

#### PUBLIC VS. PRIVATE OWNERSHIP

San Antonio, Texas, May 31 .--Some very interesting data compiled by the National Electric Light Association show that during the past twelve months 105 light and power plants owned and operated by municipalities in 27 States have been sold to private owners and have been changed from publicplaythings to public services run by private enterprise. Of the 105 about a dozen of the changes wer in Tex: PETER PREACHING TO GENTILES

This, it is gathered from a general summary of the reports from newspapers which had partd in the various elec tions, was due primarly to too much 3-8). everbead for the available reve-

The plants started off, for the most part, in debt and this situation was intensified until the interest and sinking fund charges prevented any kind of betterments or service extensions. Plants abandoned were in localities where a public demand for a better service than that furnished by the municipal authorities became so loud as to bring about the building of privately-owned systems.

Such cases, it is pointed out by Comnittee, furnish marked examples of the band of competition in kind as between public utlities. The members of that body argue that the public service utilities is a natural monoply and that same regulation-requiring the operators to giveladequate and dependable service at reasonable costs will always prove sensible as against the operations of two or more companies, with multiplied costs, duplications of invbestments, etc. It is held that the investors will either receive fair returns on their outlay of capital, or they will be compelled to retire. That this applies with equal force to all, whether they employ their own money or that of the community's taxpayers is held up as a fact beyond argument.


