Stars May Create New

Worlds, Says Scientist New Haven, Conn.-Modern science has no one consistent scheme of interpreting physical phenomena and has become "wise enough to admit it," Dr. Robert A. Millikan, discoverer of the Millikan rays and Nobel prize winner, said in the first of the three

lectures at Yale university. Doctor Millikan outlined the major discoveries of recent years and said there were experimental and theoretical reasons for believing that the mass of stars is being actually transformed into light and heat and is being radiated away into the outer stretches of spaces, where it may be giving birth to new worlds. This, he said, was an

"inevitable speculation." Saying that the Nineteenth century conceptions were "grotesquely inadequate," Doctor Millikan said that scientists were working with enthusiasm and hope because they had "succeeded in our lifetime in finding more new relations in physics than had come to light in all preceding ages put together and because the stream of discovery as yet shows no sign of abatement."

Modern Faces Lopsided,

Sight Expert Declares

London.-Modern faces are too lopsided to meet the beauty requirements of the old masters, says H. L. Taylor, chairman of the British National Council for the Preservation of Eyesight.



COVERED SPACE FOR DAIRY HERD

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The open shed or covered barnyard is a practical method of housing dairy cows. It provides the best-known method of saving and preserving all the fertilizing constituents of the mashelter of roughage and makes possible its utilization for bedding; when there is plenty of bedding, cows so housed keep cleaner than those confined in stanchions. These are the principal points in favor of the openshed system, says the United States Department of Agriculture.

In an experiment at the Beltsville station it was found that the cows in the open shed produced a little more milk, but at a greater cost for feed, than the cows in the closed barn. The more timid cows were fought away from the feed racks in the shed, which | New York Edison company, who pointresulted in a much lower production from such cows. Probably it would be a matter of economy to confine the cows at feeding time. Cows so housed should be dehorned.

The labor required under the two systems was slightly greater with the open shed. Had the cows been milked in the open shed this would not have been the case, but since this practice is not recommended in the production of market milk, the cows in this experiment were taken to a separate stable for milking. Sixty-eight per cent more bedding was used in the open shed.

Helpful Plan Outlined

to Dehorn Young Calves During each year there are many questions about killing the horns on little calves. Thus we print the following from a bulletin from the Ohio experiment station:

When the calf is four to seven days old the hair over and around the knobs that later produce horns is clipped close. The moistened end of a stick of caustic potash is then

The calf should be kept in the dry for a few hours after the treatment. Following the successful application of the caustic a scab will form over

the knob and drop off in a few days. Stick caustic potash can be procured at a drug store for a few cents, and may be kept for some time in a tightly stoppered bottle. While handling the caustic it should be wrapped in paper to prevent injury to

Lactic Acid Bacteria in

Milk Causes It to Sour Milk sours because of the affection for it of tiny germs, called lactic acid Lactose, which is milk sugar, is

converted by these bacteria into lactic acid. When development of this acid has gone far enough, the milk sours. Lactic acid bacteria are everywhere and their numbers multiply fast in ordinary market milk if the milk be warm, while at a cooler temperature their multiplication is slower. In evaporated milk, which is simply pure cow's milk sterilized in cans and with 60 per cent of the water removed, lactic acid germs have no opportunity to get to the milk, which explains the reason why the evaporated product in hermetically sealed cans will keep indefinitely on the pantry shelf.

Lactic acid forms on the milk proteins, causing them to precipitate in the form of a curd. When small quantities of acid are present, the precipitate is flocculent. When large quantitles are present, the precipitate is heavy and forms a compact curd.

New York .- A 2,000,000,000 candlepower searchlight, the largest in the world, with a light intensity 80 times as great as all the lights on all New York city's Great White Way combined, was shown to the public for the first time recently at the Electrical and Industrial exposition. So powerful is this searchlight that a man 40 miles away could see to read his nure; it permits the feeding under newspaper by it, and those operating the light can clearly discern objects at a distance of five or six miles.

At least 10,000 persons crowded around the exhibit of the coast artillery on the third floor of the exposition to look at this remarkable searchlight and to listen with awe while Lieut, F. A. Mitchell, U. N. A., recounted the wonders that it could

Discussing the enormous strides in anti-aircraft work made since the beginning of aerial warfare, Lieutenant Mitchell said that in 1914 the French were bringing down one plane for every 13,000 shells fired, while at the close of the war, the United States anti-aircraft forces were shooting down one plane for every 600 shells fired. In recent tests at Fort Tilden, Lieutenant Mitchell said, our gunners scored one hit in every twelve shots against the flying targets.

"When it is considered." he said, "that a battery of three-inch antiaircraft guns-the most efficient weapon against the airplane-can fire 60 shells a minute, which at the rate of one fatal hit for twelve shots. means slightly better than four hits every minute, you can see that, as the anti-aircraft men figure it, Zeppelins have no chance at all and airplanes very little."

DANGERS OF SUN BATHS

CO MUCH has been said and writ-I ten during the last few years as to the value of sunlight in many conditions, especially consumption, that the general public and in some cases physicians, as well, have gotten the idea that sunlight is good for everything, that it costs nothing and that the more one gets the better. Briefly, the prevailing idea is that it always does good and never does harm.

Unfortunately, this is not borne out by the facts. Direct sunlight is a powerful influence. It is by no means safe to assume that the more you take the better you are, any more than it would be safe to walk into a drug store and take a drink out of the first bottle you found. Sunshine like any other remedy must be used with intelligence and discrimination. Civilized men have been house dwellers for many generations. To expose him suddenly to direct sunlight for long periods is as dangerous as it is to take Eskimos, who for generations have lived in snow huts and worn fur clothes, and put them into steam-heated, air-tight houses and conventional clothing. This has been tried and the results are disastrous. They generally die in a few months or years of consumption or pneumonia.

So Dr. H. S. Watson of Tucson, Ariz., in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association, warns both laymen and physicians against the indiscriminate and uncontrolled use of direct sunlight in tubercular cases. Direct sunlight, he says, is a powerful agency. It is a powerful agency for good. This is now generally understood. But that it is an equal or even greater power for harm is not generally known. In any form of tuberculosis, especially in consumption, it should be used only with the greatest care. The idea that sunlight will cure consumption fits in so readily with popular ideas of this disease and is so simple and attractive that nearly every one who has or who susgins to expose his body to the sun.

It seems so easy and harmless that many persons are doing it without any advice from doctors as to how or when strong sunlight in a hot humid atmosphere and so not only jeopardize Still another device is a great lis- his life, but put himself beyond any chance of cure.

Those most experienced in the use of sunlight now agree that its successful use does not depend on following some set and fixed program, but is rather to be guided by the way in which each patient responds and that each patient must be treated according to his needs.

Ancients Still Hold

Record for Stadiums

When 140,000 persons entered the stadium at the sesquicentennial in Philadelphia to see the Dempsey-Tunney boxing match, a record was made for modern amphitheaters. The next largest stadium is the one at Grant park, Chicago, with a capacity of 100,000, says the Detroit News.

However, the ancients have not been surpassed in this respect. The largest structure in history for accommodating assemblies of spectators doubtless was the familiar Circus Maximus at Rome. The original structure was built as early as 329 B. C. It was made of wood and was burned in the fire that destroyed Rome. It was rebuilt with more durable material. According to the historian Pliny it had a seating capacity of 250,000 and often was crowded to capacity. Some writers of ancient Rome place the capacity of the circus as high as 485,000.






