





### TWO BILLS ON COTTON COMING THIS SESSION

· (Continued from page 1.) affix a metal tag bearing such number to every bale they turn out showing the net weight of the lint cotton when the bale leaves the gin and such other information as the Secretary may determine. In addition the Secretary would be authorized to prescribe the materials, including bagging and ties, used for covering cotton going into interstate commerce and the standard weight and dimension of th bale which is intended to mean al cotton baled and shipped.

Such standardization, Senator Rans dell says, will not only work for great er accuracy in computing the size of the growing crop, the amount of available supply and the annual consumption of American cotton, but will a bolish the "cotton tare" evil.

"This is the greatest blight that ha ever hung over this or any other agricultural commodity," said Senator Ransdell, "and has been responsible for the loss of tens of millions of dollars to the cotton growers every year.' Variance In Tare.

"A square bale of cotton is covered with jute weighing about fourteen pounds and bound by nine steel ties, with a total weight for bagging and ties from twenty-one to twenty-six pounds. In the trade this weight is known as 'tare.' The term has a varying meaning in pounds. It means one weight when shipped to Southern mills, something else when shipped to England or elsewhere, and is measured another way when it is exported. Irregularities in the system which sporadic efforts in past years have sought to abolish have cost the producers about \$12.50 per bale."

Under Senator Ransdell's plan the metal tag attached by the ginner will show the exact weight of cotton in the bale, and that would govern throughout the transaction under the Secretary's regulations and he sees in this a total elimination of the "tare" system as it would afect the producer's price.

Use For Low Grades.

"Along with this," Senator Ransdell adds, "there is a wide field opened for use of low-grade cotton, now be ing produced at small profit, and the accumulation of which has tended in past years to depress the price of good cotton. The second measure seeks to make effective the fight of last winter to induce use of cotton covering by wrappers made of the low grades and which is declared as feasible as use of jute imported from India. By the use of a chemical which is said to be inexpensive the cotton covering becomes less inflamable than jute." Another benefit, he points out is that five pounds of cotton wrapping will cover a bale, compared with fourteen pounds of jute.

The low-grade cotton used in this way can not compete with jute save by imposing a tariff which will equalize the increased costs of the American production and manufacture, and this is what the second measure seeks

to do. "If we get that sort of measure enacted," said Senator Ransdell, "it would furnish a market for about 2,-000,000 bales of low-grade cotton. Of this amount 300,000 bales would go in cotton covering, and the remainder in sacks and containers being manufactured exclusively out of jute. All grain sugar, fertilizer, much cement, is shipped in jute bags and furniture is wrapped with jute when it is packed. In every case cotton containers or sacks

would be better." Cotton Recommended.

A year ago, when the cotton producer was suffering from a low market due to the large cotton crop various suggestions were offered along the line of substituting cotton for jute, as outlined by Senator Ransdell. As the result of the Mayfield-Connally amend ment to the agricultural appropriation bill the Department of Agriculture made a study to find new uses for cotton. More than 75,000 tons of jute and more than 900,000,000 yards of jute cloth are imported here annu-

ally from India. "It would make a large dent in the cotton surplus to replace even half of the imports with American cotton," was the departments answer, and which pointed out that at the price of jute a cotton wrapper would be

### GAME PRESERVES

Six new game preserves, located in four West Texas counties and aggregating 300,000 acres, have just been accepted by the State Game, Fish and Oyster department. This makes the number of game preserves in Texas now total 55 and the number of acres more than two and a half million, it was announced by Commissioner William Tucker last week. 


