham take one cupful of milk or enough to cover. Cover and bake in a slow oven for an hour or more.

Dishes From Grains.

The coarser foods are quite necessary in our diet and should be freely used at all times of the year.

Scotch Oat Crackers.—Put two cupfuls of rolled oats through the meat grinder, add one-fourth of a cupful each of milk and molasses, one and one-half tablespoonfuls of fat, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of soda, one teaspoonful of salt and one-fourth of a cupful of raisins or nuts cut into bits. Mix well, roll very thin and cut into fancy shapes. Bake twenty minutes in a moderate oven.

Oatmeal Soup.—Take one-half can of tomatoes, one-third of a cupful of oatmeal, two cupfuls of water, one tablespoonful of sugar, one-half of a small onion, pepper and salt to taste, a bit of bayleaf and two tablespoonfuls of peanut butter. Cook one hour, rub through a sieve, add seasoning if needed and serve hot.

Hominy Gems.—Pour one cupful of scalded milk over half a cupful of corn meal, add one-fourth of a cupful of hominy, a tablespoonful of sugar and the same of shortening; mix well, cool, add a yolk beaten thick and a white beaten stiff. Sift in one and one-half teaspoonfuls of baking powder and a little salt; beat well and bake in hot well-greased gem pans.

Corn Meal Gems.—Take one-half cupful of corn meal, add one cupful of flour, three teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one tablespoonful of sugar, one tablespoonful of melted butter, one-half teaspoonful of salt, three-fourths of a cupful of milk and one egg. Boil the milk, scald the corn meal, cool and add the remaining ingredients. Bake in well-greased muffin tins.

Hominy and Pecan Croquettes.—Boil one-half cupful of hominy with a teaspoonful of salt in two cupfuls of water five minutes, then put into a double boiler and cook two hours. Add two tablespoonfuls of shortening, one-half cupful of chopped pecans and a teaspoonful of scraped onion. Cool and shape into cylinders. Beat one egg lightly, add two tablespoonfuls of water, roll the croquettes in crumbs, then egg, then in crumbs again and fry in deep fat. This makes one dozen croquettes.

Rich Drop Cookies.—Cream one-half cupful of butter, add one-half cupful of sugar, one egg well beaten, three-fourths cupful of flour, one-half teaspoonful of vanilla, raisins, nuts or citron. Drop by teaspoonful on butter sheet, spread thinly with a knife dipped in water; decorate with fruit and nuts.
