| PECOS CO. OIL AGTVITY DRAWI MORE INTEREST <br> The Buell \& Hagan, McKinzie No: 1, section 8, block 604, G. C. S. F. By. survey, on the T. N. <br> dKinzie ranch, of which such reports were coming in till extre press last Friday, presents possilities of being one of Pecos County's big producers. On last Saturday the well was standing 75 feet in oil which was coming from 11 feet of sand ing the oil was a 250,000 cubic foot flow of gas. The well was drilled to 2187 feet where it topped the lime. Drilling another 13 feet the bit again entered anhydrite, penetrating to 2217 feet. <br> No. 1 McKenzie, with a surface elevation of 2,984 feet, topped the lime 146 lower than C. E. McKenzie's No. 1 Sherdino, four miles to the southeast, which had a surface elevation of 2857 feet, and topped the lime at 2206 feet. The McKenzie well in the spring of 1919 struck oil in lime from 2296 to 2307 feet, which, it was believed, might have been developed into a 26-barrel producer, but it was passed up. The McKenzie test \& S. F. Ry survey. The test was completed the following year at 3745 feet. Oil in the McKenzie well is estimated to be of around <br> 31 gravity. <br> The first trace of oil and gas from sand with little anhydrite from 2155 to 2175 feet. From 2175 to 2187 feet, the formation was pure sand, and the oil and gas increased, oil rising 75 feet in the hole. There is something over 740 feet of 10 -inch casing in the well and a 10 -inch hole was carried to 2175 feet. where it was reduced to eight inches. The lime was topped at 2187 feet and at 2200 feet anydrite again struck. <br> The McKenzie No. 1 is in the northeast quarter of the north of section 8, block 604, Mrs. A. L. Cannon, grantee. As it now stands it could probably be developed into a 30 or 40 barrel a day producer, but it will be carried through the lime in hopes of locating the big pay. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be Conended by inserting therein a new section to be numbered Section 30a which shall read as follows: <br> Section 30a. All provisions of the or limiting the amount of salary or compensation of officers and members of the Legislature are hereby repealed and hereafter said officers and members of the Legislature shall receive such salary or compensation and expenses as now provided until other- wise provided by law. The salary of the Governor shall be Ten Thou- sand Dollars $(\$ 10,000.00)$ per year, sand no more, payable monthly, and he shall have the occupancy and use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and the Governors mansion, axios any furniture salary or compensation of any member of the Legisleture shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year, and actual traveling expenses year, and actual traveling expenses from the place of residence to the capitol and returning for each session of the Legislature, as shall hereafter be provided by law; and provided that no change of salary or compensation from that now provided by the Con- stitution shall become effective until the first day of January following the first general election held after adoption of this amendment.
